German Cruisers Captured and Sunk In Mediterranean; Some Fighting In North Sea; Land Forces Held In Check By Belgians

TWO GERMAN CRUISERS CAPTURED AND ONE SUNK

Flee After Bombarding Algerian Towns, And Are Trapped Between British And French Squadrons

the Panther.

London, Aug. 5—A despatch to the "Chronicle" from Paris says that after bombarding the Algerian town of Bona, the German cruisers Goeben, Breslau and Panther were caught by British and French squadrons which had been awaiting them. The French warships captured the Goeben and Breslau and sank the Panther.

The French vessels hurried over from Toulon in time to intercept the German warships as they fled eastward following the bombardment of Phillipville and Bona. British warships steaming eastward from Gibraltar forced the German vessels to choose an effort to escape eastward and they were entrapped by the French.

It is reported from Calais that French torpedo boat destroyers captured two large German sailing ships.

In The North Sea

London, Aug 5—A naval battle between German and British warships is reported in the North Sea, off Hull. It is believed that the battle is between scout ships as the main column of the German fleet is still reported as being close to the Mouth of the Elbe.

London, Aug. 5—A naval battle in the North Sea about thirty miles east of Hull is reported to have occurred last night. A despatch from Grimsby says that the firing of heavy guns could be heard and the flash of searchlights were seen trailing along the bay.

Newcastle reports that the officials there and at South Shields have been instructed to prepare for the reception of wounded men. Emergency hospitals are being fitted up in public halls at both places.

Aberdeen, Scotland, Aug. 5—A despatch from Cromarty says that a fleet tender with wounded from yesterday's battle between German scout ships and a British mine layer and accompanying escort of destroyers have reached there. The mine layer vessel was sunk. The naval authorities have established a strict censorship and details are refused. It is understood that the main German fleet has position close to the German coast and that the British fleet has engaged only German scouts to date.

London, Aug. 5—The mayor of Margate has reported to the authorities here that tremendous firing can be heard there from the direction of the North Sea. It is believed that German and British warships are engaged.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 5—A German fleet of nineteen vessels was signalled yesterday in the Baltic sailing from Memel in the direction of Libau.

London, Aug. 5—A message here says one German cruiser was sunk and two captured in the North Sea. A fourth escaped.

Portland, Maine, Aug. 5—The firing of heavy guns off the Maine coast was heard early today. Eight or ten shots within two minutes were heard a little before seven o'clock, by the keeper of Portland Observatory. The sound seemed to come from twenty-five or thirty miles south-southeast of Portland, and probably in the vicinity of Seguin Island.

The shots which were heard at theharbor forts, and at points between here and Bath, were quite distinct at Bath.

Seguin is a small island off the mouth of the Kennebec River, a few miles below Bath.

New York, Aug. 5—Eight cruisers—three German, three British and two French—are hovering somewhere off this coast. For days incoming steamships have reported news of fragmentary wireless indicating that these vessels were in American waters, but no skipper was able to fix their position.



The treaties entered into by the United States and those nations with which Uncle Sam has money order regulations, provide that each postal administration may suspend temporarily the exchange of these orders "in case the course of exchange or any other circumstance gives rise to abuses or causes a detriment to postal revenue."

The effect of the closing of the foreign exchanges because of war operations in European countries, is directly noticeable in the international money order business of the United States government. Merchants who find they can get no bills of exchange are taking out money orders with which to pay for importations.

In Boston alone the business in international money orders has greatly increased since the war scare. Varying from \$1,000 to \$2,000 the first three days of last week, it rose to \$4,512 Thursday, \$16,490 on Friday and on Saturday went to \$20,937.

"A small part of the business is due to efforts of friends here to assist Americans abroad, but the greater volume of the business is due to the efforts of merchants to meet their foreign obligations since the closing of the exchanges. The international orders are about the only substitute the government has for a bill of exchange. The orders are honored abroad at the prevailing rates of exchange in the country where they are payable."
