A joint memorial service was held in the Opesa House last Sunday evening in memory of the late D. J. Bruce. Long before the hour of service crowds were seeking admission and by seven o'clock there was scarcely a seat-left. The service was conducted by Rev. Tr. P. Drumm, St. Andrew's church, Rev. Ged. Morris, Methodist church, and Rev. Mr. Britton, Baptist chusch, and was undenominational. The choise of the Methodist and Baptist churches united with the Prebbyterian church and sustained a heautiful and soleman funeral musical service, under the leadership of Mz. John G. MacColl, St. Andrew's church organist, who played the "Dead Masch in Saul," after the closing hymn. The service was most solema and impressive, the keynote being struck with intense feeling when Rev. Mr. Morris read the Seripture lesson beginning with the weeds. "Greater love hath no man thais this; that a man lay down his life for his friends." Though only started five years ago, the system of exchanging children between families in Germany, France and Engiand, has attained wonderful proportions. This year, in Berlin alone, 1500 children have enrolled themselves as applicants for reception as guests abroad in the whole empire there are thousands of eager youngsters with the same ambition.

France and Germany, in spite of their traditional bitterness, are the greatest participators in this scheme, but the English under the direction of Lord .
