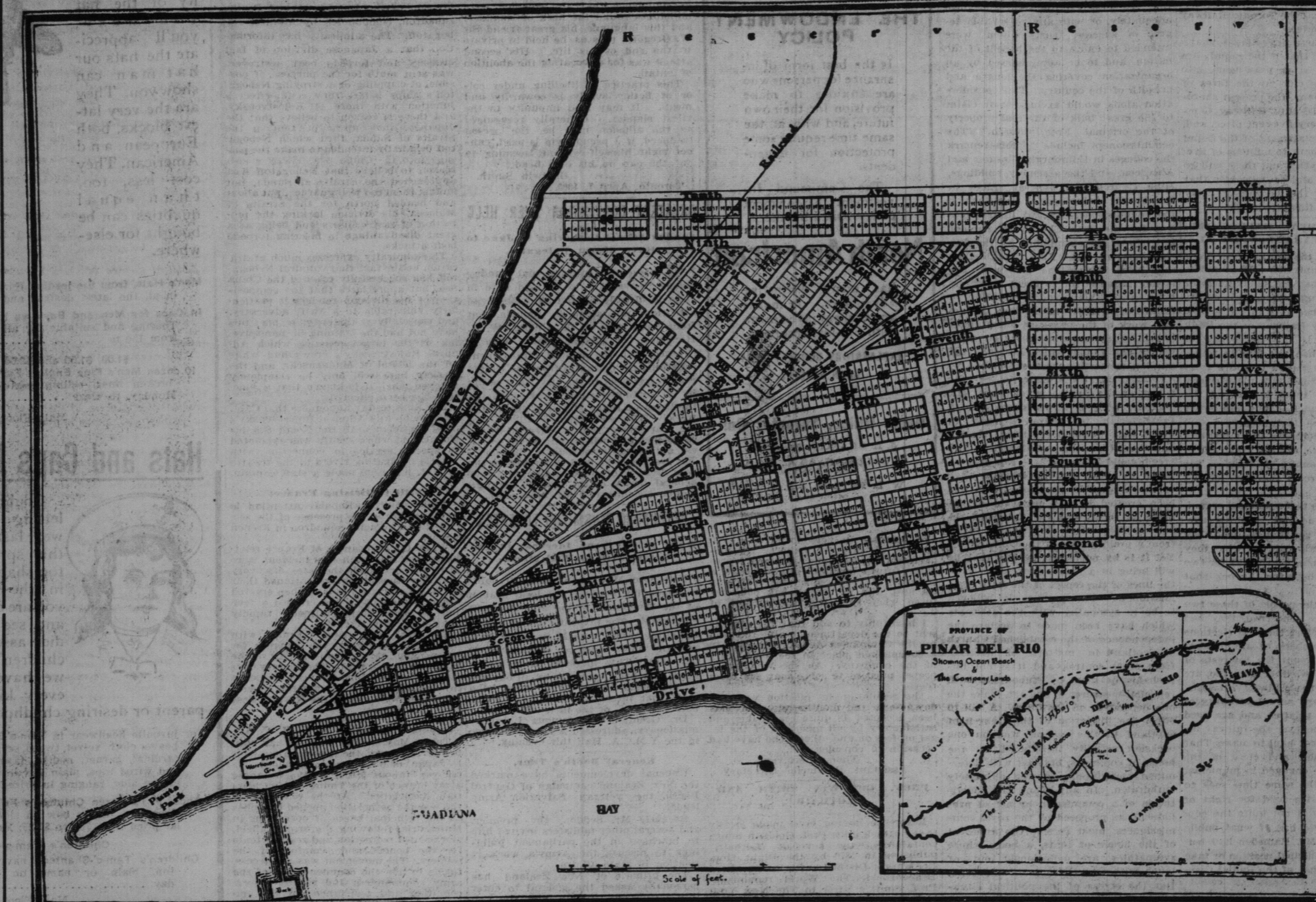

CAN'T TOUCH UNION FUNDS.

Money in Bank is in Trust for Sick Benefits Only.

The Sheet Metal Workers' Union won a legal victory yesterday when the master-in-chamber decided that funds to its credit in a bank cannot be attached. Action was brought by the Metallic Roofing Company to recover \$140 costs of its suit against the union, following the strike two years ago. Mr. Cartwright held that the money forming a trust fund for the relief of sick members and for general benefits could not be applied to any other purpose. No costs were allowed either party.

Leave was given St. George's Church, Guelph, to sell the church property held in trust. The price was \$5000 and the church will receive \$2000 to pay off mortgages, and the legislature will pass an enabling act.

Pelletier's Denial.

Quebec, May 5.—Hon. L. P. Pelletier this city denies the rumor that he intends presenting himself in the course of Levis for federal honors in the by-election. Mr. Pelletier emphatically states that he is out of politics for good.

2,500,000 BUSHELS FOR SALE.

Winnipeg, May 5.—The Ogilvie Flour Mills Company, on the subject of wheat in farmers' hands yet to market, stated today that late and complete returns received from buyers and inspectors indicated not more than 2,500,000 bushels for sale after providing for the necessary seed.

Victorian is Icebound.

St. John's, Nfld., May 5.—The Allan Line turbine steamer, Victorian, from Liverpool for Montreal, with 1000 passengers, is stuck in an ice-ice, one mile off Cape Ray, at the entrance of the Gulf of St. Lawrence. She is unable to proceed farther, the ice being packed across Cabot Strait.

Too Many Restrictions.

The suggestion advanced before the board of control on Thursday by the city architect, that a graded tax be levied on building permits, created a good deal of talk among local architects, who, as a general thing, do not favor the proposition. E. J. Lennox thought that architects would take the course of including the amount of the tax in the price of their services. The consensus of opinion appears to be that sufficient restrictions on building already exist.

KEEP POLITICS OUT.

Officers of Permanent Force Are Given an Intimation.

Ottawa, May 5.—Militia orders promulgated to-day convey a plainly worded warning to officers of the permanent force who have been employing political influence to secure their own advancement in the service. The notice reads: "The honorable the minister in militia council retracts that he is obliged to call the attention of officers of the permanent force to the unsoldierlike practice that prevails in several quarters of making or permitting to be made, applications to him for changes of station or special privileges through unofficial channels. The minister desires it to be distinctly understood that he will only consider communications from officers of the permanent force that reach him through the proper official channels, and he further desires it to be understood that officers of the permanent force are dissatisfied with their stations or positions, they are at liberty at any time to forward their resignations, which will be promptly accepted."

An Entertaining Advertising Agency.

He is the youngest member on the board, and it is a great compliment to the Canadian breeders to have one of their number honored in this way by the American Jersey Cattle Club. Mr. Bull, it will be remembered, has just been appointed manager of the Cuban Realty Company, Limited.

C.P.R. Has the Advantage.

Ottawa, May 5.—The railway commission heavily today the application of the department of public works for a crossing over the C.P.R. tracks at Pembroke, to reach a wharf. The C.P.R. contended that there never was a public street there, and the department will have to prove that there was or pay the entire cost of a crossing.

International Railway Men.

Washington, May 5.—The International Railway congress, divided into five sections, devoted several hours to discussions to-day. Adjournment was taken shortly after noon that delegates might lunch and prepare for the reception at the White House this evening.

PUBLIC INQUIRY.

Endo Saunders at Chatham in License Commissioner's Charge.

Chatham, May 5.—(Special.)—Endo Saunders, provincial license inspector, who is the special commissioner delegated to investigate charges against the West Kent License Board, was here today arranging for the investigation, which will be held here publicly on Wednesday next. The commissioner has been granted full judicial powers and promises an open and impartial enquiry. If no one comes forward to make charges, it is understood the commissioner themselves will place in the box. Crown Attorney Smith will act for the government.

GOLDWIN SMITH AND DISRAELI.

Manchester Comment on Novell's Privileges With the Living.

London, May 5.—(C. A. P.)—Owing to weight and construction, the Canadian government's agricultural exhibition car will not be allowed to travel faster than five miles per hour. Commenting on Goldwin Smith's letter to The New York Nation, regarding the edition of Disraeli's novels, recently appearing in the United States, The Manchester Guardian says Goldwin Smith makes some comments which not only concern his own case, but have a wider bearing on the question of the amount of freedom that a novelist may permit himself in dealing with living persons whose identity he but thinly disguises. The "Oxford professor" is represented by Disraeli as a man who has "dreamed of a novel which would be worth reading, but which could not be read at home. The fact is says The Guardian, Goldwin Smith resigned his chair for the performance of a sad domestic duty, which occupied him for a year and a half.

The Dundee Advertiser, referring

to the reduction of book postage rates in Canada and the postmaster-general's usual says: "Even if this particular reform were to result in less it would still on the broad grounds of imperial policy be worth effecting. Nobody will dispute that the mind of the country, especially a country like Canada, where men can read and use to read, is nourished by the literature it feeds on. In Canada the mental food is almost wholly of American origin."

Ten Months as a Lesson.

In the police court yesterday, Police Magistrate Denison sentenced an Italian named Miguaco to ten months in the Central Prison for interfering with P. C. Allen in the performance of his duty on a recent Sunday afternoon. Mr. Miguaco defended the prisoner, and protested against the sentence as being too severe. It may appear to some in that light, but the view taken by the court seems the only proper one. The Italian colony is large in this city, and they must be taught to observe our laws and customs the same as other citizens. Had the officer allowed them in this instance to carry out their intention of rescuing his prisoner, it would doubtless have given them courage to do further at some future time. The lesson learned here has given them a salutary one, and will no doubt have a lasting effect. P. C. Allen was severely injured by a missile being thrown, and his face bears the marks. Two others were fined.

Street Railway Will Heal Garbner's

Wound. The Street Railway will be willing to make an agreement with the city whereby the tracks may be utilized for the hauling of garbage to Ashbridge's Bay by electric power, according to General Manager Fleming, but only on advance on the original terms offered.

Victorian Order of Nurses.

Mrs. Nordheimer presided at the monthly meeting of the Victorian Order of Nurses yesterday. Six hundred and twenty-five visits were paid during April, including 31 night calls, but many, including 22 maternity cases, were refused for lack of nurses.

Fire at Southampton.

Southampton, May 5.—Last night the Blacksmith shop and carriage works and contents of McLean & Tuppel were destroyed by fire.

DUEL TO FOLLOW DEBATE.

Hungarian Premier Interrupted by a Member and Wants to Fight.

Buda-Pesth, May 5.—A duel between Premier Tisza and a member of the opposition, Herr Poszgay, will be the outcome of a stormy debate in the lower house of the Hungarian Diet to-day. Premier Tisza had bitterly assailed the demand of the opposition in that section demanding customs boundaries against Austria. He pointed out that Hungary as an independent state would only be able to conclude treaties under the most unfavorable conditions, while it was the utmost importance that Austrian markets should be open to Hungarian agricultural products.

The Premier was interrupted by Herr

Poszgay, a member of the opposition, who said it was "beyond pale" that Hungary should be placed in the position of a vassal state. An uproar ensued, and the sitting was suspended. Afterward Count Tisza sent his seconds to Herr Poszgay.

MAN BURNS WITH BARN.

Dunrobin, Ont., May 5.—During a severe thunderstorm this morning the stable of James Carlisle was struck by lightning and completely destroyed, with all contents, including a cow, which was in the building, having gone in to try and save his brother's cow, which was in the stable.

War in Paper Bags.

E. B. Eddy, "old warhorse" among the manufacturers in Canada, has lately been aroused to vigorous and determined action because of the lack on the large wholesale grocery and jobbing trade in Canada in "concrete" bags and paper grocery bags. Complaint reached Hull last month that someone was cutting paper bags and selling in a secret, underground way to the retail trade in small lots at close to the large price, thus cutting into the profit that should naturally go to the wholesale buyer in handling bags.

It did not take long for E. B. E.

to get to the bottom of this, and, having ascertained facts by telegraphed enquiry, he has in Canada, from coast to coast, just these five words: "Meet the competition in bags."

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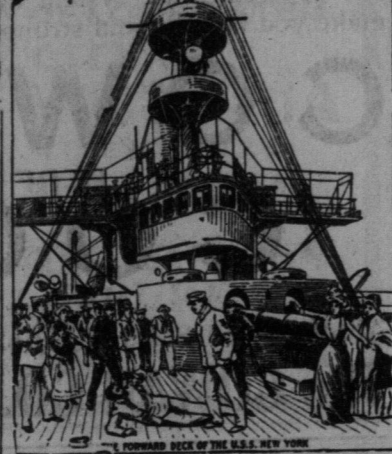

WATER POWER AT FORT FRANCES.

Senate Railway Committee Hears a Protest to Be Considered.

Ottawa, May 5.—In the senate railway committee today H. J. F. Sissons of Fort Frances presented objections to the bill giving the Ontario and Quebec Power Company the right to develop and make use of water power on the Rainy River. In February, 1904, an agreement had been signed with Eon, E. J. Davis; later the promoters entered into negotiations with Mr. Mackay, the new commissioner of crown lands, and a new contract was entered into, under which only 5000 horse power was to be developed on the Canadian side. Mr. Sissons claimed that Fort Frances should have been consulted in this and wanted a re-instatement of the clause that one-half the total power of 25,000 to 30,000 horse power should be developed on the Canadian side. As the promoters of the bill were not present, the bill was held over until Friday next.

An act to incorporate the Bradford and Woodstock Railway passed. Senator Ker of Toronto contended that such bills should be chartered by the provincial legislature. The local authority in Bradford was to deal with it.

Senator Power said that if Senator Ker introduced a resolution in the senate he would support it, but there was no use of attacking one particular bill on these lines and passing others without dissent. This session they had passed similar bills without opposition. The bill was reported in the senate Hon. Mr. Young moved the suspension of the rules in the case of the Grand Trunk Pacific and the Canada Atlantic Railway bills. The motion was carried and the bills were read a third time and passed.

CUPID ON THE CURB.

Salvation Army's Stringent Rules for Young Lovers.

Marriage among members of the American branch of the Salvation Army is regarded as too serious a matter to be left entirely in the hands of romantic young couples.

A romance reported at headquarters has brought to light the London Express' New York correspondent, a stringent set of rules for guidance in love matters, which has been strictly observed. Colonel Cox has explained the case without a jury and rendered a verdict in favor of the defendant. The appellate division reverses this decision.

This exists for the reason that a wife assumes the rank of her husband, and the position carries with it certain duties and obligations which a private could not fulfill."

"But suppose an officer should fall in love with a private?" it was asked. "You disregard his happiness and compel him to give up his choice." "In the army," replied Colonel Cox, "severely 'usefulness' is regarded as a large factor in happiness. A match would impair the officer's usefulness, and consequently could not increase his happiness."
