Says He Saw At Least **Eight Steamers Sunk**

Officer of Steamer at Halifax Confirms Story of Fight Off Irish Coast; Virginian Torpedoed But Beached

Halffax, N. S., Sept. 24-The Herald here today says:-According to an officer of a merchant steamship in port, the Virginian is one of the latest victims of the Huns submarines on the Irish coast. The officers story is somewhat in line with a story carried by the Canadian Press on Saturday with the exception that the officer now at this port claims that more than five ships were sunk and that the Virginian, seriously crippled

and in a sinking condition managed to make the beach. "It is impossible for me to say," he said, "whether any submarines were sunk or not, but I saw at least eight of the steamers go down. We were scattered over quite an area and our ship had her own troubles in getting away. The destroyers were busy, however, and I am quite sure that some of them got what they were aiming at. With a heavy sea running and nothing but a periscope to aim at, it is a difficult matter to get in a killing blow at a submarine."

Royal Fusiliers, Trapped in Shel Hele With No Defence, Showed Contempt of Hun Fire

(By Perry Robinson.) British Headquarters in France, Sept. 22-An incident which deserves to become historic is of certain Royal Fusiliers who were caught in the line of battered trench shell-holes along the Broenbeek. The enemy was shelling them. They practically had no shelter. The Germans knew the range of the positions they had recently lost to a yard. There was nothing for the Fusiliers to do but stick it out until such time as our guns could beat down the enemy batteries. Meanwhile it was as heavy shelling as troops can be called on to stand. Then someone of the Fusiliers started singing the army version of "In These Hard Times."

Perhaps you know the song:

"You have got to put up with anything in these hard times."

Other voices took up the song until from the whole line and out in the shell from the whole line and out in the shell holes, where men crouched with the dead in bloodstained water, and fragments of trench where the living and wounded lay together, the chorus welled up nightly. The earth shook with shell bursts, and the air was thick with the fumes of dirt and debris. Through the crashing murk the song rose rollicking:—


INJURED BY EXPLOSION

Harvey Station, Sept. 22—This afternoon, while a number of C. P. R. laborers under Foreman L. Phillips were engaged in blasting a trench through a ledge of rock near the station, two of their number, Willis Hay, of this place, and James McNevin, a Nova Scotian, were severely hurt by an explosion of dynamite.



"How Many of our Men are Liable to be Drafted?"

The Canadian business man is asking this question often, now that the Military Service Act is the law of Canada. A simple means of answering it at once is being provided.

Medical Boards are in process of formation throughout the country for the free physical examination of all men who apply. The first class hable to call includes all single men and widowers without children between the ages of 20 and 34 inclusive, all men married after July 6, 1917, being classed as single for the purposes of the Act. In a very short time, the average employer may learn how many of his staff are liable for selection. Those adjudged physically unfit will be given a certificate which will secure them exemption from any Exemption Tribunal. Those found physically fit may still apply for exemption on any ground. The employer will be given a chance to decide if he should seek exemption for any employee whose physical condition renders him liable for selection.

This early medical examination, which quickly decides if a man is liable for selection or not, is a feature of the operation of the Military Service Act calculated to appeal strongly to the business community. It assists in definite planning for the future, enabling an employer of labor to learn at once what men will be left at their work and those who may be removed for military service. Haphazard withdrawals, the nightmare of business men of method and precision, are insured against by this timely arrangement.

Every employer of labor will find it to his advantage to note carefully the formation of Medical Boards in his locality and to be sure that his employees secure as early as possible this very important information as to their status under the Military Service Act.




