London, Aug. 5.—An official report from Paris this morning says that the German cruisers Goeben, Breslau and Panther, after bombarding Bona, were captured by the French fleet which captured the Goeben and Breslau and sank the Panther.

In The North Sea

London, Aug. 5.—A naval battle between German and British warships is reported in the North Sea, off Hull. It is believed that the battle is between scout ships as the main column of the German fleet is still reported as being close to the mouth of the Elbe.

BOMBARDING OF TWO BELGIAN TOWNS OF NAMUR AND LIEGE BY THE GERMANS

Brussels, Aug. 5.—The German artillery is bombarding the Belgian towns of Namur and Liege. Heavy field guns were placed in position today and when the surrender of the cities was refused the shelling was immediately begun.

GERMAN FLEET IN BALTIC

St. Petersburg, Aug. 5.—A German fleet of nineteen ships was sighted yesterday near the east coast of the Baltic Sea, between Memel and Libau.

TURKEY CLOSES THE BOSPHORUS

Constantinople, Aug. 5.—The Russian Black Sea fleet is bottled up and unable to participate in the war. The Turkish government issued an official declaration today announcing that the Bosphorus has been closed to warships of all nations and that any attempt to force a passage will be repulsed.

THE DIE IS CAST

The die is cast. A war involving practically all the great powers of Europe, world-blighting in its effects, and the end whereof none may foresee, has been precipitated by the action of Germany.

Never in the world's history have such fleets and armies been engaged as will be brought into collision in this awful war. The race for armaments which has been in progress for years past, and the invention of new and deadly fighting machines on land and sea, and in the very air itself, have combined to add new horrors to the conflict.

The people upon whom the burden must fall, while they do not withhold the sacrifice, may well look to the future with grim forebodings. The mere withdrawal of so many millions of men from productive industry is itself a thing terrible to contemplate; but, when there is added the awful loss of life and the destruction of property upon so colossal a scale as must accompany this titanic struggle, the mind is staggered by the thought of what it all means, not merely to this generation but to the next.

One cannot but grieve at the very outset over the loss, the suffering and the heartbreak which must come to millions of homes, and there cannot be other than a feeling of resentment against the German ruler, whose arrogance and disregard for the value of human lives has hurled so many nations into the maelstrom of war.

The spirit of the Canadian people, however, is equal to any sacrifice that may be necessary, and the quick response throughout the country to the Empire's need cannot but thrill the hearts of all, and give them renewed courage to face whatever vicissitudes the fortunes of war may bring. There was not a man or woman in St. John who was not thrilled by the cables words of Sir Edward Grey.

THE MODERN VIKING. The methods of the piratical forefathers of the German people have not been discarded by his most Christian Majesty the reigning emperor. Not only has he sent his armies into France before declaring war, but he has violated the neutrality of Belgium, which he was pledged to maintain, and has attacked scattered units of the British fleet without waiting for the formality of a declaration of war.

science, since the government first exhausted every honorable means to restore peace, and only decided to enter the lists when the claims of national honor and good faith could no longer brook delay. The next few days will be big with destiny for Europe. The destruction of the German fleet is the first great aim of the British, and even now the deadly struggle in the North Sea may be in progress. The power of Germany must be broken. For years she has been the challenger in the race for armaments, and upon her more than upon any other nation rests the responsibility for the colossal burdens laid upon the people of all nations.

CANADA IS READY. The Canadian government has taken prompt action following the declaration of war. Parliament is summoned to meet on August 18, and will take the necessary action to provide for the full assumption by Canada of her share in the defence of the Empire. So far as measures relating to the war are concerned, party lines are obliterated. Speaking for the Liberal party, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who has cancelled all his meetings, says:—

The policy of the Canadian Liberal party under the painful circumstances is well known. I have often declared that if the Mother Country were ever in danger, or if danger ever threatens, Canada would render assistance to the full extent of her power.

SIR JOHN FRENCH. Field Marshal Sir John French, who has been appointed Inspector-general of the British forces, has had a brilliant military career. He served in the Sudan campaign in 1884-85, and participated in the battles of Abu Klea, Gubat and Mehemeh. In 1899 he was appointed to command a cavalry division in Natal, and commanded the troops at the battle of Elandlaagte, and the cavalry at Reitfontein and Lombard's Kop.

St. John will soon present some of the features of an armed camp, although the number of men under arms will not be large. "Capture or destroy the enemy's ships," was the message of King George to the British navy. With the combined fleets of Britain, France and Russia there is no reason to doubt that the order will be obeyed to the letter.

Despite the knowledge of the horrors of war there was something to stir the pulses of the citizens of St. John this morning at sight of the young men of the militia in uniform, marching briskly through the streets to the army, to take their places in the line of defence, and if need be embark for foreign fields to fight the battles of the Empire.

Already the boasted German fleet has suffered loss. Two cruisers have been captured and one sunk by the French in the Mediterranean, and in the North Sea one has also been sunk and two captured. If the battleships of the German fleet can give no better account of themselves, the seas will soon be safe for commerce, so far as any danger from Germany is concerned.

CONSTITUTIONALITY OF THE WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION ACT

(Montreal Journal of Commerce.) A New York despatch says: New York, July 28.—That the constitutionality of the Workmen's Compensation Act, as modified, will be tested in the courts is the belief entertained by many students of this new legislation. Underwriters and casualty insurance lawyers maintain that the commission in its rulings to date has shown a disposition to exceed the authority vested in it. Lack of business methods and an arbitrary attitude are among the things most widely criticized. The commission recently ordered that all stock insurance companies transacting workmen's compensation insurance deposit with it the sum of \$10,000 and that mutual companies deposit \$5,000 to provide funds out of which the commission may pay claims against insurance carriers. The injustice of such a demand is demonstrated when it is considered that some companies have written probably \$8,000,000 in workmen's compensation premiums in this state, whereas some have only written a few thousand dollars in premiums. The injustice of such an arbitrary demand will be appreciated from the fact that in the case of a company writing 1,000,000 in premiums on which it anticipates a loss ratio of at least 50 per cent, or \$1,500,000, its monthly loss would be \$125,000, and on this the \$10,000 deposit would be ridiculous small, whereas in the case of a small mutual company writing \$6,000 or \$10,000 in premiums the \$5,000 deposit would be prohibitive.

AUDITOR WANTS NEW YORK BOOKS

Could Not Complete Audit Without Them

P. F. BLANCHETTE TESTIFIES

Called Attention of Premier Fleming to Grant Payments But Report Was Not Made Public—Advised Acting Premier of Ten Per Cent Profit Added to Cost

P. F. Blanchette, chartered accountant was the principal witness at the afternoon session of the Duval inquiry yesterday. Mr. Blanchette told of auditing the books of the construction company at Fredericton and submitted the report which he had made to Premier Fleming after his first audit.

The report drew attention to the charges for J. D. Seeley's \$10,000, the \$100,000 for Frederickson's lease, an apparent overcharge of \$14,440 in the interest account and the \$5,000 salary to A. H. Gould. This report was never made public by the premier. After the second audit Mr. Blanchette drew the attention of Acting Premier Clarke to the fact that ten per cent was being added to the cost of construction for profit.

The witness said that he was unable to complete the audit on account of lack of the New York books. Two requests to forward the books were addressed to the New York office but attention was not given to them. He also tried to get details of a bill for more than \$900 paid to a firm of New York lawyers but to no avail.

Ralph D. Hoban, accountant for the construction company, was called in when the commission resumed for the afternoon session. Mr. Carvell produced a statement, furnished by the witness, of the cash paid out by the company. This did not include the cost of rails or bridges which were paid for by the trust company but did include payments reported to have been made from the New York office.

Mr. Hoban was allowed to stand aside while P. F. Blanchette, chartered accountant, gave evidence. Examined by Mr. Stevens, Mr. Blanchette told of making an audit of the books of the railway in January, 1914. The report was submitted to Premier Fleming, Hon. J. K. Flemming.

—Did you trace the moneys received to the original source? —No, I had no accounts of the trust company—or the railway company so, after making an unsuccessful effort, I gave it up.

—Were you able to tell how the interest on the \$250,000 loan was charged? —It was all charged to construction. I could not tell if all the principal came from the railway company, but the interest and they were charged up.

—What is your opinion of the fairness of the charge to construction of interest on this borrowed money? —It would be all right if the money went into construction.

He stated that he had no information as to the transactions with the Prudential Trust Company, beyond what appeared on five vouchers, and added: "The Prudential Trust Company account should be closely checked up by the people who handled the business. 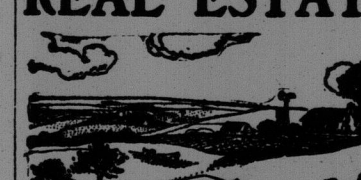

England and Germany at War

Kaiser's Ships, Without Waiting For Declaration, Hit Foul and Sink Small British Vessels—Early Morning Despatches

"Capture or destroy the enemy" Such is King George's orders to the British fleet. "I have every confidence that the British fleet will revive the old glories of the navy. I am sure that the navy will again shield Britain in this hour of trial. It will prove the bulwark of the empire."

THE DECLARATION.

London, Aug. 4.—Great Britain declared war on Germany tonight. The momentous decision of the British government, for which the whole world had been waiting, came before the expiration of the time limit set by Great Britain in her ultimatum to Germany demanding a satisfactory reply in respect to Belgian neutrality. Germany's reply was the summary rejection of the request that Belgian neutrality should be respected. The British ambassador at Berlin thereupon received his passports, and the British government notified Germany that a state of war existed between the two countries. All Europe is now in arms. On the one hand, Austria-Hungary and Germany are opposed by Russia, France, and Great Britain, Serbia and Montenegro. Italy has declared her neutrality, but is mobilizing. Belgium, Holland and Switzerland have mobilized. The German demand that the Belgian government should permit the free passage of German troops through Belgium was answered by hasty preparations to resist such an advance across Belgian territory. Sweden has made no answer to inquiries from Russia and Germany regarding her attitude, but is preparing to defend her neutrality. Japan is making ready to live up to her alliance with Great Britain, in case of certain eventualities. Spain is reported to be preparing a proclamation of neutrality. Austria-Hungary for the moment has retired from her campaign against Serbia for the purpose of holding back Russia, and Serbia has mobilized with the reported intention of invading Bosnia.

Treacherous Work of Germany

London, Aug. 4.—Germany has violated the law of nations once again. Before war was declared between Germany and England, the German North Sea fleet assumed the offensive and attacked scattered units of the British fleet. When the news became known in London the indignation of the population knew no bounds. An attempt was made to wreck the German embassy by thousands of infuriated citizens and thousands of Metropolitan police, including the whole of the mounted force, struggled for over an hour and a half against overwhelming odds. The building was partially wrecked, but nobody was seriously hurt among its occupants, though scores of people in the crowd were trampled by the police who repeatedly charged the mob. News of a naval engagement in the North Sea is confirmed tonight. Wounded from the battle have landed at Comragy, in Scotland, and are now being cared for by a special corps of doctors and nurses rushed from Aberdeen in a troop train on an emergency call. No word can express the rage of the British public. News received in London from the provincial cities and towns report the most violent demonstrations in all quarters. The admiralty offices were a blaze of light all the evening and shortly after midnight the first Lord, Winston Churchill, moved to Buckingham Palace with Sir Edward Grey. High admiralty and naval officers were going and coming, and it is known that wireless signals were sent to the first fleet under Admiral Galloway.

BRITISH VESSEL DESTROYED.

London, Aug. 4.—The admiralty tonight received a report that the German fleet in the North Sea had destroyed a British mine-laying vessel. The identity of the vessel is not yet known.

London, Aug. 4.—A despatch to the Central News from Amsterdam says the German navy has sunk the French submarine, eight miles northeast of Liege.

GERMAN FLEET BOTTLED UP?

London, Aug. 4.—It is learned on high authority that the admiralty has received a wireless message from the German fleet that it has been bottled up by an English fleet north of Denmark.

Dover harbor was closed tonight at the order of the admiralty. Dover is directly across the channel from the principal ports of communication between England and the continent.

LIEGE AND NAMUR UNDER FIRE. Brussels, Aug. 4.—News has reached here that the Germans are shelling Liege and Namur.

TWO CRUISERS CAPTURED. Algiers, Aug. 4.—According to an unofficial report, a French fleet has captured two German cruisers, the Goeben and Breslau.

PRIEST KILLED BY GERMAN. Paris, Aug. 4.—A German detachment today entered the village of Marnes-la-Mairie, in the Department of Meurthe et Moselle. A parish priest was killed.

RUSSIANS REPULSED. Berlin, Aug. 4.—The German detaching force tonight repulsed an attack in force of the Russian army at Mianel, the most northerly town in Prussia. The Russian army penetrated the empire at the railway and advanced on Mianel. The frontier guards interposed no resistance until the fortification outside the town was reached.

Asquith's Speech

London, Aug. 4.—Premier Asquith in the house of commons this afternoon, confirmed the sending to Germany of a request that she should give the same assurance of neutrality to Belgium as France had done, and that her reply should be sent to England before midnight.

Continuing his speech, Premier Asquith stated that Germany only this morning had renewed her assurance to England that she would respect Belgium's territorial integrity. This announcement drew a chorus of derisive cheers from every corner of the chamber. Mr. Asquith continued: "Immediately after we received from the Belgian legation here the following telegram from the Belgian minister of foreign affairs: 'The Belgian general staff announces that Belgian territory has been violated at Verriers near Aix-La-Chapelle.' Subsequent information tends to show that a German force has penetrated still farther into Belgian territory. We also received this note this morning from the German ambassador here: 'Please dispel any delusion that may exist on the part of the British government with regard to our intentions by repeating most positively, the formal assurance that even in case of armed conflict with Belgium, Germany will under no pretences whatsoever, annex Belgian territory. The solemnity of this declaration is borne out by the fact that we have solemnly pledged our word to Holland strictly to respect her neutrality. It is obvious that we could not probably annex Belgian territory without making territorial acquisition at the expense of Holland. Please impress upon Sir Edward Grey that the German army could not remain exposed to a French attack across Belgium which was planned according to absolutely unimpeachable information. Germany has at a consequence disregarded Belgian neutrality to prevent what means to her a question of life and death—a French advance through Belgium.' Premier Asquith then said: 'I have to add this on behalf of His Majesty's government. We cannot regard this as in any sense a satisfactory communication. We have in reply repeated the request made last week to the German government, that it should give us the same assurance regarding Belgian neutrality as was given to us by France last week. We have asked that the German reply to that request and a satisfactory answer to our telegram of this morning should be given before midnight tonight.' The premier concluded his grave statement amid a great outburst of cheering from all parts of the house.

Premier Asquith explained, during his speech, that all England had demanded of Germany was that she give the same assurance regarding respecting Belgium's neutrality as France had. This, he said, was refused. 'We only had promises from Germany,' the premier continued, 'and these promises were made simultaneously with the pressing of demands on Belgium herself by the German foreign office. Of course this was not satisfactory. Germany's attitude throughout in connection with Belgium has been entirely in opposition to British interests.'

The complete preparedness of the government to repel any aggression towards this country, and the determination to support Belgium to the uttermost, were both clearly indicated in the speech.

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ARTILLERY TO DEFEND ST. JOHN

Local Battery To Man Guns At Fort Dufferin

OTHER BATTERIES ON CALL

Army Service Corps Ordered To Fort Dufferin and Halifax—Recruiting in Progress—Wireless Plant Dismantled—Official Announcements

The call for volunteers about St. John has been answered with a hearty and substantial response. Already every regiment which issued a call for recruits has received many applications while those already members have in most cases expressed their willingness to go to the front. One hundred recruits last night joined the 1st Field Co., A. A. while 18 being raised to war strength, many of them former members or veterans of South Africa who re-enlisted. Port Dufferin has been selected as the recruiting centre for the local garrison and the battery selected will remain on duty with the 4.7 guns which reached the city last night from Peteraviva with the reserve party of the regiment who were turned back. A detachment from the Army Service Corps will supply rations for the men. A detachment of the Army Service Corps, consisting of eight men: Sergt. Smith, Corporal H. Donovan and J. Naves; Private D. Barle, C. Barton, J. MacKen, T. Merritt, left last night at 11.30 for Halifax to assist in the work of the corps at the garrison there.

Employees of the Marconi Wireless Co. last night dismantled the wireless plant at Partridge Island; it was brought to the city and stored away. It is said that the plant at the Leuchers and other stations along the coast will be dismantled and that the Lansdowne will pick up all the boys and lights in the way. The crew of the C. G. S. Curlew now at Halifax, will be transferred to the cruiser in Canada.

At four o'clock this morning Lieut. Governor Wood received formal notice of the declaration of war, from Hon. A. T. Dunn, collector of customs for St. John received word last night from Ottawa and French has been supposed to be far ahead of her neighbors, came as a revelation to the people who, in ordinary parlance are chronic grumblers over the government's supposed backwardness in military organizations.

Parks, issued by the department of mines at Ottawa. While in Quebec limestone of the best quality for building purposes is abundant in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia it appears to be rare. The reliance of the builder and architect is on granite and sandstone. Quebec has granite of good quality, but has little or no sandstone. Its granite is mostly supplied largely from the United States, while some has been brought from Scotland.

Worthy Rescues About. Mayor James M. Curley, his wife, two children and a party of friends were rescued from a broken-down power boat between Haverling and Minots Light yesterday afternoon, after they had been tossed about in a heavy sea for nearly two hours. The mayor's secretary, the superintendent of Rainford Island, and two other men were also on board. The party left Hull on the launch Rainford for an afternoon's outing, and had reached a point several miles beyond Boston light when the engine broke down. A strong southwesterly breeze was blowing and the tiny craft tossed and pitched in the turbulent seas until nearly the entire party, including the mayor, were seasick.

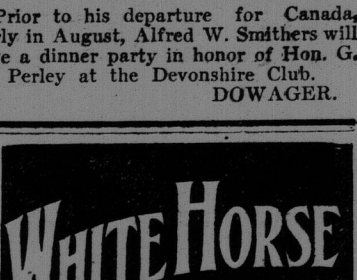

ST. JOHN EXHIBITION

Counsel Sink Their Political Differences Both Sides Agree To Do All In Their Power To Bring Dugal Inquiries To a Close in View of Declaration of War—The Need of The New York Books Now The Only Barrier

The announcement of war, the summoning of parliament and the preparations for the international conflict have made their influence felt on the Dugal inquiry. At this morning's session Mr. Carvell, chief counsel for Mr. Dugal, took the lead and announced that he and his associates were willing to bring the matters to a close. This course was suggested not only for the purpose of leaving those engaged in the inquiry free for various public duties, but also that the political differences which inevitably relate to the matter should not be allowed to affect the public mind at a time when the whole country stands shoulder to shoulder. Mr. Carvell suggested that the timber lands charges should be argued tomorrow and the railway charges adjourned for a few days, while another effort is made to secure the New York books. Counsel on both sides declared their willingness to do everything possible to expedite matters, the only difference arising from the continuance of the demand for the railway company's books. No decision regarding the arrangements was reached this morning. The session was marked by an earnest desire to clear up all details in which counsel for both sides joined. P. F. Blanchet and R. D. Hoben were the only witnesses and their evidence produced nothing new. When the court was called to order Mr. Carvell addressed the commission, saying: "It is my opinion that, in view of the momentous occurrences which have marked the last few days, we should close this inquiry as soon as possible. The inquiry was commenced with the honest intention of clearing up the business of New Brunswick political matters here and there, they could not be left out, and on this account I feel that the inquiry should not be prolonged more than necessary. The timber inquiry is completed except for the evidence of 'Mr. Berry,' which I am assured will be produced tomorrow. It was our purpose to call Mr. Fleming to supplement the evidence of Mr. Kennedy. I do not feel that we can proceed intelligently with the railway inquiry until the books are brought here from New York and I do not see why they could not be brought here within four or five days. We wanted a long cross-examination of Ross Thompson but am willing to forego that but if we adjourn without the books it would only be fair to hear Messrs. Baxter and McLeod, his evidence dealing with matters which have been brought out before. Ralph D. Holden was then recalled and examined by Mr. Hoben regarding details of the accounts, Mr. Carvell asked for a statement of the cost of the station buildings, etc., and copies of the contracts. Mr. Teed put the witness through a brief cross-examination before the commission adjourned.

COMMON COUNCIL

The common council this morning met for the first time under the new arrangement of three meetings a week. Commissioner Russell moved that the Wednesday and Friday meetings be meetings of a committee of the whole, and this was agreed to. The mayor presided, and Commissioners Wigmore, Russell and Potts and the common clerk were present. On motion of Com. Wigmore the tender of Fred Nice for the water extension in Sand Cove road was accepted, being the lowest—rock, \$3,500, and earth, \$60; a lineal foot—estimated total \$2,450. On motion of Com. Wigmore the tender of French, Moses and Simons, for water extension in the Marsh road, was accepted, being the lowest—rock, \$3,225 a lineal foot, and earth 78c—estimated \$1,816. Sand Cove road extension, His Worship said that the revenue was only \$1,000. Com. Wigmore said that a people there had built with an anticipation of the water extension. Com. Potts suggested that the city might take the contract and employ many men who were now out of work. Com. Wigmore said that the price was so low that it could hardly be done cheaper. Com. Potts—"We may have a hard winter and there are men who will be forced out of work." The contract was awarded on motion of Com. Wigmore, who promised to see that only city men were employed. The commissioner recommended that permission be given the Rhodes Curry Company, Ltd., to tunnel across Prince William street to the Globe building and to connect the post office sewer with the St. John street sewer, upon a bond to the satisfaction of the recorder being given the city that the company will indemnify the city for any damage which might arise from the company's operations in tunnelling the street, and that the company also pay for entering the sewer in

St. John street in the usual manner. This was carried. It was pointed out that the depth of the cellar of the new post office would not allow sewerage connection with the Prince William street sewer. A bill from the Granite Street Park and Construction Co., for \$292.25 for curbing Mill and Gernain streets was ordered paid. A motion passed authorizing the controller to refund to the department of public works the cost of the permanent sidewalk placed in front of the C. P. R. property in Mill street. This work was paid for out of the appropriations, and the cost was to have been covered by bond issue.

VICTORIAN HELD Messrs William Thomson & Co. local agents for the Allan Line have received advice that the steamer Victorian, which was to have sailed yesterday from Montreal and Quebec, has been held at Quebec and is expected to sail from there on Friday. Although no reason was given for the detention of the steamer it is supposed that on account of the European trouble, the Allan Line will not let their steamer sail without an escort and arrangements along this line are being made.

HALIFAX GETTING READY The work of putting the fortifications of Halifax on an effective war basis, and completing the precautions necessary to guard the harbor, were continued all day Monday and yesterday. The naval law, under which the harbor and all government property along the waterfront are now governed, was in full force, and the citizens who had business at the dockyard and other naval centers were made acquainted with the strict discipline of such contingencies. No one is allowed to enter or leave naval property without a pass.

Carter, of Rothesay, who has been spending two months at her brother, Arthur, on the continent and in England and Scotland, intended to return home on the 18th, but as that and other steamers for Canadian ports are not sailing, will be detained at other New Brunswick ports. The Misses Kitchen of Vancouver, daughters of Willard Kitchen, were with Miss Carter in Paris on July 24, but left for England a few days later. They also are detained.

THE 'PRENTICE BOYS' At a meeting of the 'Prentice Boys' lodge in West St. John last evening, it was decided to observe Decoration day on next Sunday. Headed by the Carleton Cornet Band, the members will march from their hall on the West Side to Cedar Hill and decorate the graves of twelve of their departed members. Delegations will be sent at the same time to Ferrisville and Lorneville cemeteries. After the decoration ceremonies, the procession will march to the Fairville lodge's hall.

NEWFOUNDLANDERS WILL MAN THE NIOBE The Newfoundland Naval Reserve will man the Canadian cruiser Niobe. Over 1,000 of these men efficiently and thoroughly trained for either naval or militia service, it is stated, will be brought to Halifax immediately. The reserve is being mobilized in Newfoundland, both for service there and in Nova Scotia. The strength of the force numerically is about 1,500. Preparations for making ready the Niobe, which has been lying idle at the Dockyard Pier in Halifax ever since the government put this valuable training cruiser out of commission two years ago, are going on apace, and the ship is being provisioned for three months for 1,600 men. Advertisements appear calling for forty volunteers to man the engine room. The ship will be put into an effective working order as possible, and with such a magnificently trained body of men, as are the naval reserve of Newfoundland, manning her, the Niobe is expected to be a most effective addition to the protective facilities of Halifax and the coast of Nova Scotia in the event of hostilities.

The Sussex News and Kings County Advocate is the latest edition of New Brunswick Journalism. The News will be issued every Saturday. The first issue in addition to the news of Sussex contains correspondence from many sections of Kings County and presents an attractive appearance. Considerable attention is given to agricultural matters. The News announces that it is not controlled by any party or clique, and will be independent of both political parties.

RIOTING CASES ARE TO BE DEALT WITH FRIDAY A variety of cases came before the attention of Magistrate Ritchie in the police court this morning. Thomas Shannon, William Eddeleston, and William Chambers, charged with riotous conduct, were brought in and again remanded to jail. The magistrate said he would endeavor to dispose of the rioting cases on Friday. Robert Jackson, who was arrested on Kennebecasis Island by Special Officer McBrine, was brought in and also remanded to jail. Joseph Henry was fined \$50 or three months in jail with hard labor for actions in Rockwood Park. Dunire Warasick, an Austrian, charged with window breaking, was sent back to jail until tomorrow morning. His companion, Wasile Savenak, was allowed out yesterday on depositing \$10. Warasick agreed to pay the balance of the damage. Louis Feder was told to have the work done and submit the bill in the morning. Harry Watt, charged with stealing bags from Steen Bros, was remanded to jail.
