Peasants Slain in Peasant Riot Will Confer

Roumanian Troops Use Artillery to Put Down Uprising and Shops in Bucharest Are Closed as Protective Move.

Bucharest, Roumania, March 28.—The efforts of the government to suppress the revolt of the peasants have met with only partial success. The troops are acting with increased energy.

Hundreds of rioters have been killed in the numerous conflicts with the soldiers, but as yet there is no sign of permanent amelioration of the situation. On the contrary, the rioters appear to be becoming more bold and determined...

Brought Back by Troops. The roving bands of peasants in the district of Teleorman were surrounded and brought to bay yesterday by detachments of troops.

At Vlaciua, a band of peasants were summoned to disperse, refused to do so and opened fire on the troops, whereupon the latter fired three shots at them from a field gun, killing seventy men and wounding many more.

Many Slain in Village. A serious encounter is reported to have taken place at the Village of Papaschani in the district of Dolj, but details are lacking.

Eleven Officers Killed. It is impossible to give even an approximate estimate of the number killed or wounded since the beginning of the disorders, but there is apparently good reason to believe that the reports have not been exaggerated.

It is reported that in Northern Moldavia, where the rioting was temporarily suspended, the peasants intend to recommence their pillaging during the Jewish Passover.

The authorities are doing all they possibly can to restore order, and some of the measures adopted are severe.

Father and Two Small Children, Ill With Diphtheria, Refused Service of City Ambulance.

DR. SHEARD DEFENDS DRIVER

Immediate Necessities of Suffering Patients Relieved by Kind Friends—Medical Men Indignant.

George Ferris is a poor, overworked, ill-fed sufferer. Since last July, when his wife died, he has been trying to be both father and mother to his four little children.

The officials vouchsafed no answer. Father Overcome. Yesterday two young ladies entered the little store, when the man, overcome with weakness, fell from his feet.

Touched with pity for him they sent in some food and coverings for the children.

A note by grocer was told and he also helped with food and rigged up an impromptu stove with a tin pall and a bag of charcoal.

Finally, Dr. H. Robinson, 163 Wilton-avenue, was rung up and he went along. By this time it was 11 o'clock at night.

He inspected the man's throat and found the deadly white spot which means diphtheria.

On a bare floor of the tumble-down shop lay two ill-souriced, tired children—some aged three, the other seven!

Then the mayor was appealed to and he said he would have the matter investigated.

"We took two cases of diphtheria away from that address on Wednesday. Before the World had time to ask the matter was before 11 o'clock, and I told the doctor that I would go down for them first thing in the morning."

"Did you tell him the horses were too tired to get out again?" "There was no doubt about that. I had been out at evening. The man in the only reason I gave. If they were sick they knew what it was when the cases went out on Wednesday."

Dr. Robinson called to The World and stated that he wished it published that about 1 o'clock Dr. Sheard called him out of bed, and when he answered the phone, said "So The World has your story, eh?"

but it was no excuse for the idling. Neither is it an excuse for breach of trust in connection with insurance funds.

It is a most shameful thing and altogether unworthy of parliament that the wrongs that have been done to policyholders in this country should be made a subject of mere-ology of arrangements between politicians because for some of these politicians are more or less implicated in insurance scandals, or have friends interested in insurance scandals.

There is nothing ahead of the Canadian public at this moment but two things; one is to insist on the retirement of every man who is implicated in any kind of scandal at Ottawa, and the other is to insist on an immediate change in the law regarding insurance in this country. It is these scandals that are blocking the way of reform in insurance law. Parliament should sit until it secures this, and what is more, the minister of finance, the Hon. W. S. Fielding, should insist on the retirement of every man from any insurance company, whose conduct, as judged from the report, renders him unworthy of having trust funds in his hands. A man who has been proved to have done wrong, such as what the insurance commission has reported a number of men to have done, is not fit to be in charge of trust funds, and licenses should be withdrawn from the companies until the wrongdoers go out. To postpone this action any longer, now that the report is in, is to compound the crime. As this paper has often pointed out, we do not want new law so much as the enforcement of existing law.

Turn out of office the public men who have furnished cause for public scandal; force out of office all the insurance wrongdoers; then politics will begin to improve, and there will be a chance for legitimate work in insurance business.

FEWER DEATHS REPORTED FROM CONTAGIOUS DISEASE

Returns Respecting Typhoid Fever Indicate Negligence by Physicians in Reporting.

While the deaths as a whole have increased from 2288 in February, 1906, to 2760 in February this year, an excess of 497, the deaths from contagious diseases have decreased by 32.

The returns for February from 766 divisions registrars are the most complete in the history of the office. The population represented in these returns is 1,228,320, being 98 per cent of the province. The number of deaths reported from all causes is 2760, making a death rate per 1000 of 15.

It is gratifying to know the number of contagious diseases returned is 98 less, with 32 fewer deaths than in February, 1906. The diseases which caused less deaths are scarlet fever, diphtheria, consumption and whooping cough.

It will be observed the deaths from typhoid fever are the same, while the cases reported are 277 less, which would indicate that many cases were not reported, and that notifications by attending physicians have not been complied with as called for by section 89 of the Health Act. Smallpox shows an increase of 21 cases.

HEAVY SLABS OF SILVER FROM THE NOVA SCOTIA

This Mine and the Peterson Lake Claim are Attracting Attention at the Camp.

Cobalt, March 28.—(From the Man on the Spot.)—Winter is a thing of the past in the camp, and it looks as if an early spring would be their future for 1907. The snow has disappeared from the town and is a thing of the past on the bluff and high places throughout the town of Coleman. Prospecting can be diligently prosecuted henceforward. The sensational new finds have been the Peterson Lake, the Nova Scotia, Temiskaming and Hudson Bay and North Cobalt, the Campbell and Bonanza in the southeast of Coleman. Extension of Bonanza. On Friday the Peterson Lake people at the west end of the lake and on the shore line bounded by the Nipissing, found a 12-inch vein of calcite, smallite and fine silver, which was shown up after the capping was blown off. Everyone who has seen this find believes that it is an extension of the Bonanza Nipissing vein No. 49. To draw a line from the workings at the Buffalo Mine to this district of Peterson Lake would result in that line running right over and following the trend of vein No. 49.

Some Recent Findings. The Campbell find is really an extension of the Schults vein, which lies to the north. Thomas Lake has a rich find, carrying a high percentage of silver. The Higgins lot's south boundary makes the United States proposition look on the surface as different ore is visible on the surface at different places. In particular two huge nuggets are seen of practically solid silver, and one of them weighs 500 lbs. and the other will go nearly half a ton. People who have seen this great Lawson vein assigned to the surface. It is this new find which has been stripped nearly 400 feet.

Strikes at Laurentian. Wabigoon, March 27.—An extraordinarily rich strike was made in the famous Laurentian gold mine to-day, almost surpassing the great discovery of a year ago. A vein was discovered 30 feet above the 200-foot level and the ore will assay thousands of dollars to the ton.

Another Fender Test. Ontario Railway Board Will Give Inventors Chance to Demonstrate. The Ontario Railway board has approved the plans for part of the trans-mission line to Brantford of the Hamilton, Canada, Light, Power and Traction Co. The line runs thru Barton and Ancaster Townships.

Big Easter Traffic. The number of Easter excursionists leaving Union Station yesterday for all points far exceeded anything of the kind in past years. The ticket agents of the C.P.R. and G.T.R. declared that the record is unprecedented.

Damages Against City. The jury awarded John Soudby \$1000 damages against the city. The city gates at the High Park entrance were not down and his rig was struck by a train. Judgment was not entered pending further argument by the solicitors.
