

The wheel was about thirty feet in diameter and exploded with terrible force, breaking the steam main that ran along the roof of the building and causing it to burst. The entire roof caved in and the whole mill is a complete wreck. The force of the explosion was terrific. Great girders were twisted out of shape and everything is a tumbled mass of ruins.

How many men may be burled in this mass was unknown early today. A big water main burst, flooding the wreck.
