SYNOPSIS OF MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL
MEETING OF THE CONGREGATION.

A large number of members of the congregation attended
 the annual meeting held on the evening of January 9, 1888.
 On motion Mr. J. K. Macdonald was called to preside,
 and Mr. Garnett H. Meldrum was appointed Secretary.

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After the meeting had been duly constituted, Mr. H. Meldrum, Clerk of Session, read the report of that body, and also the Treasurer's statement, which were adopted on motion by Mr. Anderson, seconded by Mr. Wilson.

Mr. A. R. Creelman moved the adoption of the annual report of the Managers, which was seconded by Mr. C. B. Petry, and carried.

The report of the Mortgage Debt Committee appointed at the last annual meeting of the congregation was presented by Mr. Creelman, who moved the adoption of the same. This resolution was seconded by Mr. Spence and carried.

The following gentlemen were elected to act on the Board of Managers during the next two years, namely:— A. R. Creelman, R. G. A. Paton, Dr. D. J. G. Wishart, W. N. Miller, R. Donald, sr., S. B. Windrum, R. W. Spence, and Wm. Campbell.

Considerable discussion took place in connection with the call tendered by the congregation of St. Andrew's Church, Victoria, B.C., to the Rev. P. McF. Macleod, pastor of this church, and a resolution moved by Mr. Andrew Jeffrey, and seconded by Mr. Jas. Watson, to the following effect was finally carried, namely: That Messrs. J. K. Macdonald, William Wilson, C. S. Gzowski, and the mover be appointed Commissioners to represent this congregation at the meeting of the Presbytery of Toronto, to be held on the following day, and that they be instructed to oppose the translation of Rev. Mr. Macleod to Victoria, B.C., by every legitimate means in their power.

A vote of thanks to the Organist, Leader of the Choir, Members of the Choir, and Church Auditors, for the valuable services they have rendered the congregation during the past year, and to the Chairman of this meeting for the excellent manner in which he has conducted the business under discussion, was unanimously passed.

The annual reports of the different organizations connected with the church were ordered to be printed as usual.

Messrs. John Erskine and Théron Gibson were, on motion, appointed Auditors for the ensuing year.

REPORT OF THE SESSION FOR 1887.

The Session have again the privilege of recording a year's gratifying progress in the spiritual life and work of the congregation, although through deaths and removals greater losses have been sustained than in the previous year.

Our membership at the close of 1886 numbered 512, and during the past year 96 members have been added—52 by certificate and 44 by confession of faith. There have been removed from the roll during the year 87 members—7 by death, 38 certified to other churches, and 42 who have left us but not yet applied for certificates, or whose names have been removed from the roll, by the Session, for various reasons. The net gain is therefore 9 members, so that our membership at the close of 1887 stands at 521. As the number of names removed is unusually large it is right to state that 39 members have left the city, some having gone to the United States, and others to various towns and cities in Canada, 12 have united with Bloor Street church, and 8 with other churches in the city to whose vicinity they have removed. The others have not been attending the church or communicating within the last two years, or have given other evidence of their having no desire to be continued on our roll. The Session has made the revision very thorough in order that the printed list may represent the real strength of the congregation. It is interesting to notice that 29 out of the 44, added by confession of faith, are from the Bible classes and Sabbath school, a gratifying indication of the faithfulness and devotedness of our noble staff of teachers.

During the year we have lost two elders who have connected themselves with other congregations, Mr. W. E. Murray having united with Deer Park congregation, and Mr. Gourlay with the new church on Bloor Street. Both these brethren enjoyed the esteem and affection of the whole congregation, and we have no doubt will render valuable service to the congregations with which they are now connected. The sacrament of the Lord's supper has been observed eight times during the year, we believe with marked results in the quickening of the spiritual life of the members. As the various organizations present their own reports, it is unnecessary for the Session to dwell on the

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good work accomplished, but they would thankfully acknowledge the zeal and earnestness displayed by all the workers of both sexes. During the year we have had many sad bereavements, which we trust have drawn us all nearer to the Lord, and deepened in us all a sense of responsibility for the improvement of our remaining times in the world. The Lord has taken from us the infant of days, the youth in his prime, the strong man in the midst of his days, and the aged who have long borne the burden and heat of the day. May we all be able to say in entering upon the unknown future "whether living or dying we are the Lord's."

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

In presenting its report of the year ending 31st December, 1887, the Board of Management desires to express deep thankfulness to Almighty God for the many proofs of His favour enjoyed by the Congregation during the year.

It will be seen by reference to the detailed Statement of Receipts and Expenditures appended to this report that the outlay for purely Congregational purposes has considerably exceeded the outlay for the preceding year, although a saving has been effected in the matter of interest, which is now confined to the Mortgage Debt, and that there was at the end of the year a balance of \$163.61 due to the Treasurer. This result may be attributed to the extensive improvements and repairs of the church property which were effected during the year at a cost of \$999.41; these improvements and repairs were urgently needed, and as they are permanent in their nature and embrace nearly all the requirements in that direction (except the painting of the outside woodwork), it is confidently expected that a moderate annual outlay will in the future maintain the property in an efficient state of repair.

The Board has pleasure in reporting that all the financial engagements of the Congregation during the year have been promptly met, and in expressing the opinion that all future calls are quite within the powers of the Congregation. Our whole indebtedness now consists of the Mortgage Debt, amounting to £5,000 sterling, upon which interest has been paid to the end of the year, and the above balance of \$163.61 carried over from the present year.

The interest on the Mortgage Debt has been reduced, and a present annual saving of \$121.67 thereby effected commencing on 1st July last.

Owing to the large expenditure for improvements, no collections during the year have been made towards the reduction of the Mortgage Debt, with the exception of \$19.50 contributed by the Ladies' Aid Society, whose valuable efforts during preceding years resulted in the extinguishment of the Floating Debt, but the Board would strongly recommend that the Congregation resolve to make a payment on account of principal during the coming year.

The Sabbath School Association have represented to the Board that the present mode of sustaining the Sabbath School is unsatisfactory, and that the funds for that purpose, amounting to about \$100 per annum, ought to be supplied out of the Ordinary Revenue. The Board would recommend that for the future such expenditure form part of the ordinary expenses of the Congregation.

The Congregation having pledged itself to the support of the Elizabeth Street Mission, and the Committee entrusted with that work having expressed the desire that the expenditure in connection therewith should be controlled and provided for by the Board, it is recommended that the cost of this Mission (exclusive of Missionary's salary), being about \$300 annually, be provided for out of the Ordinary Revenue during the ensuing year.

A resolution will be submitted to the Congregational meeting having in view the adoption of a change in the mode of collecting for the Schemes of the Church.

It is estimated that the ordinary expenditure of the Congregation for 1888, increased by the sum of \$100 for the Sabbath School and \$300 for the Elizabeth Street Mission, will be about \$6,000, which will necessitate the collection of \$115.40 weekly.

In view of the increased charges upon the Ordinary Revenue, the Managers beg most respectfully to urge that greater liberality upon the part of the Congregation is absolutely necessary in order that all engagements during the ensuing year may be promptly met. They appeal very earnestly to every member and adherent who may be in a position to do so, to augment in some measure the contributions tendered during the past year, and to give this whole matter the thoughtful consideration it deserves. It is manifest that a warm and lively interest in all our Congregational work can be maintained only when every member and adherent realizes the weight of his individual responsibility and is trying to do his duty to the best of his ability.

The following Managers retire by rotation, but, with the exception of Mr. Hunter, who has retired from the Congregation, are eligible for re-election:—Messrs. Creelman, Donald, Jeffrey, Hunter, Miller, Paton, Stephens and Windrum.

REPORT OF THE MORTGAGE DEBT COMMITTEE.

ADOPTED AT THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONGREGATION,
HELD ON 9TH JANUARY, 1888.

The Committee appointed at the congregational meeting, held on the 31st day of January last, to deal with the question of the gradual reduction of the Mortgage Debt beg to report as follows:

Your Committee, at a meeting held in March last resolved that an effort should be made to raise the sum of \$1,000 during the past year towards the reduction of

the Mortgage Debt, and, at their instance, a meeting of the heads of families in the congregation was held in the church in April last for the purpose of securing an expression of opinion on the subject, and of agreeing upon a scheme for carrying into effect the resolution of the Committee.

At this meeting it was announced that the Managers had decided upon an expenditure during the year of upwards of \$1,000 in improvements upon the church property, and the general feeling of the meeting was in favour of giving priority to the scheme of the Managers, and your Committee deemed it advisable to defer to such feeling for a time at least.

At a later period of the year it was announced that the response of the congregation to the call of the Managers was not entirely successful, and that there was some doubt whether the amount required for improvements would be raised during the year.

Your Committee, thereupon, resolved that it was inadvisable to make any appeal to the congregation for money on account of the Mortgage Debt during 1887, and they now beg to report accordingly.

Your Committee would also report that they have on hand the sum of \$19.50 received from the Ladies' Aid Society to be applied as a first payment on account of the debt. It is hoped that this sum will be so applied on the 30th day of June next.

Your Committee would strongly recommend that during the year 1888 the sum of not less than \$1,000 be raised for the purpose of reducing the Mortgage Debt, so that \$500 may be paid on the 30th day of June, and \$500 on the 31st day of December next, with the half-yearly payments of interest.

Your Committee would also recommend that as soon as practicable after the congregational meeting, circular letters be sent to all contributors in the congregation, requesting them to state, upon a form to be enclosed with the circular, the amount which they will respectively give on or before the 17th day of June, and the 16th day of December, 1888, towards the reduction of such debt, and that shortly before such days the contributors be supplied with envelopes for the purpose of giving in their contributions by depositing the same on the plates as usual, upon the said dates at the morning or evening services.

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Your Committee would further recommend that during the ensuing year the collection of \$1,000, above mentioned, be made under the direction of the Board of Management.

SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT.

The Thirteenth Annual Report of the Sabbath School Teachers' Association is presented herewith.

The exhibit for the year is a satisfactory one, and the teachers have reason to thank God for the many blessings they have experienced during the past twelve months.

The figures representing the average attendance and number of scholars on the roll compare favourably with those of last year, being 161 and 210 respectively; while the amount of the Sunday collections for missions has been \$259.35, an excess in itself of \$19.30 over last year's receipts; but when there is added to this the sum of \$14.80, collected by the scholars through the agency of mite boxes, and a private contribution of \$3.45, the gratifying total of \$277.60 represents the efforts of the school in the direction of missions during the past year.

The scholars have agreed to pay for the support of a pupil at St. Paul's Institute, Tarsus, Asia Minor, and \$40.41 of the above mentioned total has been specially collected for that purpose.

For some years past the teachers have been dissatisfied with the condition of the Library, and a short time ago determined to take steps to replace the many old and well-read books at present on the shelves with new and standard Sabbath School literature. By means of a conversazione and collection in the church the sum of \$43 was realized, and this amount has been supplemented to such an extent by the kindness of several gentlemen in the congregation that there is now on hand about \$99, which will be immediately applied in making the desired reform.

The teachers have long looked forward to the time when, through the natural growth of the congregation, they might reasonably hope to be relieved of the trouble and anxiety incident to providing the ways and means for the satisfactory working of the school, and they trust the con-

gregation will agree with them in the view that this time has now arrived. A resolution has been submitted to the Managers requesting them to provide for the current expenses of the school out of the Ordinary Revenue Account of the church, and it is hoped the congregation will adopt the clause dealing with the matter, which will be presented in the Managers' Report.

It was with feelings of great regret that the teachers were compelled to accept the resignation of Mr. W. E. Murray, the old Superintendent of the school, on account of his removal to a considerable distance from the church. Mr. Murray was highly honoured and respected by every teacher on the staff, and the school has lost in his departure a faithful friend and counsellor.

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ANNUAL REPORT OF YOUNG MEN'S BIBLE CLASSES, 1887.

In presenting our annual report we must admit that while our classes have held their own in regard to attendance compared with the previous year, they are still much below what we should expect in such a congregation as ours. We would urge on every member the duty of making further personal efforts to increase the attendance by looking up former members and bringing in new ones.

The number on the roll of Mr. Macdonald's class is now 30, and the average attendance during the year has been 18. Mr. Gzowski's class has a roll of 20, with an average attendance of 17 during the 1st quarter, 15 during the 2nd, 9 during the 3rd, and 13 during the last, making an average attendance of 16 for the year. Our weekly collections have been liberal; the amount and the disposition made will be found in the Treasurer's report.

During the year three of our members have taken positions in the Sabbath school, and ten have either left the city or removed to other parts of it. Death has entered both of our classes, and taken suddenly away two of our most beloved companions—John J. Macallum, in the prime of his early manhood and usefulness, and Perley Macdonald. We are deeply thankful for the good hope we are able to entertain regarding them, that they have gone to be with Christ. Their sudden call is a loud-warning voice to us to be also ready for we know not the hour when the Master may call us.

We wish during the coming year to replenish our library, which has not for two or three years been in such a condition as our classes require. Some time since Prof. Loudon donated to the classes thirteen handsome volumes of the "Popular Encyclopædia"—a very useful collection of books.

In concluding we must again bear testimony to the self-sacrifice and devotion of Mr. Macdonald and Mr. Gzowski, shown in their constant attention to their classes; and to their one aim—that Christ might be taught, and by God's grace reign in every heart. May we all seek during the

ANNUAL REPORT OF YOUNG LADIES' BIBLE
CLASS FOR 1887.

We have reached another milestone on the road to that eternity to which we are all hastening, and as we pause for a brief glance at the path over which we have travelled during the past twelve months, we feel constrained to say from our hearts, the Lord has been very good to us.

There are at present 167 names on the roll, the largest number on any one Sunday being 127, and the smallest 27. The average attendance for the year is 89; the average for the first quarter is 99, for the second quarter 99, the third 77, and the fourth 89. It will be seen that the average attendance, and even the number of names on the roll, is less than in 1886, but this must not be considered any evidence of decrease of interest in the class. There are several reasons for the decrease, one of which is the fact that we have from time to time supplied the Sunday School with teachers, and one has taken a class permanently there. Two have taken classes in our Mission School, and one has been called to her heavenly home. The inclemency of the weather, the Union Sunday School Meeting, and two Young Women's Meetings held in connection with evangelistic services in the city, have also materially affected the attendance. Fourteen persons have united with Central Church through the Bible Class during the year, and several have joined other churches.

The regular collections in the year amounted to \$103.48. Special collections have been taken up from time to time, and voluntary contributions handed in. This is an evidence that the missionary spirit is developing in the hearts of the members, and that the precepts and example of our beloved teacher, bearing on this all-important subject, have not been thrown away.

REPORT OF LADIES' AID SOCIETY, 1887.

Our Ladies' Aid Society begs to offer to the congregation its seventh annual report—for 1887.

As we are requested, both from the pulpit and by the Managers to be *very* brief, we will endeavour to present all details in the shape of a telegraphic despatch.

During the past year 17 sewing meetings have been held; average attendance, 15; work completed—108 garments, 10 quilts, 10 caps, 11 muffs and 1 bonnet. Bags

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of clothing were lent to three poor women, and returned with many expressions of thankfulness.

The Doctors' lectures on "Emergencies," delivered last winter, in the Lecture Room, were a great financial success, and were highly appreciated by those ladies privileged to attend them, \$114.20 was realized, and out of this sum, our Society handed over \$25 to Dr. Wishart for the Dispensary on Elizabeth street, \$55 to Mr. McIntosh for the Mission Sunday school, and \$25 to Mrs. Stephens for the Mothers' Meetings. During the summer a gift of \$25 was sent to friends in sorrow.

Our Society would again ask for contributions to the tea given weekly at the Mothers' Meetings. Some friends having removed from our church, we would gladly fill the vacancies from our many new members if they will kindly favour us with their names. The cost of supplying the weekly tea is 50 cents, and this is only required from each about once during the year.

Again most gratefully we acknowledge the handsome gift of a large box of materials, from our friend Mr. R. W. Spence, a liberal supply of tea and sugar from Mr. Donald, Sr., 50 yards crimson cloth for the church railing, from Mrs. Creelman, and donations of money and clothing from many kind friends. Also we thank the Session and congregation for placing at our disposal \$31.19, the collection on Thanksgiving Day, which has encouraged and enabled us to go forward cheerfully and with renewed vigour to our winter's work amongst the poor of our church and mission.

CENTRAL CHURCH TRACT SOCIETY: THIRD ANNUAL REPORT.

The district allotted our church for mission work is that lying between College Avenue and Queen Street, and Elizabeth and University Streets. This year it was thought desirable to condense the work; accordingly the districts were subdivided, and the distribution of the tracts confined

to the streets Room. to the streets in the immediate vicinity of the Mission Room. The number of distributors has decreased from thirty-seven to thirty. Two withdrew on account of illness, three have removed from the city, and the remaining two are fully occupied with other work. Many of the distributors are engaged in domestic service, or are in other ways earning a livelihood, and the time given to the work is taken from the few hours afforded these toilers, weekly, for rest or recreation. The workers are continually encouraged by the eagerness with which the tracts are taken from their hands, and with which the words of comfort, advice, or encouragement are received from their lips; but especially are they cheered by the increasing interest in the religious services held at the Mission. Frequently the visitors go to the houses and accompany those willing to go to the Thursday or Sunday night service. The meetings of the Society are held monthly, the average attendance has been nine, the largest twenty-two, the smallest five. Many poor families have been relieved through the visitors reporting to the City Relief and other societies, and at Christmas the President distributed several tickets for the dinner provided by the St. George's Society. These tickets were contributed by a number of the Young Women's Bible Class.

We desire most heartily to thank the physicians on duty at the Dispensary for their prompt attention to the cases brought under their notice; also to the Ladies' Aid Society for their supply of clothing, and to Mrs. Harvie's Bible class for a large portion of the money required for the purchase of tracts.

In closing our report, we mention for the encouragement of others, that this work has not been without visible results, as one of the young women now engaged with us as a tract distributor was led to the Lord Jesus through the visit of one of our workers. We therefore go forward, scattering the good seed of the Word, believing that some of it will fall into good ground.

REPORT OF THE ELIZABETH ST. MISSION.

In this, the seventh annual report of the Mission, we wish to express our deep thankfulness to God for His manifold blessings on every part of our work throughout the past year. During the year all sections of the work have been extended, and we believe that our efforts to save precious souls have been more successful.

The Sabbath school has largely increased. At present there are on the roll 110 scholars and 19 teachers and officers. The average daily attendance during the year was 73 scholars and 15 teachers. The lowest attendance was 55 scholars and 12 teachers, and the highest 102 and 18 respectively. This is larger and more encouraging than last year, and is chiefly due to the work of the teachers and visitors. Our larger pupils cause us much anxiety, as we are unable to retain our hold on them, and we feel that something is needed in the shape of a good and instructive library to attract them.

The interest in our Sabbath evening meetings is increasing. From fifty to seventy-five attend, including quite a

The Band of Hope is doing much good among the children, even more than last year.

Mr. John Forster, who has been working in the North-West Mission Field, has returned, and will help us in the work of visiting.

We wish to thank the kind friends who have contributed to the carrying on of the work, especially those who supplied the articles for the annual Christmas Tree.

The cry for help is still to be heard, and during the present year we hope to be enabled by God's blessing to do yet more in advancing Christ's Kingdom in this corner of His vineyard.

BANK—SECOND ANNUAL REPORT.

ADOPTED AT GENERAL MEETING, JANUARY 11.

The Directors have reason to congratulate themselves upon the satisfactory progress achieved by the Bank during the past year. The position the Bank has attained, your Secretary believes, is a permanent one, and that too, without any great personal labour and trouble on the part of the management. It can be safely stated that every member of the staff has used his utmost exertions on behalf of the Bank and its interests, whenever called upon to do so.

In addition to the information contained in the Treasurer's statement, it might be mentioned that we have about 400 accounts; of these, there are 270 to which we owe balances. Again, of these 270, there are over 100 to which we owe less than one dollar (\$1), and whose accounts generally verge on that amount. Although the balance on

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hand per statement is \$891.41, there was considerably over \$1,000 balance just prior to Christmas.

The great increase in the Bank's business will necessitate the erection of a permanent counter immediately in the school building. It will be necessary also to buy some new books during next year. With these expenditures in view it will be necessary to devise ways and means to provide therefor. If the Church Managers will undertake the alterations, there is no doubt but that the Bank will be able to buy all the books it will require.

REPORT OF THE ELIZABETH STREET DISPENSARY FOR DISEASES OF WOMEN.

This work of charity has attained an eminent degree of success, amply demonstrating the pressing necessity which existed for an institution of the kind.

During the past eleven months 190 new patients have been enrolled, while the entries on the Day Book for the same period number 475, so that the figures of the previous year have been more than doubled. As before, many patients have been visited at their homes, while eight have been operated upon successfully at the Sisterhood of St. John the Divine by various members of the staff. From all this will easily be seen the amount of good effected by this Dispensary.

Having the entire management placed in their own hands at your last annual meeting, the staff have been enabled in various ways to enlarge their field of work and to increase its efficiency, and are pleased to be able to state that the finances are in a satisfactory condition.

Being desirous to avoid infringement upon the field of work of the General Dispensary on Simcoe Street, your staff, as far as possible, confine themselves to their special line of disease, referring all general cases to the above institution; an exception, however, is made in favour of all persons connected with the Mission or recommended by the *District Visitors*.

Feeling the necessity for the presence of some capable female attendant, the staff resolved in the Fall to enlist the services of the final students at the Woman's Medical School, and they are pleased to find that, after a three months' trial, the new arrangement has proved eminently satisfactory, while the funds of the Dispensary are materially aided by the fees of the students.

Through the kindness of Mr. Cryderman, the successor of Mr. Meldrum, the arrangements of last year for the supply of medicines at a reduced rate have been continued, and thanks are also due to Mr. A. Jeffrey, who generously fills, free of charge, the prescriptions for any deserving cases.

The thanks of the staff are further due to Mr. J. Ross Robertson of the *Evening Telegram* for an advertisement

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inserted daily free of charge; to the Committee of Management of the Mission for the free use of their rooms; and to the many kind friends who have assisted the work financially.

REPORT OF THE CENTRAL PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH MISSIONARY ASSOCIATION.

In presenting their report the committee feel there is ground for encouragement in what has been accomplished, but at the same time they are deeply sensible that what has been done is very far short of the possibilities of a congregation like Central Church. They would thankfully acknowledge the goodness of God for the measure of success attained, and earnestly hope there may be from year to year steady progress, and that very many tokens of gratitude for the abounding mercy of God in giving to us the Gospel Message will be forthcoming from amongst us.

The following amounts have been collected during the year:—

In the case of the Bible Classes, Sabbath School, and Elizabeth Street Mission, partial appropriations have been made. In the first to the extent of \$112.65, and in the second \$90.45, and the last, the sum of \$311.25 has been paid direct to the Superintendent. There has also been an expense of \$50.25 for the *Record*, and \$3 has been paid for postal cards, leaving the net amount of \$1,326.48. This sum should be available for distribution, but owing to a

portion of the moneys collected for the Schemes of the Church having been used in meeting the obligations of the Elizabeth Street Mission in the earlier part of the year, and which should have been repaid from the fund specially collected for the Mission, or especially donated by the Bible Classes and Sabbath School, the committee find the sum of \$100 not available, at least for the present. This rather unfortunate state of affairs would have been avoided had all missionary moneys been paid in to the Treasurer of the Association. The committee desires to impress upon the various organizations collecting money for missionary purposes the desirability of passing all such moneys through the Treasurer of the Missionary Association. If, in connection with that, the friends will contribute their missionary money throughout the year instead of in one sum at or near its close, they will not only find it possibly less taxing, but will enable the Treasurer to pay over the moneys to the Agent of the Church from month to month, and save anxiety as to ways and means on the part of that officer and conveners of committees. It would also reduce the payment of interest for advances necessary to carry on the work of the Assembly committees.

The committee also recommend that the sum now available be apportioned as set forth in the Treasurer's report appended hereto, and while expressing their deep regret that they cannot come up to the sum asked by the Presbytery for Augmentation, they hope that the sum due from the Elizabeth Street Mission will be paid in sufficient time to send it to the Agent of the Church before the closing of the Assembly's accounts, on April 30th next.

The committee also recommend that the payment for the *Record* out of moneys contributed for the Schemes of the Church be discontinued, and that an effort be made to have them paid for by the several households into which they go. The price is only 25 cents, and the committee think the *Record* will be more appreciated and read if paid for by the readers.

The members of the Association will find in the list appended an acknowledgment of the money paid by them under the heading of the fund to which it was donated by the giver. It is thought that this will form a ready and convenient receipt.

Reference has already been made to the fact that much

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more than has been accomplished is possible to a congregation like ours, and it will possibly help to a better realization of that fact if it be stated that—while there may be some who are contributing through one of the organizations of the congregation—out of a list of 286, chiefly heads of families, there are only 168 contributors. Surely this state of things cannot mean that the non-contributors have no due sense of gratitude for the blessings of the Gospel which they themselves enjoy, or that they are utterly indifferent to the needs of the Home Mission Field, or of the hundreds of millions of heathen perishing without the Gospel? And yet, if it be not so, where is the gratitude, and when shall we look for the evidences of interest in the perishing millions who have not heard of “Jesus and His Love”? And can it be said of those who have contributed, that they have reached the limit of their ability or formed a right estimate of the value of their blessings at home, or that they have attained to a proper measure of the responsibility resting upon them to send the Gospel into all the earth? No, that cannot be said, for doubtless all have come short. May we not hope that the membership may go on increasing till all in the congregation are members, and are found in active loving sympathy with Christ’s Work, giving—not grudging, but freely, and following their gifts with their prayers.

One of our families, desiring to associate the memory of a dear son, called home during the year, with the Foreign Mission Work, decided to pay the salary of a native helper, under Mr. Robertson, in Eromanga, in which Mission he had been greatly interested. The committee requested that it might be done through this Association, and ready consent was given, and the amount of the first year’s salary paid. Immediate steps will be taken to secure a native worker, to be known as the “Perley Macdonald native helper.”

The committee would express their sincere thanks to the lady collectors, and ask for a continuance of their kind services.

They would also make earnest appeal to all in the congregation to consider more faithfully the claims of this branch of our congregational work, and would express the hope that the closing of 1888 will find a largely increased membership and a more hearty response. They ask the

thoughtful consideration of the value of even one soul —“ For what shall it profit a man if he shall gain the whole world, *and lose his own soul?* Or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul? ” A whole world insufficient to ransom one soul, and yet, but the other day, suddenly, as in a moment, 750,000 poor soul-neglected Chinese pass from time into eternity. Fellow-Christians, what are we doing?
