Mulli-gan, chairman of the Knights of Colum-bus committee on war activities, will sail for Europe to begin salvaging prop-ert- of the organization that has been used in its war activities. He will visit France, Belgium and the Rhineland. The salvage work involves hundreds of thousands of dollars' worth of build-ings and warehouses that will have to be dismantled. These are widely scat-tered in the Belleau Woods, at Chateau-Thierry, in the Argonne, along the left bank of the Meuse, and in every section where American troops were, from the Swiss border to the Belgian coast.
