BULING MAKES DRY

Washington, Jan 17—An opinion of the Supreme Court of the United States delivered on Monday, held that the Reed prohibition bone dry amendment absorbutely prohibits interstate shipment into dry states of intoxicating liques intend dry states of intoxicating liquor intend-ed for personal use for beverage pur-

The law, as interpreted by the court, nullifies state statutes which permit limited amounts of liquor to be brought in for personal use.

The case was one in which a resident of West Virginia was arrested on charge of buying a quart of liquor in Kentucky and taking it into West Virginia, as permitted by the prohibition law of that state. Lower courts dismissed the indictment, holding that the liquor had not been transported "in interstate commerce," because it was intended for the purchaser's personal use, and not to be sold by him. The Supreme Court held to the contrary.

Equal Rights For Women In Workers' Ranks

No Discrimination, Says Premier Loyd George

Ample Scope For Them

Promises Equal Pay For Equal Output and Full Opportunity in Training and Education

London, Dec. 31-(Correspondence of The Associated Press)-No discrimination is to be made against women in British industry, Premier Lloyd George declares in a letter addressed to Lady Rhondda, president of the Women's Industrial League, who had submitted to him a memorial setting forth the claims of women to freedom of employ-

sulted in the arrangements for the re-construction of industry. She pointed onstruction of industry. She pointed out that while the government was bound by its agreement with trade unions, there are many shops which had sprung up during the war in which the government's bargain with trade unions would not operate to exclude women from employment. Women, she declared, are not seeking in industry a renewal of strife but a clear grant to them of their just rights as human bethem of their just rights as human beings and freedom of employment. They recognize, she added, that their claim comes after the claims of the sailors and

comes after the claims of the sallors and soldiers in the war.

"Women know that in some of the occupations in which they have served during the war they have been only a makeshift by reason of inferior strength," Lady Rhondda admitted "and in the long run women must be excluded from such by the ordinary rules of economy. With these reservations, women claim unrestricted liberty to be enmen claim unrestricted liberty to be en-gaged in any industrial employment, gaged in any industrial employment, provided only that they receive the same pay as men do for equal output. They claim the opportunity of being trained in the most efficient way and particularly the provision of women instructors on work in which women have proved more successful than men. They claim the care concertunities as men for prothe same opportunities as men for promotion, representation on government committees and all public bodies and facilities of education in schools and universities that will enable them to qualify equally with men in all suitable les and professions."

I was at the hospital as usual that morning between 11 and 12 o'clock when I heard a rumor that the armistice had been signed. I at once went to Colonel McQueen the O. C. of the hospital and asked him to get confirmation of the rumor over the wire, which he immediately complied with. The moment he ascertained the correctness of the news, the general assembly was sounded by the bugler and everyone came rushing to the recreation hall. Patients and nursing sisters, officers and personnel, all left their duties and came together. The hall was absolutely crammed. It was my happy privilege to make the announcement of the glorious news, and to conduct a wonderful, impromptu service of thanksgivderful, impromptu service of thanksgiving. None of us will ever forget that derful, impromptu service of thanksgiving. None of us will ever forget that first ten minutes after we were made certain that the awful war was ended, with the utter humiliation and defeat of Germany and her allies and the triumphant victory of the great cause for which we and our allies have fought and suffered. The sound of that singing is in my ears tonight: "Praise God From Whom All Blessings Flow;" "O Canada;" "The Maple Leaf," and "God Save the King," with a solemn and heartfelt reggnition of God as the true giver of victory.

In the afternoon of that day I and my good wife went up to London and there we saw and heard what we shall never forget. Millions of people, mad with joy and relief, giving expression and vent to their frenzied feelings in every conceivable way—shouting, dancing, drinking, and flag-waving. All wheeled traffic was well nigh stopped owing to the tremendous crowds of people with which every thoroughfare was jammed.
