Sand River.

Sand River is one of the most pleasantly situated villages on this side of the Bay of Fundy. It has a frontage of about eight miles on the shore and is backed up by an almost inexhaustible forest of timber, with a graceful slope to the harbour, on either side, and is considered one of the best timbering places on this shore. Mr. E. J. White will ship this season about sixty cargoes of piling, some three or four cargoes of spars and piece sticks and will ship about two million feet of sawed timber. Several cargoes of piling have been shipped this spring and two vessels are now loading. A very busy time is anticipated here this summer.
