JURY FINDS THAT FRED. ROBINSON WAS KILLED BY ACCIDENTAL DROWNING; THE CORONER REFERS TO THE CONFLICTING EVIDENCE.

The inquest into the death of Frederick L. Robinson, who was drowned near the wharf at Westfield, on Sunday, the 20th inst., was conducted on Saturday afternoon by Coroner Ballantyne assisted by Cyrus F. Inches, of St. John, in the public hall, at Westfield. The evidence as expressed by the coroner, was very conflicting, especially that relating to the distance between the two boats when the accident occurred.

The first witness, Louis G. Sinclair, who was with Robinson in the salmon boat was the first witness examined. He told of sailing up river on the night before the accident occurred and anchoring about forty feet from the Westfield wharf. The boats were lying there then. About 7.30 o'clock the next morning they got up and began to make preparations for breakfast. Robinson went on board his own boat. A returning on the yacht came over to the salmon boat and the three had breakfast together. The boat was taking a course from the cabin into the cockpit as the Fei Yuen hoisted her mainsail.
