TRAFFIC REGULATIONS.

To the Editor of The Times:
Sir,—It can do harm at this time, when new traffic regulations must be formed, to draw attention to any and all problems which seem to call for action. Unquestionably, all horse drawn vehicles, and bicycles on country roads after dark should carry a light. There can be no possible objection to this in view of the fact that what is fair for one class of traffic is fair for the others, and that it is principally for the increased safety of these drivers that the law will be made. They have such a law in England, why not in New Brunswick?

This brings us to the next step in TRAFFIC REGULATIONS.

This brings us to the next step in the campaign for safe and sane traffic regulations; and that is, the abolition of the obsolete rule that automobiles shall be equipped with "Dimmers" and use them. Concerning the degree of brilliance that should be permissible in motor car lights, there is a flat divergence in ideas of those persumably competent to discuss the matter. How to get enough light thrown on the road without subjecting drivers to the fatal glare is the nub of the matter.

Western traffic men, coming in contact with the country road problem more ofter and constantly than easterners, condemn the law that requires "dimmers." They find that lights weak enough to leave the approaching driver some degree of safety do no good because neither the oncoming chauffeur nor the one using "dimmers" can see anything in an event. In the East and in all large Citles the dim light is urged because, it is erroneously pointed out, no one needs to point a brilliant light on the streets since the streets are well paved and the curbs unmistakable.

The police can be furnished with these lists and those who are driving today with glaring lights should be required to fit their cars with one or other of the approved Lenses. The cost would be less than \$5.00 per car.

To dim an automobile light on a country road on a dark, rainy or foggy night, is just asking for trouble. The lights would not be on the car in the first place if they were not needed for the operation of the car and the safety of other users of the highway.







MANGANESE ORE IN SCOTLAND

THE LIFE OF A VACUUM TUBE. When the filament of a vacuum tube is heated to a high temperature the metal volatilizes, that is, turns into a vapor at a rate which is dependent upon the temperature to which the filament is heated, the higher the temperature the faster the filament volatilizes. If the filament is of the metal type the cross section area is continually reduced by the volatilization process with a resulting increase in resistance. In the case of the coated filament the resistance remains practically constant throughout the life of the tube since the heating current is carried principally by the core of the filament, the exide coating only, evaporating.

coating only, evaporating.

If the metal filament is operated at constant voltage throughout its life, as the cross section diminishes there will be an increase in resistance and a consequent decrease in current. A decrease in current means a decrease in the electron emeission which is an undesirable feature. If the filament is operated at constant current rather than constant voltage the life of the filament will be materially shortened.

The life of a filament of the metal type is also affected by the diameter of the wire of which it is made. The larger sizes of wire having a much longer life than the smaller wire filaments may be operated at a high temperature and still last as long as the smaller filament. The life of a filament is greatly shortened by operating at a temperature in excess of the normal temperature.

Since it is not convenient to directly measure the temperature of the filament under actual operating conditions it is customary to rate the tube at a certain filament current which, of course, will gradually decrease as the filament decreases in size with length of service. In the case of the coated filament, "bright spots" or portions of the filament which are at a higher temperature than the rest may be observed when the filament is nearing the end of its useful life.

The normal life of the standard tube filament in use today should be about 2,000 hours or more with reasonably careful usage. A life of ten times this length is sometimes obtained with tubes used in laboratories in experimental work.

mental work.

In some types of tubes, especially in those of low vacuum, and to a lesser extent in those of high vacuum, there is a certain amount of ionization due to collision re ulting in the formation of positive ions which bombard the filament and cause local excessive temperatures. This condition is not so apparent in three electroade tubes as in tubes of the two elextrode type and is not so important a factor as the filament current itself which is dependent solely upon the adjustment made by the operator.

A filament of the coated type should never be heated above a dull red for reddish yellow and should never approach brilliancy. The metallic filament on the other hand operates most satisfactorily when at a temperature which causes it to become incandese nt.

The use of too great a filament current and therefore too high a temperature will result eventually in a black deposit on the inner surface of perature will result eventually in a black deposit on the filament and the formation of the deposit. a tube rated at 5 watts but the life of the tube will be only a few minutes.


AUTOISTS ENGAGE IN PISTOL BATTLE

### SHERIFF AND 3 OTHERS ARE HELD FOR MAN'S DEATH

Texas County Primaries has Fatal Flareback at Corpus Christi - Ku Klux Klan Said to Figure in Affair.

Corpus Christi, Texas, Oct. 20—A fatal flareback to the Nueces County July primary was staged here recently as a result of which Fred Roberts, prominent for mry years in Corpus Christi affairs, is dead and four men are in the county jail. The men in custody are Frank Robinson, sheriff of Nueces County; Lee Petzel, constable; Joe Acebo, a special officer, and Cleve Goff, a farmer. No charges had been filed late Saturday night.

Roberts was shot and instantly killed as he sat in his automobile in what is known as the "hill district" of Corpus Christi. The killing followed an extended argument in Warren's store, and was preceded, it was said, by promiscuous shooting, both inside and outside of the store. Three bullets pierced Roberts' body after he had leaped into his automobile, and he fell back dead without a word.

A short while afterward Chief of Police Fox arrested Petzel and Acebo at the scene of the shooting. Sheriff Robinson and Goff were taken into custody in the sheriff's office.

While the city is quiet two rangers are en route here. They were ordered out by Governor Neff at the request of County Judge Sutherland and Mayor Lovenskiold.

Trouble began early in the day when Sheriff Robinson visited Warren's store. It is declared that Robinson said to Warren: "Are your a Kluxer?" and a few seconds later slapped Warren's face. A crowd gathered. Mrs. Warren put in a call for the police and Chief Fox responded. Fox talked to Robinson and left. Later, it is said, the controversy was renewed and Warren sent for Roberts at his home. Friends of Roberts says he went to the scene only as a peacemaker; they declare he was not armed.

When shooting began inside the store fire crowd scattered. Shots were then fired on the outside. Roberts was seen to dash to his car. He sprang in, then threw up his hands and fell back dead. Three bullets had pierced his body. One passed through his right hand, pierced his chest, and emerged from the back. His right arm was broken just below the shoulder. No one could say who had done the shooting.

Cleveland, Oct. 20—Just why "pure corn liquor" or "moonshine" has a more vicious kick than aged-in-the-wood whiskey was explained to the American Public Health Association meeting here by J. M. Doran, head of the industrial alcohol and chemical division of the Federal Promotion Commissioner's office


