The returns for February from 766 divisions registrars are the most complete in the history of the confluete in the instory of the office. The population represented in these returns is 2,128,320, being 98 per cent, of the province. The number of deaths reported from all causes is 2760, making a death rate per 1000 of 15

It is gratifying to know the number of contagious diseases returned is 92 less, with 32 fewer deaths than in February, 1906. The diseases which caused less deaths are scarlet fever, diphtheria, consumption and whooping cough. It will be observed the deaths from

typhoid fever are the same, while the cases reported are 277 less, which would indicate that many cases were not reported, and that notifications by attending physicians have not been complied with as called for by section 89 of the Health Act. Smallpox shows an increase of 21 cases.


