

The joint report presented by the veterinary surgeons employed was as follows:

Sept. 1, 1899.

This is a joint report of post mortem, made by Messrs. Mole and Hurd, veterinary surgeons of the city of Toronto, at the request of exhibitors of cattle at the Industrial Exhibition:

We beg to say that we examined the carcases of eight cows, and personally made a post mortem of each carcase.

A Jersey cow we identified as the property of Mr. Robert Davies of Thorncliffe Stock Farm, and found brain congested, pleurae congested, lungs weighing 24 pounds, heart inflamed, endocarditis, splinal cord inflamed, rumen or stomach healthy, filled with food, cut hay, meal and cut cornstalks; udder congested, more especially the front or anterior quarters, as was the case with all of the animals examined. We also noticed an entire absence of milk in vessels, but the lining membrane was inflamed. An Ayrshire cow, with broken horn right-hand side, "milking side," we found that the lungs were not so much congested, only weighing 13 pounds, but the bowels were more congested, and spinal cord more infitrated with blood; rumen and bowels filled with food; the udder very much congested in all four quarters.

We are of opinion that these animals died from lung apoplexy, due to some septic poisoning from cause we are unable to find. There is no evidence of unnatural death only septic intoxication





This is the only protection for the general public and the honest breeder.
