

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

John Dillon, leader of the anti-Parnellites, declared that the bill was an outrage on Ireland. If it were passed Ireland ought to receive from 40 to 50 per cent. of the grant.

Sir William Vernon Harcourt, the Liberal leader in the House, said he doubted if the House knew the magnitude of the proposals contained in the bill. It was by far the greatest financial question that had been opened within his experience in Parliament. He was astounded by the recklessness and want of consideration with which a measure of this kind was flung on the floor of the House. It was a gross and palpable injustice. Sir William added that the bill went half way towards a national poor rate than which there was no greater danger. He predicted that very soon the Government would be made upon it and would get the whole way.

Mr. Chaplin, replying te the criticisms on the bill, contended that the Unionists had pledged such a measure before the elections. Many of the proposals that the Opposition denounced were based on the recommendations of their own royal commission. Mr. Chaplin announced that the annual grant would continue for five years and thereafter as Parliament should determine.



There was considerable liquidation of long May wheat to-day, which caused a weak market. Shorts were the best buyers, the outside trade being rather light. The closing was quiet at about 1c decline from Saturday's latest price. Better weather for growing crop could not be desired; and crep accounts were generally favorable, although there were one or two complaints of chinch bugs from Southern Illinois. There was a despatch from San Francisco stating that California was again visited by a general frost, and claiming-resultant damage. This news imparted a little steadiness to the market, but was soon forgotten. Cable news was duli and lower, and New York reports an utter absence of foreign trading and no fresh export business.
