### NEW BRIDGE IS TO SPAN ST. LAWRENCE

Montreal to Negotiate Loan, Which Will be Guaranteed by Government.

Ottawa, July 16—Construction of a bridge across the St. Lawrence connecting the Island of Montreal with the south shore of the Quebec mainland is authorized in a bill which passed first and second readings in the House of Commons yesterday.

The Montreal Harbor Commission will direct the work and the City of Montreal is authorized to negotiate loans for the undertaking, which will be guaranteed by the Government. Right Hon. Arthur Meighen thought the Government should assume responsibility for the work in co-operation with the municipalities affected, without giving the Harbor Commission jurisdiction.



### OPTIMISM IS THE KEYNOTE OF ASSEMBLAGE

MacDonald and Herriot at Head of Table as Allies Meet.

AMERICANS THERE

It is Expected the Deliberations Will Last About Two Weeks.

BY LLOYD ALLEN (United Press Staff Cor.) London, July 16 .- The fifteenth important Allied conference since the Versailles Treaty was opened this morning in the

spacious offices of Premier Ramsay MacDonald at the Fo Office, where statesmen of ten nations gathered about a large horseshoe table for still another discussion of reparations. In the eighteen months that have elapsed since the last fateful conclave at Paris in January, 1923, the French and Belgians invaded the Ruhr and Germany ceased payments. More recently, Europe took heart over the experts' report as a basis of settlement, and it was to consider ways and means of giving effect to this report that the present conference assembled.

Standing in the doorway of his offices, Premier MacDonald, Labor Premier, who will preside at his first inter-Allied gathering, welcomed Ameriacn Ambassador Kellogg and Colonel James A. Logan, Jr.; Premier Herriot of France, accompanied by General Nollett; Ministers Destefanl and Denava of Italy; Premier Theunis and Minister Hymans of Belgium; Viscount Ishii and M. Hayashi of Japan, besides officials and dignitaries from Portugal, Jugo-Slavia, Greece. and Roumania, and scores of experts and secretaries.

an tourists all morning watching the elegates arrive. The diminutive Japnese statesmen were the first to drive up, and after the representatives of the various nations came in quick suc-

An Air of Optimism.

There was an air of optimism in the foreign office corridors and statesmen spoke to one another of the possibilities of this time settling the difficult reparations tangle. The fact that American Ambassador Kellogg and Coltable in the centre, and were to par-ticipate in the deliberations, had much to do with the optimism on the part of the Europeans.

chairman and discussion was started on a basis of the Franco-British mem-orandum of July 9. Three committees were appointed to discuss the various points under dispute. The first of these committees is to decide the question of what authority is to decide if Germany has defaulted.

The afternoon was occupied with committee meetings. The opening session adjourned after two hours and the date of the next plenary session has not been fixed.

The Premiers Speak.

All the principal delegates were present when Premier MacDonald, in als address of welcome, surveyed the his address or welcome, surveyed the general situation as it existed before the Dawes report was drawn and urg-ed the importance of putting into effect the report as a whole, without alteration in any details. Two conditions were most essential, said the British Premier: First, to restore economic and fiscal unity to Germany, and, secondly, adequate security to the investors who had been asked to lend \$200,000,000 to Germany.

Mr. MacDonald particularly welcomed the United States delegates, pointing out that, while they were not full delegates, nevertheless their presence was a sign of the co-operation and good-will of the United States

Government and people.

Premier Herriot, proposing Premier MacDonald as chairman of the conference, thanked him for his "noble words." The French leader made reference to the difficulty of the task facing the conference, but said it was

Purchaser of House in England Makes Discovery of Interest.

There were 800 of them, dating from the thirteenth and fourteenth centuries, most of them coined in the reigns of Edward I., and probably the two Edwards following, and a few of Alexander III. of Scotland.





Oren Van Loon, the inti-Klan pastor of the Berkeley Community church who was mysteriously branded with the letters K. K. K., was able to talk to visitors at the Nichols Memorial Hospital. But he was unable to throw any light on the strange events that have occurred since his disappearance from Royal Oak on June 30.

That he was in what was as nearly a hell as anything that is to be found upon the earth, the pastor does not dispute. The brand is upon his back in letters three inches high; somewhere in the back of his mind, but just out of reach, are horrible memories for which he gropes but cannot find. lection of the eleven days he had been

when visited, Mr. Van Loon talked about the sermon regarding the Klan, which he preached in his church just before his disappearance. He talked about passages from the Bible that ay opened upon the bedspread. He idmitted that he had preached against the burning of fiery crosses but instead that he had avoided direct mension of the Ku Klux Klan.

Dr. Kingsley, the attending physician, said he doubted if the patient would ever remember any more than a patient on the operating table under the influence of ether remembers the pain of the operation. Mr. Van Loon's hair was white. When he disappeared it was only gray.

"Drugged and Tortured," Says Wife.

Mrs. Van Loon, weary and ill after a restless night, and her cousin, Richard Du Pont, saw the pastor soon after he awoke. Afterward they declared they were convinced that the anti-Klan minister has been the victim of a carefully pre-branged and dia-bolically executed piot.

"He was doped," Mrs. Van Loon insisted. "He was drugged and drag-

ged away and tortured, tortured so horribly that I don't see how any human being could have done it.

"He must have been doped some time before he left Berkeley, on his way to Orchard Lake and Flint. He stopped at a hank to cash a \$55 check.

"Mr. Van Loon could have written it only if under great stress and forced to write at the dictation of some one who knew of his relations with Davis and who wanted it to appear that Davis and my husband had communicated recently. This letter speaks of a deal concerning horses and cettle, and of a pressing need for



### IOHN MITCHELL, OF OLD SHAMROCKS, IS HERE FROM BOSTON ON VISIT

Talks of Baseball and Play-

Talks of Baseball and Players in St. John in Olden Days.

The old days when a baseball match between the Shamrocks and Nationals was to St. John what a world series match is to a city in the United States were recalled with the arrival here on Monday of John Mitchell, an original member of the old Shamrock Club. Mr. Mitchell left here in 1880 and since that time has resided in Boston. He was reluctant to talk for publicity but recalled that in 1872 a number of young athletes in this city decided to organize a baseball team and seek honors on the diamond. They held several meetings and inally formed a team composed of the following players: Costigan, catchers John McCarthy, pitcher; Spence, shortstop; Mitchell, first base; Flynn, second base; Jim McCarthy, third base; Walsh, left field; Mike Holland, centre field; and Kane, right field. Mr. Mitchell was a member of the team for three or four years and in the year 1874 they entered a league and lost only one game out of 24 played.

Game Now Faster

Asked how the game compared with that played today Mr. Mitchell said: "The class of ball today is far faster than we ever played. Some of the old timers will not agree with me there, but I know for a fact that it is. Our pitchers used to have to throw the ball underhand, for if they raised their arm above their head it was considered a balk. As a result the ball was delivered much slower, without any shoots and was not hard to hit. This accounts for the large number of hits and the high scoring then made. The game is all changed since the old days. Catchers are now wearing big mits and the players good gloves, while the rules have undoubtedly made the play faster and more interesting."

He remained here until 1880 and then decided to seek his fortune in the States. He went to Boston where he was engaged as a baker for two years as then went into business for himself. Since that time he owned and operated baking establishments in various parts of Boston and is now located in Dorchester avenue, near South Boston.






