DIVISIONS OF TIME.

TRUE. TIME.—Two kinds of time are used in almannes—clock or mean time in some, and "apparent or suntime in others. Clock-timb is always right, while sun-time vertice swarp day. People generally suppose it is twelve o'clock when the sun is due south, or at a properly made noon-mark. This is a missisher, the nun very soldom being on the meridian at teelete o'clock.

A Solar day is measured by the rotation of the Earth upon its axes, and differs in length, owing to the ellipticity of the Earth's orbit and other causes, but a mean solar day, as recorded by clock time, is 24 hours long.

A Nautical day is counted as a Civil day, but commences, like an Astronomical day, at noon-time.

A Calendar month varies from 28 to 31 days.

A Solar year, which is the time occupied by the passage from one vernal equinox to another, consists of 365-2424 solar days, or 3056 days, a Corporian year is 805.2425 days. Every fourth year is Bissextile, or leap year, and is 366 days, The error of the Gregorian ompatation amounts only to one day in 3576.4245 eyes.

THE AGE OF CATTLE.

There are certain points connected with the dentition of the ox which ought to be understood by every practical farmer, for it is by the characters and changes of the incisor teeth of the lower jaw that the age of the ox may be the most correctly estimated. The regular number of these incisors is eight; but the first set are decidous, being gradually shed, and replaced by a new series. The new-born calf has generally two central incisors protruding through the gun, and more or less developed; these, like the others about to follow, are covered with white enamel, and have sharp edges and slender roots. About the close of the second week, a tooth on each side of this central pair cuts the gum, making the number four; at the

end of the third week the number will be increased to six; and at the termination of the fourth week the full number of the decideous, or milk incisors, will be complete. At this time the upper line of the sharp edges of the two central incisors has begun to wear, the osseous portion of the tooth appearing where the enamel is abraded; this increases, and, in the course of two months, the next teeth will begin to show signs of wearing, and in about three months the next in succession; till in the course of four months or a little more the whole set show the effects of use, but the four central



teeth by far the most decidedly. At this time, independently of their wearing down by attrition, the two central teeth begin to diminish in size; at first this is not very perceptible, but in the course of a few months, the change will be very palpable. This diminution is the result of a process of absorption, which goes on with increased rapidity as the new teeth in their nutrient cells beneath become more and more developed; the worn surface of the teeth in question assumes a triangular form, with an oblique inclination inwards, the osseous 'portion appearing as a distinct central mark. At the age of about eight months the diminution and wearing down of the two central incisors is very decided; and before the close of the twelve months the next.incisor on each side will show the same appearance, and the four, instead of being close together, will be separated from each other, espe-



cially at their base; at the close of fifteen months the number of teeth thus diminished by absorption, worn by use, and separated from each other, will extend to six; and at the close of eighteen months the whole eight will appear as little worn radiments. During these changes the ox experiences more



and more difficulty in cropping his herbage, and from this cause, and the action going on connected with the formative process of the permanent teeth, in their capsules or cells, the animal is subject to many disorders, and is liable to become out of condition, especially in pasture grounds where the herbage is not abundant and succulent.

Still these rudiments of teeth remain for some months, their decrease continuing, first more especially in the two central teeth, till, at the commencement of the second year, the two central permanent teeth shoot up, and push out the mere relies of their predecessors. During this process, the extremity, or alveolar margin of the jaw itself, is growing and widening, so as to afford room for the development of the rest of the teeth yet in their capsules; and the increase of both teeth; and jaw goes on in according barmony. It is not until towards the close of the second year that the next incisor on each side takes the place of its temporary predecessor; nor until the close of the third that

the next in rotation succeeds. The corn milk-teeth, however, are now mere rudiments, and they give place at the close of the fourth, or beginning of the fifth, year to their successors; in all changes some allowance must be made for the vigor or the weakness of the animal; but such is the average rou-

The last teeth obtained are smaller than the rest, and can scarcely be said to be fully grown until a few months have elapsed. The whole set is complete, but while the outer teeth have been growing, the two central permanent teeth first, and then the next, have been wearing, and show the marks of attrition; which, at the age of six years, will have extended to the whole set. The teeth become

flattened at the top, with a dark central mark, bounded by a line of bone, and this by the layer of enamel. As yet the four middle teeth are the largest; but, again, by slow degrees, a change takes place, and the process of absorption and wearing down goes on. First, the two central teeth show this, then the next on each side, till, at the age of ten, the four middle teeth are smaller than the out-

ermost two on each side, which, nevertheless, are greatly worn. The animal has turned the grand climacteric, and the teeth continue more and more to show the ravages of age; but, as among other domestic animals, and the human species, not invariably to the same extent, the process being slower or quicker according to circumstances. At sixteen the ox is old, but there are many instances in which the cow will give milk to the age of eighteen or twenty; and rare cases are on record in which the cow has given milk, and suckled a calf, at a later date, even in her thirty-first or thirtysecond year.

With respect to the grinders, or molar teeth, they cannot be conveniently examined in the living animal; nor, even were they accessible, could a very certain conclusion be deduced from them.

The calf is born with one or two milk grinders on each side, above and below; but by the fifteenth or twentieth day, the number is increased to three.

A fourth molar, permanent, appears in the sixth or eighth month after birth; a fifth molar, permanent, in the twentieth or twenty-second month after birth; and a sixth molar, in about the fiftieth or fifty-second month. The first milk molar is shed about the time when the fifth molar appears, and the second and third, at intervals of ten or twelve months.

CATTLE.—Under this head is included the ox tribe. The first point to be ascertained in examining an ox is its purity of breed, and this may be arrived at from several indications. In a pure breed, the color of the bald skin on the nose and round the eyes is always definite, and without spots. When horns exist they should be small, tapering, and sharp pointed, long or short, according to the breed, and of a white color throughout in some breeds, and tipped with black in others. The second point to be ascertained is the form of the carcass. It is found that the nearer the section of the carcass of a fat ox taken longitudinally, vertical, transversely vertical, and horizontally, approaches to the figure of a parallelogram, the greater quantity of flesh will it carry within the same measurement: to do this, it should possess the following configuration:-The back should be straight from the top of the shoulder to the tail. The tail should fall perpendicularly from the line of the back. The buttocks and twist should be well filled out. The brisket should project to a line dropped from the middle of the neck. The belly should be straight longitudinally, round laterally, and filled at the flanks. The ribs should be round, projecting horizontally, and at right angles to the back. The hocks should be wide and flat; and the rump from the tail to the hocks should be well filled. The loin bones should be long, broad, flat, and well filled; but the space between the hocks and the short ribs should be rather short and well arched over, with a thickness of beef tetween the hocks. A long hollow from the bocks to the short ribs indicates a weak constitution, and an indifferent thriver. From the loin to the shoulder-blade should be nearly of one breadth, and from thence it should taper a little to the point of the shoulder. The neck-vein should be well filled forward, to complete the line from the neck to the brisket. The covering on the shoulder-blade should be as full out as the buttocks. The middle ribs should be well filled, to complete the line from the shoulders to the buttocks along the projection of the outside of the ribs; these constitute the principal points that are essential to a fat ox. The first of the points in judging of a lean ox, is the nature of the bone. A round, thick bone indicates both a slow feeder and an inferior description of flesh. A flat bone, when seen on a side view, and narrow when viewed either from behind or before the animal, indicates the opposite properties of a round bone. The whole bones in the carcass should bear a small proportion in bulk and weight to the flesh, the bones being only required as a support to the flesh. The texture of the bone should be small-grained and hard. The bones of the head should be fine and clean, and only covered with skin and muscle, and not with lumps of fat and flesh, which always give a heavyheaded dull appearance to an ox. The fore-arm and hock should be clean and full of muscle, to endure travelling. Large joints indicate bad feeders. The neck should be small from the middle to the head. A full, clear, and prominent eye is a nice indication of good breeding, and an excellent index of many properties in the ox. A dull heavy eye unmistakeably indicates a slow feeder. A rolling eye, showing much white, is expressive of a restless, capricious disposition, which is incompatible with quiet feeding. A cheerful clear eye accompanies good health; a dull one indicates the probable existence of some internal lingering disease; the dullness of eye, however, arising from internal disease is of a totally different character from a natural or constitutional phlegmatic dullness. The next point to be ascertained is the state of the skin. A thick firm skin, which is generally covered with a thick-set. hard, short hair, always feels hard to the touch, and indicates a bad feeder. A thin, meagre, papery skin, covered with thin silky hair is indicative of weakness of constitution, though of good feeding properties. A perfect skin is thick and loose, floating, as it were, on a layer of soft fat, yielding to the least pressure, and springing back to the finger, like a piece of soft, thick chamois leather; it is also covered with thick glossy soft hair. The other greatest points are, that the head should be small and set on the neck, as if easily carried by the animal; the face long from the eyes to the point of the nose; the skull broad across the eyes, contracted a little above them, but tapering considerably below them to the nose; the muzzle fine and small; the nostrils capacious; the ears large, slightly erect, and transparent; the neck short and light. A droop of the neck from the top of the shoulder to the head indicates weakness of constitution. The legs below the knees should be rather short than long, and clean made. The tail rather thick than otherwise, and provided with a large tuft of long hair. The position of the flesh is important: that part called the spare rib, or the fore and middle ribs, should be well covered. The division between the horns called the closing, should be characterized by a thick layer of fat, a thick flank, and a full neck bend. The last points are the shoulder joint and shoulder, and if these parts are well covered the animal may be considered matured. When the frame of a short-horn ox is scrutinized, it will be found to present a straight level back from behind the horns to the top of the tail, full buttocks and a projecting brisket. There is • •

also the level loin across the hook-bones, the level top of the shoulder across the ox, and perpendicular lines down the hind and fore legs on both sides. These constituting the square forms when the ox is viewed before and behind. There are also parallel lines from the sides of the shoulders along the outmost points of the ribs to the sides of the hind quarters, and these lines are connected at their ends by others of shorter and equal length, across the end of the rump and the top of the shoulder; thus constituting the rectangular form of the ox when viewed from above down upon the back. It may be pretty accurately asserted that the carcass of a full-fed, symmetrical, short-horn ox, included within the rectangle, is in length double its depth, and in depth equal to its breadth.

To Determine Weight of Live Cattle.—Measure in inches the girth around the breast, just behind the shoulder blade, and the length of the back from the tail to the fore part of the shoulder blade. Multiply the girth by the length, and divide by 144. If the girth is less than 3 feet, multiply the quotient by 11. If between 3 and 5 feet, multiply by 16. If between 5 and 7 feet, multiply by 23. If between 7 and 9 feet, multiply by 31. If the animal is less, deduct 1-20 from the result, or take girth and length in feet, multiply the square of the girth by the length, and multiply the product by 3.36. The result will be the answer in pounds. The live weight multiplied by 6.05, give a near approximation to the net weight.

THEREY'S. POOR FOR CATTLE.—The following is a formula to make 1 ton of the food: Take of Indian meal 900 lbs., locust beans finely ground 600 lbs., best linseed cake 300 lbs., powdered turmeric and sulphur of each 40 lbs., saltpetre 20 lbs., licorice 27 lbs., grigger. 3 lbs., anise-seed 4 lbs., coriander and gentian, of each 10 lbs., cream of tartar 2 lbs., carbonate of soda and levigated antimony each 6 lbs., common salt 30 lbs., Petrudan bark 4 lbs., fenugreek 22 lbs., mix thoroughly.

OAT OR WHEAT STRAW MADE EQUAL TO HAY.—Bring 10 gallons water to a boiling heat; take it off the fire, and add to it at once 3 gallons of linseed unground; let it remain till it gets cold; then empty the whole into a cask containing 44 gallons of cold water, and let it remain for forty-eight hours. At the end of that time, it will be reduced into a thin jelly, like arrowroot. Spread out \(\frac{1}{2} \) for straw, and sprinkle it over regularly with the whole of the liquid from the cask. The stock will est it up as clean, and keep as fat on it, quantity for quantity, as they would do on hay.

MUCH BUTTER FROM LITTLE MILK.—Take 4 ozs. pufverised alum, \(\frac{1}{2} \) oz. pulverised gum-arabic, 50 s. of pepsine; place it in a bottle for use as required. To PRESERVE POTATORS FROM ROT.—Dust over the floor of the bin with lime, and put in about 6 or 7 inches of potatoes, and dust with lime as before, then more potatoes, using about 1 bushel of lime to 40 bushels of potatoes. The lime improves the flavor of the potatoes, and effectually kills the fungi which causes the rot.

An old veteran farmer with 63 years' experience, has successfully fought the potato rot in the ground, as follows: He plants them in the latter part of April, or beginning of May, and in the old of the moon. When six inches high they are plastered and dressed out nicely. Now for the secret. When blossoming, take two parts plaster, and I part fine salt, mix well together, and put one large spoonful of this compound as near the centre of each hill as possible. When ripe, take them out of the ground, have them dry when put in the cellar, and keep them in a dry, cool place.

NEW METHOD OF PLANTING CORN.—Corn soaked in tar-water and them rolled in plaster will yield more, be of a better color, and ripen sooner, and will not be disturbed by birds or worms.

CURE FOR SCAB OR ITCH IN SHEEP.—Take sulphur, two ounces; powdered sassafras, one ounce; however, sufficient to make into a paste. Dose, a tablespoonful every morning. Use, at the same time, a wash made of one gill pyroligneous acid, and one quart of water, mixed. Apply with a sponge If a few applications do not remove the difficulty, take half-piot fir balsam, and one ounce sulphur, well mixed, and anoint the sores daily. A single sheep infected is sufficient to infect a whole flock.

Ms. Culley's Red Salve, to Cure the Rot in Sheep.—Mix 4 oz. of the best honey, 2 oz. of burnt alum reduced to powder, and \$\frac{1}{2}\$ a pound of Armenian bole, with as much train or fish oil as will convert these ingredients into the consistence of a salve. The honey must first be gradually dissolved, when the Armenian bole must be stirred in a fatewards the alum and train-oil are to be added.

THE GREAT SECRETS FOR TRAPPING FOXES AND OTHER GAME.—Muskrat musk and skunk musk mixed. Can be procured at the druggists, or from the animals themselves. To be spread on the bait of any trap. This receipt has been sold as high as \$75. Another, costing \$50, for mink, \$6c.—Uuslaked lime, \$\frac{1}{2}\$ b.; sal-ammoniac, 3 oz., or muriate of ammonia, 3 oz. Mix, and pulverize. Keep in a covered vessel a few days until a thorough admixture takes place. Sprinkle on the bait, or on the ground around the trap. Keep in a corked bottle.

FOOT OINTMENT (for all domestic animals).—Equal parts of tar, lard and resin, melted together.

TO MARK SHEEP WITHOUT INJURY TO THE WOOL.—To 30 spoonfuls of linseed oil, add 2 oz. of litharge, 1 oz. of lampblack; boil all together, and mark the sheep therewith.

DYEING RECEIPTS.-BLACK.

For every pound of goods it will require one ounce of the extract of logwood and two ounces of copperas. Dissolve the copperas in water sufficient to cover the goods without crowding; put in the goods, let them come to a boil, and simmer forty minutes, then rinse the articles in clear water, and throw the copperas water away; now put the extract of logwood and water to admit the goods, let them simmer an hour or two, airing occasionally; when colored enough take the goods into a strong smart-weed dye, made by boiling the smart-weed and straining it into the washtub; rinse thoroughly and dry; scour in songsuds until the last is quite clear; put a little salt in the first suds. If a blue-black is desired, color in a brass kettle.

DYEING RECEIPTS .- SCARLET RED.

Take soft water sufficient to cover the cloth you wish to color, bring it to a boiling in a brass or coper kettle; then add one ounce and a half of cream of tartar for every pound of cloth; now boil a minute or two, and theh add two ounces of powdered lac and three ounces of madder compound; the lac and compound must be previously mixed in a glass or earthen bowl; boil five minutes; now wet the cloth in warm water and wring and put in the dye; boil the whole as hour; take out the goods and rinse in clear cold water.

YELLOW-FOR COTTON.

Dissolve two ounces of sugar of lead in two quarts of water. Now dissolve one ounce of the bichromate of potash in another vessel, and dip in the goods, one piece at a time, into the sugar of lead, and then into the bichromate of potash, dry and finse in clean water, and it is done. If an orange color is desired, dip into lime water. The several dyes should be as hot as the hand can bear. S.B.—If the lime water be too strong it will take out the goods.

DYEING RECEIPTS.-MADDER RED.

Take one pound of madder to two pounds of goods; soak the madder in a brass or copper kettle Take one pound of madder to two pounds of goods; soak the madder in a brass or copper kettle over night, in warm water enough to cover the goods you whalt to color; next morning put in two ounces of madder compound for every pound of madder you have soaked; then wet your yarn or cloth in clean water and wring out; afterwards put it in the dye; now place the kettle over the fire and bring it to a scalding heat, which will take about half an bour if a light color is wanted, mad longer if a dark one; the color depending upon the time it remains in the dye. When the color is made, rinse the goods immediately in cold water, and it will then be finished.

DYEING RECEIPTS.-GREEN and YELLOW for WOOLLEN.

For every pound of yarn or cloth add three and one-half ounces of alum and one pound of fustic; steep it to get out the strength, but do not boil; soak the cloth until it acquires a good yellow color, then throw out the chips and add indigo compound slowly until you have the desired shade of green. An ounce or so of the compound is required for the above quantity, according to the depth of shade. For two or three pounds of goods, take one-half pound of copperas, dissolve it in water sufficient to cover the goods; have it scading hot, wet the cloth in soft water, put it into the copperas and let it stand an hour or two; wring the cloth out while the water is so hot that you can just bear your hand in it, then throw out the copperas water. Now take one ounce and a half of prussiate of potash, and a teaspoonful of the oil of vitriol, put into water sufficient to cover the goods, and let them dissolve; again put in the goods, and let them stand an hour or two, having the dye as hot as the hand can bear, wring out and dry, rinse in clean water, and it is finished. Dry in the shade.

DYEING RECEIPTS .- PINK.

For every three pounds of goods take three and a half quarts of water, or enough to cover the acticles you wish to color. Take two ounces of cochineal and half an ounce of cream tartar; steep the cochineal in warm water two hours, or until the strength is entirely extracted, and add the cream tartar; then wash the cloth in clear water, wring it out, and put it in the dye; bring it to a scalding heat; let it remain a few moments and it will be finished. If a light color is wanted, use less cochineal, it a dark one, more—the shade depending on the quantity of cochineal used.

DYEING RECEIPTS.-GREEN FOR COTTON.

One pound of fustic, two ounces of logwood, and one ounce of blue vitriol, will color four or five pounds of goods. Boil the logwood and fustic until the strength is out, then add the vitriol, mix well, and put in the goods; stir ten or fifteen minutes, then wring them out and seou; in strong soap-

DYEING RECEIPTS .- CUDBEAR.

One ounce of cudbear will color one pound of goods. Make a strong soapsuds sufficient to cover the goods, stir in the cudbear; dip the yarn in soda water, put it into the dye, set it over the fire, and keep it hot; stir and air it well; when colored dark enough to suit, wring it, rinse in clean water, and dry. This color should never be dried in the sun, nor permitted to freeze, as either will cause it to fade
