

The temperance party in Ontario, in asking for amendments to the License-Act, was that the plebiscite vote submitted to the electors at the municipal elections held in January, 1894, was carried by the large majority of 63,000, thereby showing that public opinion would be behind the government in any restrictive legislation they might enact, and therefore, if the province should take no part in the coming plebiscite campaign, and allow the vote to go by default, we consider that in 1894 a large majority would be polled in favor of prohibition, and we would once more be brought face to face with the agitation for further amendments to the License Act, the argument used being that for the second time in five years prohibition has been carried by a large majority. Therefore, this convention recommends that a campaign be entered upon by the trade to secure the largest possible vote against prohibition and that our plan of campaign be conducted upon the following:

SEVEN REASONS FOR TEMPERANCE.

1. A joint central committee representing the different branches of the trade should be appointed, committee to be empowered to provide and prepare such literature as they may deem necessary for distribution and the use of the press. That sample copies be sent to each local association, that they may advise the provincial secretary which would be most suitable for use in their locality and the probable quantity required. That under extreme circumstances the joint committee shall be empowered to make use of the funds to further the interest of the cause, but it is understood that the principle portion of the moneys received for plebiscite campaign shall be devoted to newspaper and postal distribution of literature.

SEVEN REASONS FOR TEMPERANCE.

2. The attitude of the press of each License District propose to adopt on the question of prohibition, should be ascertained at once by the officers of each local association and such information sent to the central office, not later than the 15th of July.

SEVEN REASONS FOR TEMPERANCE.

3. No part to be taken by the trade in public meetings, this phase of the campaign to be left entirely with the temperance party; this committee considers that public discussion would only assist in the enthusiasm and would bring no practical results to the trade, also further restrictions to the License Act for many years to come, if for the next three each member of the trade will do his part.

SEVEN REASONS FOR TEMPERANCE.

4. That in order to meet our share of the necessary expenses of the campaign this convention here assembled instructs the provincial secretary to notify the various secretaries of the local associations the amount required to be raised for the purpose of defraying the expenses incurred in the coming plebiscite campaign. That each association in addition to collecting the annual membership fee for 1898-99 should collect a special assessment for plebiscite purposes.

SEVEN REASONS FOR TEMPERANCE.

5. That such arrangements be made by each local association as will ensure the seeing of each license holder in their district in order that he may be impressed with the importance of polling every friendly vote in his immediate vicinity.

SEVEN REASONS FOR TEMPERANCE.

6. Re by-elections for Local Legislature. This convention endorses the action taken by the Executive regarding the late provincial elections, but in all elections which may be held, the secretary is instructed to forward to each candidate the four questions adopted by the Hamilton convention, and upon receipt of the answers, copies of the same will be forwarded to the local association for their consideration and action.

SEVEN REASONS FOR TEMPERANCE.

7. We regret to say that in some of the License Districts no Association has yet been formed, and that in a very many the membership is very small. After four years' experience it has been demonstrated that the associations which have been successful, and secured a large membership and thereby were able to secure favors for themselves municipally and otherwise, were those in which they either had a paid secretary who was not a member of the trade and who 'took' charge of their work from purely business motives, or else they had a secretary or presiding officer within themselves who was able to give his time to make a personal visitation, his expenses for such being paid out of the local funds. We think that in fairness to those who are members in this province, and who prove such by having a certificate in their possession, that as you are travelling through this province you should in every instance give the preference to the member as against the non-
