MANITOBA SCHOOLS AND SIR JOHN THOMPSON'S PROMISE.

Despite the fact that the British Privy Council has decided that the Manitoba Provincial law refusing to give Government sanction to separate schools is constitutional, the Dominion Government has resolved to review the legislation, with what result remains to be seen.

It may be of interest at this stage to briefly state the facts of the case. The points at issue embrace the history of the Province of Manitoba from the time of the Red River rebellion in 1869-70.

At that time the Governor-General, acting on the advice of the Macdonald Government, issued a proclamation in which he declared: "Her Majesty commands me to state to you that she will be always ready through me, as her representative, to redress all well-founded grievances."

By her Majesty's authority I do therefore assure you that on your union with Canada all your civil and religious rights and privileges will be respected.

As a consequence of this declaration the people of Manitoba consented to join the Dominion, and the Manitoba Act was passed. It guaranteed to the minority that their rights and privileges with regard to education, acquired by law or practice, should be protected.

The Manitoba Government, two years ago, took the ground that separate schools were not recognized by law before the passage of the Act of Union, and passed a law "non-recognizing" no schools except non-sectarian public schools.

Against this act Archbishop Tache petitioned the Governor-General on April 12, 1890, ending his memorial as follows: "I therefore most respectfully and also most earnestly pray that your Excellency, as the representative of our most beloved Queen, should take such steps that in your wisdom would seem the best remedy against the evils that the above-mentioned and recently enacted laws are preparing in this part of Her Majesty's domain."

This appeal was backed up by a petition from members of the Roman Catholic Church in Manitoba in the following terms: "1. That your Excellency the Governor-General in council may entertain the said appeal, and may consider the same, and may make such provisions and give such directions for the hearing and consideration of the said appeal as may be thought proper."

"2. That it may be declared that such Provincial law does prejudicially affect the rights and privileges with regard to denominational schools which Roman Catholics had by law or practice in the Province at the union."

"3. That such directions may be given and provisions made for the relief of the Roman Catholics of the Province of Manitoba as to your Excellency in council may deem fit."

A Dominion election was pending and the Government at Ottawa let many months elapse without taking action. After the election, however, Cardinal Taschereau, of Quebec, and the bishops of the Roman Catholic Church in Canada again stirred up the Ministers, petitioning them for "a remedy to the pernicious legislation above mentioned, and that in the most efficacious and just way."

By this time bye-elections were pending in many constituencies, and Sir John Thompson, to whom the matter appears to have been remitted, deemed it wise to make a promise with the view of tiding over the Administration and temporarily pacifying the memorialists. He reported in favor of letting the law be sent to the Privy Council in England, and added this remarkable statement, which was interpreted by the Roman Catholic petitioners as a promise that remedial legislation would cause if the school law passed by the Manitoba Act were not upset by the imperial authorities:

"If the legal controversy should result in the decision of the Court of Queen's Bench adverse to Catholic views being assumed, the time will come for your Excellency to consider the petitions which have been presented by and on behalf of the Roman Catholics of Manitoba for redress under sub-section 2 and 3 of section 22 of the Manitoba Act, quoted in the early part of this report, and which are analogous to the provisions made by the British North America Act in relation to the other Provinces."

The clause of the Manitoba Act of 1870, under which Sir John Thompson professes to act, is as follows: "22. In and for the Province the said Legislature may exclusively make laws in relation to education, subject and according to the following provisions: "1. Nothing in any such law shall prejudicially affect any right or privilege with respect to denominational schools which any class of persons have by law or practice in the Province at the union."

"2. An appeal shall lie to the Governor-General in council from any act or decision of the Legislature of the Province, or of any Provincial authority, affecting any right or privilege of the Protestant or Roman Catholic minority of the Queen's subjects in relation to education."

The Review of Reviews for October in various ways recognizes the completion of four centuries since Columbus discovered America, and the preparations which are making to celebrate that event during the present and the coming year.

It was evident that Miss Beveridge had selected her temporary studio with a view to convenience. It was next door to the champion pugilist's apartments.

Misunderstanding in the Matter of Holidays.

Proposal to Add Cooking to the Collegiate Curriculum—Smead-Dowd System of Heating for Princess Avenue School Adopted.

Mr. Anderson moved that the chairman of No. 1 committee be censured for his action.

Mr. Craig moved that the chairman of the board be sustained, but also that Mr. Allister be exonerated, as he acted in accordance with a motion passed by No. 1 committee.

Mr. Dewar had ordered the city treasurer to pay the salaries for September to the disbursement principals until after the matter had been settled.

Inspector Carson was at Rectory street school when Mr. Allister's written order came to the principals on the Friday of last week when three pupils at this school; he could not tell how many teachers.

R. J. Blackwell thought that the teachers and principal of this school should be docked two days' pay, and also be fined.

Mr. Dewar said that all the members of No. 1 committee should be censured and not the chairman only. He would sustain Mr. Dewar in his action.

Mr. McEhleran moved and Mr. Tanton seconded a long motion censuring Mr. Allister and upholding Mr. Dewar.

Mr. Cook moved that Mr. Dewar be sustained and also that Mr. Allister be upheld, as he had only carried out the order of No. 1 committee. Mr. Brady seconded.
