TAKEN IN THE

ST. GEORGE STREET CHURCH, ST. THOMAS, ONT.,

JUNE 5TH TO 12TH.

ORGANIZATION OF THE CONFERENCE.

CONFERENCE opened on WEDNESDAY, June 5th, at 9 a.m.
The Rev. JAMES GRAY, President of the Conference, in
the Chair.

The 478th Hymn was sung, the Rev. JOHN B. CLARKSON,
M.A., Secretary of the Conference, read part of the 33rd
chapter of Ezekiel, and the 3rd chapter of the First Epistle to
Timothy, after which the Rev. S. D. RICE, D.D., and the
Rev. ALEX. LANGFORD led in prayer.

The SECRETARY called the roll, and One Hundred and
Seventy answered to their names.

Who have Died ?

1.—GEORGE MCNAMARA.

George McNamara was born in the year 1811, in the County of Mayo, Ireland, and died in Arthur on the 3rd of August, 1877. His parents were Roman Catholics, and from his infancy intended him for the priesthood. He was sent to Maynooth College, and there he graduated ; but after being a Romish Priest for about eight years, he was, by a remarkable circumstance, convinced of the errors of Popery, and became a convert to the Protestant faith. He entered the Ministry of the Church of England, and spent about five years therein. In 1848 he was married to Eleanor Pinkerton, of Crosmolina, and shortly after they emigrated to the United States, and there in a class-meeting he first experienced the converting grace of God. He travelled in that country for several years in connection with the Methodist Episcopal Church, but in 1857 he removed to this country, and entered the Ministry of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, and for nineteen years continued an earnest and self-sacrificing Minister of Christ. Last winter he had a serious fall and thereby sustained severe injury, but was just recovering from said accident when a serious illness overtook him, and a deep impression was made on his mind from the first that he would not recover. This, however, caused him no regret, for when asked by his sorrowing wife if he was prepared, he said—"There is not the shadow of doubt." He further said—"You should all be rejoicing rather than sorrowing, for I will be there to welcome you when you come."

His illness was short, but severe, yet he was cheerful to the last. His faith was strong, his prospects bright, his peace deep and abiding. He was unassuming, pleasant, an accomplished scholar, a kind husband and father, and a devoted pastor. He leaves behind him a worthy and interesting family of five sons and three daughters, whom with his "latest breath" he commended to God. "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of his saints."

2.—PETER KER.

Peter Ker was born in the Township of Grantham, Lincoln county, Ontario. He was converted to God in the eighteenth year of his age, under the ministry of the Rev. J. Ryerson, and, with several members of his family, united with the Methodist Church. From this time his piety was progressive, increasing with his years, wean-

ing him more and more from the world, and drawing him nearer and nearer to God, giving him a hungering and a thirsting after righteousness, and creating a burning thirst for the souls of others. In 1833 he entered upon the work of the ministry. His journal states, "After taking an affectionate farewell, I went forth, not knowing whither I went, and from that time I have been trying to preach Christ and Him crucified, feeling as though I would not change my situation for any other, however pleasant in life."

In reviewing the list of circuits travelled by him, we find Simcoe, Brantford, Ancaster, Hamilton, Toronto, Brampton, Markham, testifying at once to his favour among his brethren, and success among the people. With only a blank of two years, viz., 1854-55, he continued in active work until 1860, when he superannuated and settled in Drummondville. During his superannuate relation he continued his labours as far as required and possible, in the pulpits of his own and neighbouring circuits, also for some time acting as Agent for the "Upper Canada Tract Society." He was always a willing helper and a faithful friend to the superintendent in charge. His journal contains the following resolution, one worthy of imitation: "Not to speak evil of the gifts of another. This is an evil I have frequently run into, by the assisting grace of God I will amend from this time."

As a preacher he was solid but not brilliant, practical not speculative, ever aiming at leading men to Christ, and satisfying the longings of his heart in doing good to others. As we peruse his journal we feel in the presence of a man lying low before God, seeking to be raised to a higher and holier atmosphere. In his latter days his love for the house and ordinances of God greatly increased. He had strong attachments for his class-meeting, which was enriched by his mellow experience ripening for heaven. In repeated visits, during his last illness, his pastor found him "leaning on the arm of the beloved." His mind was clear, his faith firm, his hopes bright, and his desires apostolic—"To depart and be with Christ." He said to his elder brother shortly before his death: "You are older than I, but I shall get over before you," and would frequently say, "Almost over! almost over!" His last words were: "They walk with him in white."

On the 8th of April last, in the 69th year of his age and the 44th year of his Ministry, he rested from his labours, and fell asleep in Jesus, to enjoy, we doubt not, an abundant entrance into the everlasting kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

3.—SABBATH SCHOOL.

Your Committee is thankful to be able to report success in this department of Church work.

There is an increase during the year of 27 schools, 361 teachers, and 3,204 scholars.

The total number of scholars is 43,463, and the number studying the catechism is 7,266. This is 20 per cent. in advance of last year, a *step* in the right direction, but we hope the time is not distant when all our scholars shall unite in thus studying the doctrines of our Church.

It is with pleasure that we report upwards of 1,500 conversions, and also a marked increase in the number attending class.

Perhaps the most unsatisfactory part of the District returns, is that which tabulates the circulation of our Sabbath-school periodicals. Your Committee, recognizing the success of recent efforts to popularize these publications, would strongly urge all our Sabbath-schools to give a moer hearty support to the literature furnished by our own Church.

We would again urge the importance of regular teachers' meetings for the study of the lessons—the value of such weekly gatherings can scarcely be over-estimated. And if in addition to these, Normal Classes for the study of Bible evidences, and Sabbath-school methods, similar to those introduced at this Conference by Rev. A. Andrews and Rev. W. C. Henderson, could be widely established, a great impetus would be given to the systematic study of God's Word.

Your Committee is pleased to find that the District conventions, wherever held, have been a great benefit, and hopes that the special advantages of these denominational gatherings will lead to their adoption in every District within the bounds of our Conference.

Considerable difficulty has been experienced by your Committee in tabulating the statistics, by the incomplete manner in which some of the returns have been made; we therefore recommend that in the future more attention be given to the disciplinary regulation requiring that the schedules be read in the Quarterly Official Boards and District Meetings.

We present the following tabular statement, and suggest the name of our Secretary as the corresponding member of the General Sabbath-school Board, and that of the Rev. George Brown for Treasurer.

the Conference when the party implicated applied for his certificate of standing as a Minister of our body, the Conference would have been justified in withholding such certificate until the party concerned had consented to an honourable settlement with the local authorities of our Church in Windsor."

2.—MODEL DEED.

Respecting the Memorial from the London District recommending that the Schedule of the Model Deed Act relating to the registration of new Trustees be printed in our Minutes of Conference, the Committee would suggest that such recommendation be adopted.

EXTRACTS FROM MODEL DEED, AS PER RESOLUTION OF CONFERENCE.

1. From and after the passing of this Act the trustees of the several congregations in Ontario of the Methodist Church of Canada and of the Churches heretofore known as the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Canada in connection with the English Conference and the Methodist New Connexion Church of Canada, by whatever name they may hold the lands conveyed to them under deeds containing trusts, provisions, conditions and agreements differing from those which are set out in the said Model Deed as altered by this Act, may register in the Registry Office of the county where the lands so held by them respectively are situated, a declaration signed by a majority of the said trustees in the form or to the effect of that set out in the third schedule to this Act, and thereupon the lands described in said declaration shall be held by them as such trustees by the name set out in said declaration, under and upon the like trusts and for the purposes and under the directions and provisions of the Model Deed aforesaid as altered by this Act and set out in the first and second schedules hereto annexed, for such and the same ends, uses, intents and purposes, and with, under and subject to such and the same powers, provisions, declarations, and agreements, and to be controlled, disposed of, and managed by the like authorities, officers, trustees and persons appointed and to be appointed, and acting in the same manner, and with the same duties, powers, liabilities, and restrictions, in every particular and respect as are expressed, contained, and declared, or referred to in the said Model Deed as altered by this Act, and set out in the first and second schedules hereto annexed; saving always such right as may have been acquired by any person or corporation prior to the passing of this Act. The fee payable to the Registrar for the registration of such declaration, including all entries and certificates thereof, shall be fifty cents.

2. That the provisions of the said Model Deed shall be altered as appears by the words in italics in the paragraphs

numbered twenty-one and twenty-two, respectively, in the said schedule, so as to enable the trustees of each of the congregations, holding or to hold under said Model Deed from, time to time to add to their number, and to declare vacancies occasioned by resignation, removal to a distance, or other disabilities, and the appointment of a new trustee or trustees, or of a successor or successors, shall be evidenced by a declaration signed by the surviving or remaining trustee or trustees, or a majority of them, or by the quarterly meeting, where the appointment is made by the said quarterly meeting, or by a majority of the said quarterly meeting, in the form set out in the fourth schedule hereto annexed, to be registered in the Registry Office in which the lands held under the deed under which said appointment is made, is situate, and upon registration of which the said new trustee or trustees, successor or successors, shall have in perpetual succession the same capacities, powers, right, duties, estates and interests, as are given to the trustees in and by such deed: And the fee to be charged for registering said declaration, including all entries and certificates thereof, shall be fifty cents.

THIRD SCHEDULE.

DECLARATION made in pursuance of Section One of an Act passed in in the thirty-fifth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, and chaptered 107, and as amended by the Act passed in the thirty-eighth year of Her Majesty's reign, entitled "An Act respecting the Methodist Church of Canada," and chaptered 78.

The number of children to be provided for is 497, to meet whose claims the rate of 38 cents per member, including those on trial, is recommended. The amount resulting is not, of itself, sufficient for the requirements of the year, but the deficiency will be more than met by the surplus funds on hand.

Resolution 1st.—Resolved that to ensure correctness in the payment of claims upon the Children's Fund, the Committee respectfully recommend the Conference to direct the Financial Secretaries to prepare a list of all the names and ages of minister's children on their respective districts, and forward the same to the treasurer of the fund immediately after the Financial District meetings; and the treasurer shall at the earliest opportunity examine the same and certify to the correctness of said returns. And according to such lists only shall payments be made at the next district meeting.

Resolution 2nd.—Whereas a number of superannuated ministers have been transferred to this Conference, some of whom have children who are claimants on the Children's Fund, and as no law exists to determine what Conference shall pay the claims of children so transferred ;—

And whereas this is not, like the Superannuated Preachers' Fund, a General Conference fund, but supported by the assessments laid upon the membership of the respective Conferences :—

It is resolved, That this Conference be recommended to ask the General Conference to enact the following or some other suitable regulation to protect the Children's Fund in each Conference from being burdened by claimants who have come in from other Conferences, viz. :—

“That the Children's Fund of any Conference in which any minister may die or be superannuated, shall be liable for the claims of his children, into whatever part of the work he may subsequently be transferred.”

It is recommended that the present treasurer be re-appointed.

6.—TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee beg to submit the following Report :—

That we reaffirm our Total Abstinence principles and publish them to the world.

That owing to the widespread and desolating evils of intemperance, we pledge ourselves to renewed and united effort in behalf of the principles and practices of Total Abstinence from all the intoxicating drinks which so fearfully curse both Church and State.

That we as a Conference recognize with gratitude improved recent legislation upon the subject of Temperance, and desire most ardently to see the country free from the evils of tippling and drunkenness, inasmuch as they seriously obstruct the progress of the Gospel, cripple the finances of the Dominion; entail untold miseries upon the families subject to their domination, and destroy the bodies and souls of men.

That our people be urged to adopt and enforce existing laws for the suppression of intemperance.

That we are convinced the evils of intemperance will more or less continue until the traffic is destroyed, and the traffic will never be destroyed until the laws upon the statute-book of our country, that legalize the manufacture and sale of intoxicating drinks, are repealed. Therefore we will assist in the furtherance of every legitimate effort to secure a Dominion Prohibitory law.

That the Temperance revival, now so rapidly spreading and producing such happy results in this and other lands, is evidence that the permanent reformation of the drunkard requires Gospel influence and power, thus showing this to be an important branch of the Church's work.

We would recommend that the work of organizing Juvenile Temperance Associations in connection with our Sunday-schools, so successfully going forward on many of our Circuits, should be prosecuted with increased energy until the thousands of our Sunday-school children are banded together on the principles of entire abstinence from intoxicating liquor.

We recommend that each minister and preacher be required to preach at least once during the year in each congregation upon the Temperance question.

We gratefully acknowledge the good effected in the field of Temperance by the numerous organizations amongst us, founded upon Temperance principles, and the many energetic

and successful workers in our ministry, and out of it, who are aiding us in this Christ-like labour.

We recommend none but pure unfermented juice of the grape to be used (where practicable) in the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

HAMILTON CITY, SIMCOE STREET.—That the Trustees of the old Simcoe Street Church Hamilton, have liberty to sell, or otherwise dispose of the same, and apply the proceeds to the new Church.

WEST FLAMBORO'.—That the Trustees of the West Flamboro' Church property have permission to sell the same and apply the proceeds to the building of a new Church in that village.

NIAGARA DISTRICT.

THOROLD CIRCUIT.—That Conference sanction the sale of the old Church property at Allanburgh, proceeds to be applied in obtaining a more eligible lot alongside the new Church.

BEAMSVILLE CIRCUIT (Thirty Mile Creek).—That the Trustees of the Frame Church at Thirty Mile Creek, Beamsville Circuit, have permission to sell the Church and devote the proceeds to repairing the brick Church in the same neighbourhood.

JORDAN VILLAGE.—That in regard to the proposed sale of the former New Connexion Church in Jordan Village, the Conference take no action for the present.

TINTERN CHURCH.—Whereas the indebtedness of the Tintern Church, Beamsville Circuit, was incurred in bringing a test case before the Courts, and was with the sanction of the Conference authorities, we recommend it to the most favourable consideration of the Contingent Fund Committee.

SALEM AND PORT DALHOUSIE CIRCUIT.—That the Trustees of Gregory Church have permission to sell it and apply the proceeds toward paying the debt on the new Church.

That the Trustees of the said Church have permission to reconvey the lot upon which the old Church stands to Philip A. Gregory, the former donor of the same.

BRANTFORD DISTRICT.

HARLEY CIRCUIT.—That the Trustees of Bethel Church lot have permission to sell the same and apply the proceeds toward liquidating the debt on the Kelvin Church property.

DELHI.—That the Trustees of the Church property in Delhi have permission to sell a lot lying at some distance from the parsonage and apply the proceeds to the purchase of a lot adjacent to the parsonage.

LONDON DISTRICT.

LONDON SOUTH CIRCUIT.—That the Trustees of the old parsonage on the London South Circuit have permission to sell the same and apply the proceeds in building a new parsonage on a more eligible site.

LONDON NORTH CIRCUIT.—That the Trustees of the parsonage of the London North Circuit have permission to sell the same and apply the proceeds to the erection of a new parsonage at Birr.

LONDON NORTH CIRCUIT.—That permission be granted to the Trustees of the Bethel Church, London North Circuit, to sell the same, the proceeds to be applied in meeting the amount apportioned to the neighbourhood for the erection of a new parsonage at Birr, and the balance to the Church at Ebenezer appointment.

LUCAN.—That the Trustees of the Lucan Church have permission to sell the lot on which the Church has hitherto stood and apply the proceeds in defraying the expense of moving the building to a more eligible site already acquired.

CENTRALIA CIRCUIT.—That the Trustees of the Fairfield parsonage lot have permission to convey the same to Mr. David Elliott, the former donor thereof, and to sell the buildings to him on terms agreed upon.

CHATHAM DISTRICT.

BLENHEIM.—In regard to the memorial from the Blenheim Quarterly Meeting, with reference to the "Dolsen Church Lot," the Committee recommends that whereas the facts referred to in the said memorial are not fully in possession of the Conference, no action be taken.

GUELPH DISTRICT.

ELORA.—That the Trustees of the old Parsonage, Elora, have permission to sell the same and apply the proceeds in the purchase of a new Parsonage.

GALT.—That the Trustees of the Galt Church have permission to sell the Church lot, the proceeds to be applied to the purchase of a new lot, and the erection of a new Church.

NEW HAMBURG.—That the Trustees of the old Church lot at Capling's appointment, New Hamburg, have permission to sell that part of said lot on Huron Road not occupied by graves, about three-fourths of an acre, and apply the proceeds to the erection of a shed on the new Church lot.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR THEOLOGICAL SCHOOLS.

First Year.—Theology, Introductory Lectures; Church History to the Reformation; the Elements of the Greek Language; Logic; Analytical Study of the Grammatical Forms of the English Language; Rhetoric, with Exercises in Composition and Elocution.

Second Year.—Systematic Theology continued; History of the Reformation; the Greek Language; Exegesis of the New Testament, commencement; Metaphysics; Physiology or Hebrew; Homiletics, with Exercises in Elocution.

Third Year.—Theology, History of Doctrines and Church Polity; Exegesis of the New Testament; Ethics; Natural Science or Hebrew; English Literature; Homiletics with Practical Exercises.

The Professor of Theology in each college may vary the literary part of the course wherever, upon examination, the attainments of the student render it expedient.

COURSE FOR CANDIDATES FOR THE GERMAN WORK.

All Candidates before being recommended to Conference to be received on trial, shall pass a satisfactory examination in the following subjects:—

Nast's Larger Catechism; the Calverin Church History; the Discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada; Elements of German Grammar.

After admission they shall be examined each year during their probation, as follows:—

First Year.—Jacoby's Comments of Doctrines and Scripture Proofs; Wesley's Sermons, Vol. i.; Hare on Jurisdiction; Kurtz's Sacred History; Webster's General History; Wurst's Grammar.

Second Year.—Wesley's Sermons, Vol. ii.; Wesley's Christian Perfection; Fletcher's Appeal; Sauer's Church History; Wurst's Grammar.

Third Year.—Nast's Introduction to the New Testament; Lisco's Exposition of the Creed; Nast's Wesley and his Coadjutor's; Pearson on Infidelity; Ahn's First Course of English.

Fourth Year.—Warren's Logic; Luthard's Apologetics; Harless' Christian Ethics; Ahn's Second Course of English.

The Candidates shall present a written sermon each year on some subject embraced in the course of study for that year.

The Board of Examination report the following:—

That in the preliminary course one hour be allowed for each paper on the subjects embraced in the course.

That we strongly disapprove of the practice of taking more subjects than those embodied within the year's course, except in the case of those who are taken into the work by the Chairman during the year, who may take the preliminary and first year's course.

The Meeting of the Board, for the examination of Probationers and Candidates, shall be held in the Methodist Church, Ingersoll, at 9 a.m. of the last Wednesday in April, 1879.

MODE OF EXAMINATION.

Candidates for our ministry and probationers shall be examined by means of printed papers prepared by the respective Examiners.

There shall also be an oral examination if required.

In addition to the usual thorough Theological Examination of Candidates before the District Meeting, the Chairman shall examine each Candidate as to his Studies and General Reading for the year, with a view to giving advice as to his course and method of study. No Candidate shall be allowed the year of probation until the studies for that year are completed.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING CANDIDATES.

Every person before being received as a full Local Preacher shall have previously laboured at least three months as an Exhorter, and three months on trial as a Local Preacher; and no Candidate for our Itinerancy shall be recommended by a Quarterly Meeting to a District Meeting, who has not laboured at least three months as a full Local Preacher.

No Candidate shall be recommended by any District Meeting, to be received on trial for that year, who does not produce a certificate from the Examining Committee of the District to which he belongs. But the cases of all young men on trial shall be reported to their respective District Meetings.

All recommendations of Candidates to be received on trial shall be made at the February Quarterly Official Meeting, and the Candidates recommended shall appear before the next meeting of the Examining Committee of the District to which they belong.

The District Meeting shall require the Superintendent of the Circuit, from which any young man is recommended to be received on trial, to give a written statement of his religious character, talents and usefulness, educational advantages and acquirements, employment and means of support, and such other particulars as the meeting may deem necessary ; which statement shall be signed by him and recorded in the District Book.

If in any given year the number of Candidates recommended by the District Meeting shall be greater than the Stationing Committee deem it prudent to employ for that year, the Examining Board shall meet at Conference, and determine who are the most suitable to be employed in our Itinerant work, and who are to be placed on the List of Reserve ; being governed by their own class lists and those of the District Meetings.

The District Meeting shall examine, as heretofore, all the Candidates in regard to their religious experience and belief of our doctrines, together with their general qualifications and suitability for our Itinerant work, and shall arrange them in three classes, according to the results of the Examination.

The Conference requires Candidates for our Ministry to preach a Trial Sermon before the District Meeting by which they are recommended, or before a Committee appointed by the District Meeting, who shall report their opinion on the sermon, and embody it in the recommendation of such Candidate to the Conference.

Nothing in our present Course of Study shall be understood to prevent a District Meeting, in special cases, from recommending a Candidate to the Conference for reception on trial, after examination by the Chairman, before the District Meeting, on the subject of the preliminary Course of Study.

THE ANNUAL ADDRESS
OF THE
LONDON CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST
CHURCH OF CANADA
TO THE
CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

BELOVED BRETHREN,—

WE have you in our heart. All your interests are dear to us. Many an anxious hour have we spent in Conference for your sakes. To care for all the flock, to feed the Church of God, till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ, is the charge given us by the Holy Ghost. In the fulfilment of this trust, feeling its responsibilities as never before, knit to you anew, desiring most earnestly your present and eternal good, we come to you again in this our Annual Address.

We turn first to the lambs of the flock. Little children we write unto you. You have been much in our thoughts and conversations. We receive you as graciously given us of God—our most precious heritage. We open to you, not only our hearts and homes, but the house of God. God Himself has given you a place among His people. We

rejoice to see you where Jesus when a child was found, in the temple—in the “*midst*” of the teachers.

We are doing all we can for your good. Very large and very joyous meetings—meetings made up of hundreds of parents and children—are being held throughout the land, and all for your good. Thousands of teachers are trying to teach you the good and the right way. Large sums of money are given every year to buy for your Sabbath-schools all the needed helps. Vast numbers of books and papers are coming to you every week filled with the best things we can put in them. All these are seed-sowers sent forth by our blessed Lord to sow in your hearts in the morning of life the good seed of the kingdom. Jesus is speaking to you through books, and teachers, and parents and pastors; through these He is calling,—Come unto Me—to my love—to my keeping—to my service. Does God Himself really and truly call us children to His service? Is it not the voice of a man only? So thought the child Samuel at the first. He arose and went to Eli. But Eli had not called him. “He perceived that the Lord had called the child.” And now, little children, abide in Him, that when “He shall appear, we may have confidence, and not be ashamed before Him at His coming.”

We write unto you, young men. In you are centering dearly cherished hopes. You have overcome the wicked one. You have shown yourselves strong in the grace that is in Christ Jesus. We have been greatly cheered and strengthened by your warm sympathy and hearty co-operation. We thank God upon every remembrance of you. We gratefully record here our appreciation of the varied and valuable services rendered the Church by our young people. But what of the future? Shall the Word of God abide in you? Will you earnestly contend for the faith once delivered unto the saints? Art thou but a youth and thy foe a man of war? God has called you to do battle for Him; He has anointed you to the service. Let no man despise thy youth. Be true to thyself and thy trust. Covet not Saul's armour.

Keep to your own. Fight with weapons to which you are used. There are often openings in armed evil for a pebble when there are none for more pretentious weapons. God's glory is best shown in great victories gotten by little things. The simple sling and stone are mighty through God to the pulling down of strong men, as well as strong-holds. The stripling sets his foot on the giant's neck.

Never were the youth of our Church more in danger from the world than now. The man of sin, full of craft and cunning, is amongst us in the guise of amusements. We must have recreations or wear out before the work is done. The bow always bent loses its spring. We do not forget your years and the life that is in keeping. Everything in its order. We ask for nothing out of season. We rejoice to see you as full of life and song as the buds and birds of spring. But we watch for your souls as those who must give account; we warn you of danger. "Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world. For all that is in the world, the lust of the flesh, and the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life, is not of the Father, but is of the world."

We ask you to stand guard with us over the "garden of God." Keep out everything hurtful in itself or in its associations; accept only those things that are helpful, as well as harmless. The mother of the Wesleys when asked by her sons what recreations were hurtful, replied, "All those that destroy your relish for spiritual things." Engage in nothing upon which you cannot ask the blessing of God.

We write unto you fathers. We do not forget in reviewing the year that you have been sharers with us in bearing the burden and heat of the day. If you had not held up our hands when we cried unto God in the day of conflict, the battle had gone sore against Israel. "We give thanks to God always for you all, making mention of you in our prayers, remembering without ceasing your work of faith and labour of love and patience of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ."

We are deeply humbled over our failures; we have far from accomplished all we set before us at the beginning of the year—far from what God's Word promised; and yet we rejoice to tell you that our united labours have not been altogether in vain. After filling up vacancies occasioned by removals, defections, and deaths, we are able to report an addition of nearly six hundred names to the membership of our Church. Rejoice with us that so many of the lost have been found. Let this proof of God's presence and power in our midst inspire us with new faith and hope! Let us now, while these evidences are fresh and our gratitude lively, consecrate ourselves anew to our work, fully resolved to return at the close of this year, bringing with us a far larger number of those who were lost! Notwithstanding the sore straits in money matters to which many of you have been brought, you will be glad to know that our missionary income has not only been kept up, but increased thirteen hundred dollars. We thank you for this fresh proof of your faith and zeal in the Church's most important work. From the first, Methodism has been a missionary movement. Our venerated Founder claimed the world as his parish, and, like the Master, he went about doing good. These broad, Christly sympathies and aims have been the secret of our strength, the glory of our Church. Never were there so many open doors to preach the gospel; never so many earnest cries for help. Labourers are ready, but means are lacking. More, a heavy debt already burdens our Missionary Board. What shall we do? It is yours to answer. Shall we say to these men called of God to this work, we cannot send you? Shall we recall the men already in the field, settled and successful? Whom shall we bring back? What field give up? None. God forbid we should ever go back!

We commend to your most serious consideration our Educational Interests.

Our country has come to a most critical time in her history. Hereafter, whoever gives most earnest attention to educational matters will govern. Our Church has never

been opposed or indifferent to this work, but, on the contrary, always its ardent advocate. Methodism was born in a University, and in our Schools and Colleges it has lived and strengthened. From these have gone forth, from time to time, men full of faith and the Holy Ghost—men who have made full proof of their ministry, not only in our centres of culture and influence, but in far off lands, among the most ignorant and depraved. We have, in connection with our Church, Educational Institutions both for our sons and daughters, second to none in the land. At their head, and on their staff of teachers, are men of eminent ability and undoubted piety. Our children are safe in their care. Our schools are schools of grace and knowledge. Will you stand by us in this work? Will you give us that sympathy and support which our Church needs to take her proper place as educator and educated in the social, civil, and religious history of the Dominion?

Our Sabbath-school work is full of encouragement and hope. Fifteen hundred of the scholars have been converted to God during the year. Their attendance in class-meeting has much improved. Fully convinced that the highest type of Christian life can only be reached by beginning with the children, some of the best talent among both ministers and laity has been specially devoted to their interests. Our Annual Conference Meeting, in their behalf, was largely attended and of thrilling interest, rich in instruction and stimulus. A noble band of officers and teachers are doing a great work for God and the Church. We beseech you to give them every possible encouragement. Let them not lack for funds. Sanction their labors by your frequent presence in the schools and by frequent words of approval and thankfulness. See that your children are never absent when they can be present. The Sabbath-school is not an institution by itself; not a nursery to the Church, but a nursery *in* the Church. Keep the children near you—under your immediate eye, surrounded by older and stronger influences. Does danger threaten them? Dispose of yours as Jacob did of his when imperilled before the armed and

angry Esau at the fords of Jabbok—put yourself first and them last. If evil reach them let it be over your dead body.

We rejoice to report a large increase in the circulation of our connexional paper and periodicals. The *Christian Guardian* and *Evangelical Witness* has added to its list of subscribers during the year, seven hundred new names; the *Methodist Magazine*, one thousand; the *S. S. Advocate*, twelve hundred; the *Berean Leaves*, twelve hundred in two years; and the *S. S. Banner*, in four years, has risen from twenty-three hundred to five thousand subscribers. To our Conference belongs the honor and the gain of taking the largest numbers of these publications. We are very thankful for these things; but greatly desire a much wider circulation. We can most confidently commend them to you; they are not surpassed, if equalled, by any of the same class in our land; and they have received the hearty commendation of the highest authorities in other lands. Our Book-Room and Publishing House has gone to great expense to make them, in all respects, worthy of our Church and people. We know of no outlay that will bring you and your children richer returns than money paid for these our own papers and periodicals. It will be a day of great rejoicing when these weekly and monthly messengers are found in all the homes of Methodism.

But, above all these, we pray you to prize the Sacred Scriptures. The Bible is among books what God is among beings—without comparison. To the Bible we owe all that is best in other books—all that is most elevating and enduring in literature, and art, and science. It is the safe-guard of our liberties, the source of our strength, the secret of our greatness. Desire it more than your necessary food. Feed upon it. Hide it in your heart. Let it dwell in you richly in all wisdom. Be mighty in the Scriptures. They are the enemy's object of attack; they are your weapon of defence. Go armed. Gird ye on every man his sword, even as our Lord also girded on His sword, and go ye after Him against every son of Belial.

As Balaam, and Joshua, and David saw the Angel of the Covenant, so may you, the children of the Covenant, ever be seen with "*drawn*" swords. "Be not afraid of their terror, neither be troubled; but be ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason of the hope that is in you."

Brethren, as good soldiers of Jesus Christ, see that no dishonour is done his Word; that no man bind it; that it has free course. The law of our land says the Bible may be used in our public schools. It is our deliberate judgment, in common with other leading Churches of our country, that its use in them would be of inestimable advantage. We beseech you, as members and adherents of our Church, that you will take a decided stand in this matter; that you will strive together with us until the daily use of the Bible in our public schools is universally established.

Need we say one word to you on the question of Temperance! Our ministers and people have been second to none in their zeal for this righteous movement. God has greatly blessed our labours in guarding the exposed and restoring the fallen. Do not rest in what you have done; rouse yourselves to greater efforts; follow up your victories with redoubled energy; lay hold of every lawful means to gain your end until the terrible evil of strong drink is swept away, root and branch, forever.

There linger among us some of the fathers who long ago laid the foundation of our present prosperity. A few of them—some in extreme age and feebleness—have come up to our Conference. It has been our delight to do them honour. With deep solicitude we commend them to your care. Never let them feel they are forgotten. Pay them that attention to which they are so well entitled, and which is so grateful to the aged and infirm. Make their last days their best days.

At the call of God, your sons came from you to us. Some have been in our schools fitting themselves for their work; others, like the son of Snaphat, have left the plough to follow the Master, untrained in the "schools of the Prophets." We send them back to you for the work of the ministry, to be educated *in* the ministry. They come in fear and trembling. Receive them as we send them, prayerfully, hopefully. Do not expect too much. Be patient of faults. Give them every chance to make full proof of their ministry. Deal with them as Elisha did with his trembling young servant in Dothan—cheer them; "Fear not: for they that be with us are more than they that be with them." Pray for them; "Lord, open his eyes, that he may see. And the Lord opened the eyes of the young man; and he saw: and, behold, the mountain was full of horses and chariots of fire round about Elisha."

We live in stirring times. Life is fitful and feverish. Men haste to be rich and fall into a snare. God never put us here to make money—we have no time for it. Are we honestly pursuing an honest calling? Are we industrious, economical, and generous? If in the practice of these virtues riches come to us, well; if not, still well. God has some better thing in store for us. Because of the love of money we have been passing through trying times. Financial disaster has come upon many a home innocent as well as guilty; everything has been swept away; the wolf of want is at the door. These are testing times—the revelation of fire trying men's work of what sort it is. Great is the temptation to take advantage of circumstances,—of a blind Isaac, of a lame law, to drive a sharp bargain, robbing our brother of his right, or withholding from another what is not ours in the sight of God. It is no sin to be tempted; it is a sin to yield to temptation. Brethren, be true to your principles, true to your professions. Make no compromise with man or money at the cost of truth. Be not careful to answer even the king in matters of right and justice. "Provide things honest in the sight of all men." Go into the furnace of seven-fold fire before you bow down to a god of gold.

You shall lose nothing but the Babylonian bonds; you shall gain the presence and power of God, and the world shall see that you are His and He is yours.

Have faith in God! Be rich toward Him! Hold fast the form of sound words! Believe in the Holy Ghost! Keep close to Christ! Love one another! "Exercise yourselves to have always a conscience void of offence toward God and toward men." Dearly beloved brethren, most earnestly do we pray, that at the last, it may be written of you, as it was of Caleb, "he hath wholly followed the Lord." "For so an entrance shall be administered unto you abundantly into the everlasting kingdom of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ."

Standing Resolutions.

Treasurers and Financial Secretaries.

Resolved,—That it shall be required of every Financial Secretary, either by himself or by a proxy, to meet the Treasurers of the several Connexional Funds, to report the receipts of their respective Districts, on Tuesday, at two o'clock P.M., the day before the annual meeting of the Conference.

Financial and other Returns.

Whereas the Returns sent from the Districts to the Conference are frequently incomplete and incorrect, making it quite impossible to compile perfect and accurate tabular statements for the Minutes of Conference, it is—

Resolved,—(1) That the Financial and District Secretaries be required to have their accounts and tabular statements audited and certified as correct before handing them to the Conference authorities.

(2) That the Secretary of Conference, when sending the books for the May District Meetings, shall call the attention of the Chairmen to the above resolution.

Sabbath School Reports.

Resolved,—That Superintendents of Circuits shall report in making up their schedules of all Sabbath-schools held by our people in connection with our work, whether they are governed in accordance with the published Constitution or not.

Ordination Sermon.

Resolved,—That it shall be the rule in this Conference in the future, that the retiring President shall preach the Ordination Sermon.

District Secretaries.

Resolved,—That each District Secretary be instructed to forward to the Superintendent of the Circuit where the Conference is to be held, the name of the member of the Stationing Committee, and all other ministers who purpose attending Conference, at as early a date as possible, and that only those whose names are forwarded shall be provided with billets.

Superannuated Ministers' Fund.

Resolved,—That whereas the rule requires that all widows, claimants on the Superannuated Ministers' Fund, shall be members of our Church; therefore it shall be the duty of the Chairman of each Annual District Meeting to make enquiries into the case of widows residing within their respective bounds, as to their membership, and report the fact annually to the Conference.

Income of Domestic Missions.

Resolved,—That the Financial District Meeting shall examine into the circumstances and probable income of Domestic Missions, in the same way as in respect to Circuits, and suggest the amount that should be appropriated for the support or assistance of such Missions.

Resolved,—That having noticed the large preponderance of members of the Committee of Finance and Consultation appointed by the Central Board belonging to the Toronto Conference, even to a majority of the whole, this Conference would direct the attention of the Central Board to that fact, and ask for a proportionate representation on that Committee, and that the members thereof be nominated by the representatives of each Conference.

Chairmen and Domestic Missions.

Resolved,—That the Chairmen of Districts forward to the Missionary Secretaries the amount recommended by the several September Financial District Meetings for the Domestic Missions, as soon as practicable after the close of each meeting.

Preachers Attending College.

Resolved,—That in all cases when Preachers, who have travelled four years, are then allowed by the Conference to attend College, their reception into full connexion and their ordination are thereby deferred.

Relating to the Book-Room.

Resolved,—That every Minister and Preacher is henceforth peremptorily required to settle his account with the Book Steward at or before the meeting of Conference.

Resolved,—Should any Minister or Preacher, having claims on the Connexional Funds, fail to pay up his account with the office as above directed, it shall be the duty of the Book Steward annually to draw upon the Treasurer of any of those Funds an amount not exceeding one-fourth of the claim of the brother on such fund towards the payment of his debt; and the Treasurer of such fund is hereby directed to honour such drafts when presented.

Probationers.

Resolved,—That any Probationer, assisted by the Educational Fund, who, within the period of ten years after Ordination, may wish to withdraw from the Conference, shall be required to refund the amount of aid given him before receiving a Certificate of standing; provided always that this requirement shall not apply to those who retire from ill-health.

Visiting the Public Schools, &c.

Resolved,—That the Conference earnestly recommends the Ministers of this body to avail themselves of the facilities afforded by the Council of Public Instruction, to visit the Public Schools as frequently as possible at the times prescribed, for the purpose of communicating religious instruction.

Registration of Baptisms.

Resolved,—That the Conference re-affirms its resolution of 1843, on the Registration of Baptisms, viz. :—

1. That it shall no longer be required to keep Registry Books on the various Circuits, but that there shall be kept, at the Conference Establishment in Toronto, one General Registry of Births and Baptisms for the whole Church.

2. That the General Registrar shall be the Book Steward for the time being. The Registrar shall furnish each ordained Minister yearly with a small ruled blank-book, for convenient and uniform entry and return of Births and Baptisms. The Minister shall return the said book, with the entries, to the Registrar at the Conference after. The returns shall be copied into the General Registry Book, which book shall be kept in the custody of the Registrar.

The Bible and Public Schools.

Resolved,—Inasmuch as the Bible may be used by public authority in our public schools, and as it is desirable that it should be used in all our schools, we recommend our membership and adherents to use their influence to secure its use in all schools from which it is now excluded.

Removal of Ministers during the Year.

That in the event of a brother removing from any Circuit, District, or Conference to another Circuit, or District, or Conference during the year, he shall be required to obtain a certificate of removal from the Superintendent, Chairman, or President, according as the removal may be to the Conference or District; but in every case the examination of character, belief in our doctrines and the like, shall be held in connection with the name as it stands in the printed Minutes of Conference, due certificates being forwarded the Chairman covering the period of time between removal and District Meeting.

Church at Windsor.

Resolved,—That our friends in Windsor be permitted to appeal to the Church, in general, for aid in behalf of the church in that town.

Special Resolutions.

Thanks to the Ex-President.

Resolved,—That this Conference desires to express, and place on record, the expression of the esteem in which the Rev. James Gray is held by this Body, and also our appreciation of the valuable services he has rendered to the Conference during the term of his Presidency. We tender him our hearty and cordial thanks for the zeal and devotion which have marked the discharge of all his Presidential duties.

Thanks to the Ex-Secretary.

Resolved,—That the hearty thanks of the Conference be given to the Rev. John B. Clarkson, M.A., for his faithful and efficient services as Secretary of the Conference during the past year.

Thanks to the Ex-Journal Secretary.

Resolved,—That the cordial thanks of the Conference are due, and are hereby tendered to the Rev. Geo. H. Cornish, for the efficient manner in which he has kept the Journal of Conference during the past year.

Thanks to the St. Thomas Friends.

Resolved,—That the very hearty thanks of this Conference be presented to the members and friends of the Methodist Church in St. Thomas, who have extended to the members of the Conference a generous hospitality during its sessions; and we beg to assure our friends, that on leaving them we bear with us to our several homes, a pleasing remembrance of the happy intercourse between Hosts and Guests which the St. Thomas Conference has afforded.

Thanks to the Ministers in Charge.

Resolved,—That the members of this Conference hereby express their most cordial thanks to the Rev. John A. Williams, D.D., and Rev. Thomas Colling, B.A., for the great interest they have shown in our comfort, in making provision for our entertainment, and for the courteous attention manifested towards us during the sessions of this Conference.

Publication of Sermons.

Resolved,—That this Conference respectfully request the Rev. Dr. Ryerson and the Rev. E. H. Dewart, to place the manuscripts of the able and timely discourses delivered by them on Sunday last, at the disposal of our reporter, with a view to early publication in full in the columns of our Connexional organ.

Cyclopedia of Methodism.

Resolved,—That having been informed that the Rev. George H. Cornish has in course of preparation a volume entitled "Cyclopedia of Methodism in Canada," containing a full account of the men and Circuits of the Wesleyan, the New Connexion, and the Eastern British American Conferences to the year 1874, and of the six Annual Conferences of the Methodist Church of Canada from 1874 to 1878, with full tabulated Statistics, and an account of the General Conferences of 1874 and 1878, together with an epitome of the chief facts of Methodist History, this Conference earnestly requests that it be published as soon as practicable, and that we pledge ourselves to give it our hearty support.

Ladies' College, Hamilton.

Resolved,—That this Conference rejoices in the prosperity which has attended the Ladies' College in Hamilton, from its inception to the present time, and records its conviction that that prosperity has been largely due to the wisdom, fidelity, and zeal of the Rev. Dr. Rice as its appointed

Resolved,—That the time and place of the meeting of the Missionary Committee be left with the President for this year.

Clarkson, seconded by the Rev. Dr. Rice, and *Resolved*, "That the six young men whose names have been called by the Secretary be received into full connexion with the Conference and ordained." The Rev. Alexander Sutherland also delivered a suitable address.

On Sunday, June 9th, the Ordination Service began at 11 o'clock. The official sermon was preached by the Rev. Egerton Ryerson, D.D., President of the General Conference.
