

LOCAL CROP PROSPECTS.

Between showers the meadows are being cut, and considerable clover hay has already been secured, some of it on the green side. Judging from reports generally, the hay crop will be light, though it certainly has picked up wonderfully in East Middlesex since the killing dry weather of May. Farther east, however, and west of London, reports are not so favorable. Many pastures are as bare as would be expected in August, and the con sequence has been the shrinkage of milk of which the cheese factory men complain. Being short of feed in spring farmers turned their herds out too soon, and thus early stunted, the grass plants fell an easy victim to the May drought. There will yet have to be more intelligent planning done emergencies as this by special fodder crops

at different seasons. Within a week of this writing the wheat harvest will have begun in some favored localities as usual before the hay is all secured. It is some years since fall wheat prospects were as good in this district as at present, though the crop has yet to run the gauntlet of storms and rust, in fact a great deal of the grain is already badly "lodged" in consequence of the rank will try the merit of the self-binders, and will also tend to decrease the expected yield, as the "down" grain will not fill properly. With favoring weather there should be a fine yield in Middlesex, and should the price hold firm, say at about \$1 or over per bushel, the result would be en uraging to farmers and stimulate trade

all round. The staple spring crops-oats, peas and barley-are looking remarkably well to the immediate south, east and north of London, though complaints of a discouraging outlook comey from other quarters.

Corn seems to be receiving more attention this season than in recent years, and present appearances give promise of a heavy crop of fodder. A few farmers are building silors, into which the corn will be cut for subsequent use as ensilage.

The root crops, turnips, mangels, carrots and potatoes are also making a most promising growth, prospects indicating a good yield of the last-named tuber. Farmers are now uniformly successful in check-ing the ravages of the bug with paris green either diluted in water or dusted on. former is the favorite method, one or two applications being sufficient. Garden vegetables and small fruits are growing finely.

What the general fruit harvest will be appears. emains to be seen, though it is likely to be far below what seemed promised by the bloom of spring.

The latest Dominion postal order regarding the mailing, by publishers, of Canadian newspapers to Great Britain is one of the most unreasonable we have heard of for some time. The enormous advance from cent per pound to 1 cent for each two ounces has been made. The inevitable "fraction thereof" is, of course, included. Then, payment in bulk is no longer permitted, but instead each single publication is to be adorned with a postage stamp, which means that almost every published in the Dominion will be compelled to pay for imaginary weight in the observable of the publishers and to compel the Chambers to discuss such bills. A similar law has long existed in the local government of some of the cantons, and is not in itself extraordinary. Without any legislative body in this country would, at least, consider a law recommended by 50,000 electors. It is true that such bills are frequently neglected after being introduced, but if backed by 50,000 votes they would no doubt get consideration. ceded that punishment is necessary for the protection of the people; and while, perhaps, a majority of the people yet believe that the law requiring "a life for a life" is a just one, and that disorder and a reign of terror would follow the abrogation of that law, there are thoughtful people who have observed and studied the condition of society and the effects on criminals of the several modes of punishment for the various phases of crime, who are convinced that the death penalty might without danger to society and civilization be abandoned if some other penalty were substituted that would be equally abhorrent and terrorizing to those deserving punishment.


