



"There is nothing of importance to report on the whole front. To the cast of the heights of the Meuse, near Marcheville, we lost a portion of a German trench which we had captured Saturday. "At Hartmann-Weilerkopf we have consolidated our positions. The total number of prisoners tak-en by us in the course of the at-tack which made us masters of the summit is six officers, 34 non-commissioned officers and 353 men. None of these were wound-ed. We took, in addition, many wounded prisoners."
