Shocking Tragedy in Brooklyn.

A shocking tragedy occurred in Brocklyn Monday. Rev. James Kemlo, late pastor of the Reformed Church in Mountville, N. J., near Newark, first cut his wife's throat, and then, severing his own jugular vein, leaped from a fourth story window. Both of them died within an hour. Mr. Kemlo had suffered from malaria for three months, his head being especially affected, and it is considered certain that he was insane when he committed the double crime. The scene of the tragedy was the apartments on the fourth flour of the At-lantic State Bank Building, Nos. 49 and 51 Fulton Street. The rooms are occupied by Gideon Kemlo, a compositor in the office of the Evening Post, and his wife, the parents of Mr. Kemlo. 


