THE REFORM MOVEMENT.—The Editors quoted by A. D. Shirreff, Esq., at the Masonic Hall on Tuesday evening, tell a glowing story of the progress of the Temperance Reform Movement. They should encourage the workers who have carried on the movement so successfully heretofore, and make them realise that the cultivation of a healthy moral sentiment is far more effective in the work of killing the liquor traffic than all the clamoring for legislative enactments that have been indulged in heretofore.

TABERNACLE.—An obliging correspondent writes as follows from Tabernacle:—"The smelt fishing has caused quite an agitation among the people down here—some to make us think that Chatham has been barred and that effect has driven all the fishermen with their houses down to Tabernacle fishing ground, which is a large quantity of smelt caught, causing quite a stir among the people, giving them employment by their teams to do the hauling, for we see nothing but loads of smelt on the road. It gives also to the tavern keepers a share of the patronage."

WHAT DOES HE TELL THEM?—Now and then we hear, through the Moncton Times or Advocate of a political meeting having been held in Northumberland by Hon. Mr. Mitchell, but it is strange that announcements of such meetings are never made and reports of what the hon. gentleman says are never made in the Advocate. We should like to know what Mr. Mitchell has to say for himself and the Party he has restored his allegiance to in reference to the questions at issue between them and the present Administration. We should like to know the grounds on which he justifies his position as a Protectionist. It would also be in order for him to explain how it is that he has become an obstructionist at Ottawa, in the way of the proper administration of each of the affairs in this County as are controlled by the Dominion Government. We should like to have him "hire a hall" in Chatham and give one of those "ringing speeches" to which the Times often refers, which the Advocate faithfully echoes, and of the details of which both keep their readers in ignorance. Our representative should not, in justice to the metropolis of the North Shore, let the light of his oratory shine only in the rural districts.

Meeting of the Dutch Reformers.—On Tuesday evening the weekly entertainment of the Dutch Reformers took place in the Masonic Hall. The President, D. Davidson, Esq. presided, assisted by L. Tweedie, Esq., Vice President.

The proceedings were opened with prayer by the Chaplain, Mr. R. Gordon, after which the choir sang "To the Work."

The Rev. T. L. Smith then delivered an excellent address in which he apologized for his absence sometimes from these meetings by saying he was always ready

to make room for others who were inhabitants of the place, and perhaps called to do more good. He said the movement had been introduced here by Mr. Datcher, an American, and spoke of the mutual interest which his countrymen and Canadians took in the temperance work. There were now 1000 "Dutchers" in Chatham, and 800 in Newcastle, besides others in the surrounding country. The Police Magistrate had told him that 75 per cent of the cases brought before him, formerly, were of drunks, but on Christmas day there was only one arrested from that cause. He then spoke of the money which had been saved and the various meetings which had resulted from the movement, and after relating some amusing anecdotes, concluded amid loud applause.

A song, "The good by at the door" was next given by Miss Jessie Johnston, and well received.

A. D. Shirreff, Esq. had he had prepared a few statistics concerning the local liquor traffic from the Customs House. He had taken the figures of liquor entered for consumption for three months, commencing November, 1876, and November, 1877, which were as follows:

Table with 2 columns: Month, Amount. Nov. 76... 905... \$326.80. Dec. 76... 375... 450.60. Jan. 77... 279... 234.80.

These figures show a decrease of 701 gallons, and \$88.90 duty in the last three months compared with the three months commencing November, 1876. This alone would save a saving of \$4,200 for the last three months, but he estimated the saving would amount to \$6,000 if the liquor received from Halifax, St. John and Quebec, on which the duty was paid at those places, was allowed for in the calculation. This would amount to about \$25,000 for the year, but he believed the cost to Chatham yearly for liquor was \$63,000. The cost of liquor to the Dominion was estimated at \$10 per head yearly, but it was said Chatham drank more than its share and he would put it at \$12 per head for a population of 6000, which would give \$72,000 per annum. Another gentleman had estimated the yearly cost of liquor to Chatham at \$72,000. This would amount to two vessels of 1000 tons each yearly, and there was no good reason why this should not be done, as in Yarmouth and other places. There were people enough in the hall that evening, who if they saved their money, could build a ship a year. He advised them to stick to Dutch, and he did not think many would miss Mrs. J. R. Goggin and Mr. E. Patterson, now sang "Beautiful Songs of the Sea," which received an encore.

A recitation followed, entitled "Love, Fidelity and Purity," by three little girls, with wreaths on their heads, and red, white and blue sashes, Miss Besie Carmichael impersonating "Love," Miss Etta Davidson, "Fidelity," and Miss Annie Davidson, "Purity." Each delivered a short characteristic address, and in conclusion they gave a song, of which the refrain was—

"The Dutch Reformers for ever."

This performance was loudly applauded, and the encore was responded to by the trio repeating their song.

A comic song, "The girl that I call mine," was next sung by Mr. Benn, who received an encore.

The Rev. J. C. Harlan delivered a short and humorous address in which, with the classical illustration of Ulysses and the Sirens, he enforced the maxim of abstemiousness—"Don't play fast and loose with temptation."

Signers to the pledge were now called for, the choir singing one or two pieces.

Mr. Wm. Sinclair then addressed the audience, dwelling on the hardships that would be met with in being called a teetotaler, but he congratulated himself that his three months' office would shortly be up, when he would lay back and take a rest.

The choir now sang "Waiting and watching for me," and were followed by Miss Annie Shirreff and Miss Jessie Johnston, who sang "Where are the friends of my youth."

The cessation of a part of Bessarabia, and of Batoum, Kars and Erzeroum, with adjacent territory to Russia. Indemnity to Russia for the expenses of the war to be paid in money, territory, or otherwise.

The question of the Dardanelles to be reserved for the consideration of the European powers.

The McCarthy Mystery.

PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION OF THE OBSCURE, AND EVIDENCE OF THE GUILTY.

The preliminary examination of the Osborne charged with murdering Timothy McCarthy, commenced at Moncton on Monday, the 21st inst., before Stipendiary Magistrate Wortman, assisted by Councillor W. J. Robinson. We take the following evidence from the Times.

"Annie Parker, was called and sworn— On the 12th October last, I was at John Osborne's, Shediac. The family consisted of Eliza Osborne, Martha Osborne, John Osborne, and Harry Osborne. I recognize the parties in Court. John Osborne was sick on the day referred to. He was a horse keeper and kept the Waverley House. I was a servant girl. The prisoners were in the house that night and two children, Morton and John—in bed. Timothy McCarthy was there that night. I saw him there before 10 o'clock and again after 12 o'clock of the 12th October. When I saw him the first time he was in the ladies' sitting room. Mrs. Osborne and Eliza were with him. They had a conversation about Mr. McCarthy. They were talking about a girl in Moncton; I forget her name. They were talking about a policeman McCarthy had given going away to the Island. They were talking about the buttons on the policeman. Eliza said they were white and he said they were black. Eliza said 'I'll bet they were white.' He said 'they were black, and took out some money to bet. It was a roll of bills about three inches thick. She then said she did not care if they were white or black, she would not bet. They had high words, and Eliza went out into the kitchen. He was not angry, but she did not like what he said. McCarthy came out to the dining room door where I was scrubbing and went through the dining-room and stopped at the kitchen door and called Eliza. She did not come, and then she sent Harry for Eliza. She would not come, and said if he wanted her come where she wanted him, he could come where she was. I don't know whether he took a drink in the bar-room or not. He remained two or three minutes in the bar-room. He then went out of the front door. Harry was in the bar-room with him. I saw him next after the clock struck twelve. I had not seen him in the meantime. After he went out I heard Mrs. Osborne and Eliza Harry talking about giving him a white powder to 'mortify' him so as to take him from him. They used the word 'mortify.' I always used that word. This conversation was before he came in at 12 o'clock. I had heard McCarthy say before he left the house that he was coming back. I saw Harry and Mrs. Osborne and Eliza could hear him say this as well as me. When he came back he took off his overcoat. I was up stairs and came down as he was taking off his coat. He went in the bar room and treated all round. Mrs. Osborne, Eliza, Harry, myself and Mr. McCarthy were in the bar-room. They all took liquor but me. I did not take any. After that we talked and carried on in the bar-room. McCarthy treated three or four times. At the fifth drink Mrs. Osborne put some white powder and sugar in McCarthy's drink and stirred it. I was talking with McCarthy when the drink was being mixed. He took the drink and swallowed it. She also put some powder in his mouth and nose, but I did not take it. I told her I did not drink. This was after she gave the drink to McCarthy. After that McCarthy became stupid. He talked for about ten minutes after taking the drink. At first we could understand him very well, but after about ten minutes we could not tell what he was saying. He laid over on the counter with his head on his hands and he kept on yawning about ten minutes after taking the drink. When he could just talk a little he called his wife Eliza seven or eight times and his oldest son Hazen. We were talking to him about fourteen minutes and he could not answer. When he was too drunk or crazy to answer the old woman came from behind the counter and took the money out of his pocket. She took the money out of the right hand pants pocket and gave it to Harry and the old woman together parted the money in two and offered me part of it and I would not take it. Mrs. Osborne then went behind the counter. She said if we put him anywhere, when he comes to he will know where his money was and we will all taken up. Harry said 'Mother, if you think he will come to let us finish him.' There was a punch standing in the corner of the room and a hatchet on it. Mrs. Osborne handed the hatchet to Harry and said, strike him only once and kill him right off. Harry took the hatchet and struck him behind the right ear and he fell down. When he fell the blood rushed out of his mouth and nose. He did not kill him quite dead; he drew a long breath and Mrs. Osborne said, he is not dead yet, and Harry struck him another blow where he struck him once. After he was dead Harry took the watch out of his pocket and went for the horse and wagon which he brought to the front door. Harry went for Harry's horse and brought a grey one into the house about a foot long, six inches wide and four inches thick. Before that Harry brought the Bible out of the room and made me swear I never would tell of the murder. Harry tied the stone to his neck with a rope, a piece of bed-cord from a bedstead in the furthest off room in the back chamber. Harry went and got the rope. The stone he went with a slip knot round the stone and a tight knot around the neck. I held the end of the rope while he tied the slip knot. (Witness showed a string with a slip knot like that used.) After getting the stone tied round his neck Mrs. Osborne, Eliza and Harry carried the body with the stone to the front door. Harry told me to go and lift up the seat of the wagon. I got into the wagon and did so. They put the body into the wagon and took it down to the river. Harry asked me to go and I said I would not. When Harry came back I was standing at the front door and I asked him where he put him. He replied that he put him a mile above the Scudow bridge, and that he backed the wagon to the river and put up two poles and rolled the body down into the river. McCarthy

bled some in the bar-room. There was blood on the floor as far as the front room door. There was a big pile in the bar-room and between the bar-room and dining room. I washed up the blood myself about two hours after the murder. They kept the money and paid on their debt for piano and other things. Mr. McCarthy's rubber coat and a brown overcoat (a brown overcoat with a darker velvet collar) were kept in the house. When Mr. McCarthy came in at 12 o'clock he took off the rubber coat and brown overcoat and hung them up in the hall. Mrs. Osborne took the brown coat and put it in her dress press in her room. This was next morning. I do not know what was done with the rubber coat.

Court adjourned to 2 o'clock, previous to which Counsel for prisoners asked His Worship to put the witness under arrest as he had shown herself to be one of the principals in the affair. Court ordered witness to be placed under arrest.

AFTERNOON. The examination of Annie Parker was resumed at two o'clock. Two days after Mr. Osborne got well, he tried on the overcoat. He could not try it on that time, he was too weak, and sat down two or three times. At another time, when he was coming to Moncton, he tried it on, and Eliza said she would cut it for him. He said, 'Can't you cut it for me?' Mrs. Osborne said 'You won't put it on this time to go to Moncton; everybody will know the coat.' He did not put it on that time, and Eliza cut the sleeve so as to fit him. She cut a piece off the wrist and bound it with black. At the time he tried to try on the coat in the bedroom I was there. Then Mr. Osborne told Mrs. Osborne if Annie knew anything about it, and she replied that I did. Mr. Osborne said, perhaps she will tell, and Mrs. Osborne said, 'I am not afraid she will tell, as she took her oath on the Bible.' Osborne said, perhaps she did not take any money she will tell, and Mrs. Osborne said 'No, she will always stay with us.'

I am positively sure I know where the body is. Harry told me that he came in to the place and saw where the wagon had turned by the marks in the sand. This was the next Saturday after the night he was killed. The place is about a mile above Scudow Bridge. Harry told me he had to pass through a potato field to get there. McCarthy's hat was on his head. When he was killed it lay on the counter and after he was dead they took it and pressed it down on his head. I was then standing in the door. I saw the track of the wagon through the potato field and on the sand. The hat was a black, soft felt one. There was no person in the house that night except ourselves. Mr. Campbell, dentist, had boarded there, but that night he left between 10 and 11 o'clock, and told me he was going to Point du Chene. Mr. Wilson, druggist, was with him when he went out. I did not see Campbell again that night.

I did not hear much conversation amongst the Osbornes about McCarthy when it was published that he was missing. Harry always saying that McCarthy that came to that they did not know what became of him. After it came out in the papers Eliza Osborne sent for Chipman Smith and was going to send a letter to Mrs. McCarthy. Smith advised her not to. He said, you better not say any letter there, it might hurt you a good deal. I was present when this conversation took place. I did not see the match after that night but I saw a shell with Harry. There was a shell on the chain that night when Harry took it from McCarthy's pocket.

Counsel for Crown announced that he had no further questions to ask at present, but he would now ask that the body be placed, that an adjournment take place to afford opportunity for a search at the place indicated. Counsel for prisoners objected until cross-examination was had.

DEFERRED AS TO THE LOCALITY. On Tuesday the 22nd, inst. the witness, Annie Parker, was taken by Marshal Steadman to the Scudow river, about a mile above the Scudow bridge. After being apparently perplexed by the changed aspect of the locality in consequence of snowdrifts and ice, she came to a place on the bank a little above Farmer Atkinson's house, which she was almost positive was the place. The ice at this place is so thick, however, that a search for the body will not be made at present.

FOUR WITNESSES EXAMINED. Before the Moncton magistrates on Thursday, Mark McDonald, Juddice Babineau, Jean Babineau, and Patrick Hickey. McDonald said McCarthy with Mr. Chipman Smith on the night of Oct. 12th. McCarthy drank a good deal, but looked sober. When McCarthy was at the Waverley House (where this witness is a keeper), he told witness to tell the hostler to put up the horse and go to bed, that he did not want his horse out that night. He also told him to bring in his hat box and rubber hood. The hostler did so. He asked witness to take charge of these things. He said he had a objection in view, but did not state it.

Juddice Babineau is the boy who saw a body in the Scudow River in December. His description of the body does not agree with McCarthy's appearance. Hickey swore he saw an express wagon leaving Osborne's house late on the night of Oct. 12, but could not tell who the driver or if there was anything in the wagon. Witness has since received a threatening letter.

The witnesses called on Friday for cross-examination were Patrick Hickey, and the French girl, Annie Parker, neither of whom differed materially from the testimony given on their first examination, though that on the part of the girl, Parker, was very minute and circumstantial.

The only new witness examined was Philip Cornea, who testified to finding a hat on the shore at the mouth of Connors' brook, that runs into the west side of Scudow river, about a mile from the bridge and 100 yards up the creek. This was about the 20th or 22nd October, as near as witness could remember. He testified that the tide

runs up a little—200 yards or so. The hat was found where the tide could have taken it up, and when found it was in the water. It was a black felt hat, water-soaked. It had been worn some.

The hat having been identified, the court adjourned till Tuesday. During the afternoon plaid the Osbornes. One of Osborne's children is sick in the house with diphtheria, and Eliza, one of the prisoners, is very ill at Moncton of the same disease.

EXAMINATION OF THE PRISONERS. On Saturday, Dr. Scott and Thomas R. Tuttle, with the witness, Parker, in charge of Marshal Steadman, examined the bar-room of the Osborne House, when the girl pointed out where McCarthy was murdered, and the parry removed part of the flooring and counter where she said blood was wiped up. The boards will be examined by experts for traces of human blood.

DIFFERENCE IN THE PRISONERS' FAMILIES. One of Osborne's children is sick in the house with diphtheria, and Eliza, one of the prisoners, is very ill at Moncton of the same disease.
