SPANISH GUERRILLAS ARE TROUBLESOME. One American Was Killed and Two Were Wounded—Another Gun Mounted on the Summit of a Hill in a Good Position—Plucky Work on the Part of the U.S. Soldiers, Whose Companions Were Relieved When They Returned.

WAR NEWS PARAPHRASED. The hopelessness of Spain's cause is becoming recognized at Madrid.

The Queen Regent is considering the advisability of abdication in favor of the Infanta Isabella and allowing her to accept the terms proposed by the United States.

General Blanco's last message from Havana was so discouraging that the Government altered its policy.

The Pope has again offered his services to the Queen Regent to secure European intervention. The Queen, it is said, made a non-committal reply.

The first military expedition left Key West yesterday. It consists of 14,564 enlisted men and 773 officers.

An official announcement from General Blanco given out at Madrid states that twenty-four vessels appeared off Santiago on Sunday.

Manila has surrendered to the insurgents. The Spanish garrison at Manila will place themselves in the hands of the Americans.

Russia is expected to enter a protest against an alliance between Admiral Dewey's forces and the

regiment of the Spanish army. Rear Admiral Sampson thereupon said he believed that half if not more of the enemy's guns had been dismantled.

When asked if he got any inkling of the Spanish desertion, he replied, "Yes; I am sure they did. They could not stand that terrific fire."

WAR REVENUE BILL SIGNED. Bonds to be issued for \$200,000,000 by Popular Subscription.

Washington, June 13.—The War Revenue bill was signed by the President at 3:01 o'clock.

Immediately upon receipt of information from the White House that the War Revenue bill had been signed by the President, Secretary Gage today issued a circular explaining to the public the proposed bond issue.
