New York's Decline

The World is seriously alarmed on account of New York losing the monopoly of the grain trade of the West, and with it the control of the import and expert trade of the country. It adds its voice to the others that have sounded the alarm and lots. Ground has been marked off for a country. others that have sounded the alarm and wisely says that the Western and Southern trade will be controlled by the port which the produce can reach the cheapest. The rivals it fears most are Montreal and Philadelphia, and is alarmed at the direct importations Chicago is making by the St. Lawrence route. The World says :-

The transportation of a bushel of corn from Chicago to New York costs about 28 cents; add the price of transportation to Liverpool, about 22 cents, and the transportation from Chicago to that city amounts to more than double the price first paid for the corn. The Erie Canal is immensely out stripped by railroad transportation, and, since the completion of the various Canadian canals, this avenue and the railway avenues through New York have not been able to prevent a serious diversion of freights into Pennsylvania and through the Dominion as well. From Lake Michigan ports 12,060,000 to 15,000,000 to 15,000,000 bushels of grain are annually shipped eastward and to Europe via the Saint Lawrence River. From 1866 to 1871 three was an average increase of Western receipts at Montreal of more than 120 per cent. For the same period there was an average increase of Western receipts at Philadelphia of 84 per cent., while the increase at New York was only 33 per cent. Large Breakwater.—On the 10th day of August, the completion of the great breakwater at Portland, England, beguntwenty-three years ago, was celebrated with imposing ceremonies, in which the Prance of Wales participated. This break water is a mile and a half long, is three hundred feet wide at the base, and one hundred feet high.
