There was no indication of any convulsions of any nature here, but the "doom" sealers held their faith in the prophecy up to the last moment. Several hundred persons who believed Mrs. Woodworth's predictions have been leaving Oakland for high ground during the past week or two, and yesterday they encamped on the hills near Santa Rosa, St. Helena and Vacaville, holding religious services and waiting for news of the destruction.



A cablegram from London says that it is "whispered in official circles that Great Britain will settle the Newfoundland question, temporarily at least, by securing the admission of that colony into the Do-minion." Employs Fifty Hands and Pays No Taxes for Ten Years.

The "Qualification" Questions Again Dismissed by Ald. Boyd.

Queen's Birthday on Monday... The Hospital Extension and Electric Light Questions Considered The Charge for Nurses

The number of citizens who attend

meetings of the Council is not generally great, but quite a large group was attracted to the City Hall last night by the special meeting of the city's representa-tives. The subjects to be considered were the granting of exemption of the Canada featherbone factory, the electric light or plant question, the qualifications of Ald. Boyd, the granting of money for extension to the hospital and other matters. extension to the hospital and other matters. Besides Secretary Kingston, Commissioner Grant, City Engineer Tracy and two or three delegations of citizens there were in attendance: Mayor Taylor, Ald. Wyatt, Taylor, O'Meara, Moule, Fitzgerald, Skinner, Jones, Garratt, Glass, Boyd, Dreaney, Bartlett, Anderson. The first matter considered was the application of Reid Bros. & Co. for exemption from taxes and water rates for ten years on the Canada featherbone factory. Mr. George M. Reid appeared before the Council in support of the application. He explained that the members of the firm had been born and brought up in London. They proposed to carry out this business as they had carried out the business already conducted by them in this city. The Reid firm had taken up all the patents of the featherbone works. In St. Thomas they had free building, free taxes and free water, and they thought that the city might hold out some inducement for a transfer. There were 40 hands earning over \$150 a week in the factory at St. Thomas, working less than full time. They expected to pay about \$250 a week in wages after coming to London.

Ald. Moule moved and Ald. Anderson seconded: Besides Secretary Kingston, Commissioner

Ald. Taylor opposed the idea of bounsing at all. If it were to be given he hoped to see the firm bound to do their part. If they would not come here without being paid to do so they were not wanted. He did not like to see one concern taxed to support another.

Ald. O'Meara said Ald. Taylor's logic was the same old song that had kept London in

Ald. O'Meara said Ald. Taylor's logic was the same old song that had kept London in the background while all kinds of villages throughout the country-side were securing factory after factory. Paris, Brantford, Woodstock and Strathroy could get more factories than London. Unless some steps were taken to lift up the city it would be behind still more.

Ald. Moule and Jones thought that it should be referred back to Council by the

committee.

Ald. Boyd consented to make his motion refer the matter to No. 1 Committee to refer to Council at next meeting. Carried unanimously.

NURSES FOR \$5 A WEEK.

Ald. Taylor asked what charge was made

for nurses in training to go out to citizens from the hospital.

Col. Lewis said it was \$10 a week.

Ald. Taylor said such a tremendous rate prevented the average inan from securing their services. He hoped the Trust would consider the matter of reducing it.

Mr. Complin said the nurses got \$7 a month for the ordinary work of the ward for the first year and \$9 for the second from the city. The money received for their services was paid into the city.

Ald. Taylor said citizens should have the nurses at decent rates. The city was using the nurses in training to hire out for profit. Ald. Jones thought Ald. Taylor was right. It was in the interests of the public that not more than \$5 be charged.

Ald. Taylor moved, seconded by Ald. Moule, that the Hospital Trust be requested to place the rate for hiring of nurses in training to citizens at \$5 a week. Carried unanimously.

A letter from Thomas Browne, secretary of the Western Fair Board, was read, stating that the committee intended having an exhibition of electrical machinery and appliances at the coming Fair, and asking for help to make it a success. As the corporation intended purchasing a plant, the exhibition would be one of interest to the city. The undertaking was a big one, but the Board hoped to see a committee selected by the Council to help it to be carried off successfully.

Mayor Taylor said the Exhibition Board's idea was to have the Council wait until the fall before buying a plant instead of settling the question on June 1 as now intended.




