A GRAVE SITUATION.

Indiscriminate Massacre of Men, Women and Children at Crete-Armistice Violated.

London, July 17 .- A dispatch from Canea states that on Tuesday evening, after a consular council, one of the consuls declared the situation to be very grave. The military authorities are acting contrary to the wishes of The Situation in Crete Becomes the vali, and the instructions received from Constantinople. The Mussulman population is working actively with the Turkish army, with the usual vexed results. Seven men and two women, who were engaged as harvesters have been massacred at Kostani. Reports come in giving an account of fighting and pillaging in five other villages. Under the pretext of removing the bodies of the sailors who were killed by the insurgents when pursuing a rescue boat containing fugitive Christians, Turkish troops are advancing to Apokorana. The insurgents at Apokorona a day or two ago killed the crew of a Turkish bark. The Turkish troops pursued the insurgents, and in the pursuit fired upon everybody they met along the shore, making no discrimination in favor of women and children, of whom they killed a great The action of the troops has many. caused intense excitement and indignation, and the foreign consuls have made a protest against it to Berovitch Georgi Pasha, the newly appointed Christian Governor of the island. Midsummer Duliness

As a Rule Characterizes the Business Situation

With an Exception in Favor of Cheese and Hides - Fairly Satisfactory Wholesale Trade in Toronto.

Toronto, Ont., July 17 .- R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly statement of trade in Canada says:

At Montreal trade is of a seasonable midsummer character, and in no line is there any special activity except in the exports of cheese, which, while behind the figures of last year, are very fairly maintained, considering the very low market values prevailing in England. Butter, too, is realizing poor prices, sixteen cents being about the figure for fine creamery, with ordinary dairy makes in poor request. In groceries sugars are showing a better demand. Prices are fairly steady at the late decline. There is evidently a general determination to buy carefully. The same is apparently true of boot and shoe orders, and manufacturers in this line are light buyers of leather, the prices of which are, however, firmly maintained. Hides are rather firmer, owing to the fact that some Quebec tanners have put their own buyers on the market in opposition to the dealers' combination. Wool is inactive. Metals and hardware are quiet. Plates of all kinds are firmer, and British makers are in many cases pressed to fill orders. Collections generally are

r market. The wholesale trade at Toronto this week is fairly satisfactory. The movement in seasonable goods is up to expectations, and the assurances that no changes in the tariff will be made within a year, has allayed any feeling of uncertainty that might have existed in industrial circles. Large stocks in hands of manufacturers prevent any advances in quotation, which, in most respects, may be said to favor the buyer. One of the strongest markets is for hides, which are again higher, in sympathy chiefly with the improved tong of the western market. Cattle and cheese are exceptionally

low, owing to the congested state of British markets. Reports from Western Ontario state that grain crops are exceptionally good in many instances, but the hay crop is poor, although probably greater than last year. This is offset by a large crop in the Province of

News from Manitoba is not as encouraging for wheat. There are reports that the crop will be damaged to some extent by rust. Sales of new Ontario red winter wheat have been made at 59c; white, at 60c. The offerings of old white wheat seem restricted, and the British grain markets are hardening. The feature in the stock market is the decline in Commercial Cable and Postal Telegraph, both United States issues. 



A Pioneer Dead,

The Late Andrew Thomson of York Street.

The Founder of Innerkip Village-Father of the Oatmeal Industry-A Useful Life.

The interment of the late Andrew Thomson, who died Tuesday at his nome, 120 York street, took place yesterday afternoon at Woodland Cemetery. Rev. Mr. Macgregor, of Tilsonburg, and Rev. John Clark, city, conducted the funeral services.

The cortege left the family residence at 2:30, a darge number of friends, many from a distance, attending. The pall-bearers were: Messrs. W. Thomson, Seaforth; W. A. Thomson and J. H. Thomson, Mitchell R. B. Saunders, A. T. Saunders and Wm. Waugh, London—all grandsons of the deceased. Robert Thomson, of New York; Charles, of Tilsonburg, Ont., and Walter, of Mitchell, Ont., sons of the deceased, were also pres-

that bind the present generation to the pioneer days of Canada. The aged veteran was born in 1808, at Heaton's Mills, near Kelso, Scotland, and having received his education at the parish school was apprenticed to the millbusiness in Kelso. He was wright married in 1832 to Agnes Vass, who survives him. The aged couple cele-brated the 64th anniversary of their wedding day last April, surrounded by their children and grandchildren. In 1842 Mr. and Mrs. Thomson decided to seek their fortunes in the new land of Canada, and with their three children, Robert, Walter and Elizabeth, settled in the village of Lambton, on the Humber River. He began his career as a millwright in Canada by building the well-known Howland's mill, and also the Gamble mill. In 1846 he removed to Beachville, which was then a thriving village, and bade fair to become the county town, and during a residence of about twenty years there erected most of the important mills in Western Ontario. He ad to contend with all the difficulties incident to a pioneer's life. In many cases mills were built where the only means of approach was by a path blazed through the trees, and everything had to be done without the aid of the mechanical appliances of modern times. He always left behind him the record of sound and honest work-

He was the founder of the village of Innerkip, and may be called the father of the oatmeal industry of Canada. He built and carried on extensive milling operations in Innerkip for several years, having removed from Beachville in 1864. He decided, after having lived five years in Innerkip, to retire, and, having sold out his business, removed to Mitchell and from thence to London, where he quietly spent the closing eight years of a busy and energetic

of Reynard & Shaw, Hunt's City Mills, Moore's mills, in South London,

Mr. Thomson leaves behind him large family, all of whom are occupying prominent positions in their respective neighborhoods. The sons are: Robert, of Brooklyn, N. Y.; Walter, of Mitchell; Henry, of London; Charles, of Tilsonburg, and David, of Texas. The daughters are: Mrs. Saunders, of London, and Agnes, who resides with her mother.

He was a life-long Presbyterian, and was a member of the First Presbyterian Church. He was also a staunch Liberal, and took a deep and intelligent interest in the many stirring political movements that took place during his long life. He was a warm per-sonal friend of the late Hon. George Brown, and a reader of the Globe since ts inception, and also of the Banner. the predecessor of the Globe.

The passing away of the aged veteran was quiet and peaceful, and he leaves behind him as a heritage to his children and grandchildren the memory of a strong, useful and honored life.



Japan's Tidal Wave.

Causes of the Terrible Disaster in the East.

An Earthquake at the Bottom of the Sea Did It.

In a few earthquake, swept over about two Japanese archipelago, destroying all the towns and hamlets, and drowning or crushing to death over 30,000 persons. The scene of the disaster may be easily recognized on the map, from the fact that the devastated coast line swells out into the eastern ocean in a long, symmetrical curve, like a bent bow. The part of the wave that struck this portion of the coast apparently swept a little east of north in its journey from its place of origin, and it barely touched a promontory of the more northerly island of Jesso. No effects have been reported from any other shores, though it will not be surprising if they were at least observable on the northwestern coasts of South America.

The evidence indicates unmistakably the causes that produced this great calamity. If we pour water into a tin dish and then strike the bottom of the dish a sharp blow we shall see the water rise above the point of impact and roll away in a circular wave It seems clear that an exactly similar result of sudden impulse communicated to the water at the bottom of the sea east of the coast of Japan was the primal cause of this overwhelming wave. Some time before the arrival of the wave earthquake shocks were felt along the coast. It is more probable that these shocks, originating under a tract of the sea floor, caused the great disturbance of the sea. The mighty subterranean impulse communicated to the surrounding rocks, would reach the coast some time before the arrival of the sea wave, for an earth wave travels far more rapidly than a wave of the ocean. It was found that the great earth wave, originating a little west of Charleston, and which was felt in our streets a little later, traveled at the rate of about 17,000

feet a second. Other eastern coasts of Japan did not share in the great calamity, though doubtless some of them wer just as near the epicentral tract, or place of origin of the disturbance, befortunately, they do not so completely fill the conditions that rendered possible the piling up of the mountainous wave. The convex shore that was devastated pushes out far toward the edge of the submarine plateau on which Japan rests. The shore line is much nearer than any other part of Japan's coasts to the precipitous Tuscarora depths, where, until last year, the deepest ocean soundings had been made. Lines of soundings show that the submarine slope from this convex shore line to deep water is far steeper than along the more southerly coast. Now, where this wave was formed it may have been miles in width, but it was not high. This has been so in other instances, and there is direct proof in this case, for fishermen a few miles from the shore, under whose boats the wave certainly passed, observed nothing unusual. An enormous mass of water was lifted by a mighty impulse two or three feet above the general level, and the wave movement thus induced spread rapidly from the center, but without increase in height, until it encountered a steeply sloping bottom. But upon entering

this rapidly shoaling water near the land the wave was crowded into less space, piled up, and grew constantly higher until it washed upon the shore, a towering and irrestible mass. Similar waves have been known to rise as high as 200 feet, and subma-

rine earthquake waves that are be-lieved to have crossed the Pacific, meeting just such conditions on the western coasts of South America, have inflicted enormous damage. It is probable that along the most southerly coasts of Japan there were only two or three waves of more than ordinary height, but the more gently sloping sea bottom gave opportunity to retard the onward rush of the water mass, and no damage was done.

WHY THIS WASTE? To the Editor of the "Advertiser":

The price of butter is so low at present that all thoughtful dairymen are endeavoring to stop every leak possible. There are many leaks, however, that yet remains to be closed. One of these is the loss of butter in the skim milk due to imperfect systems of creaming. During this season we have gone to far-mers' houses in the vicinity of Guelph and requested them to allow us to take samples of skim milk. These we have brought to the dairy and tested with the Babcock tester. It is surprising the loss of butter that is sustained in this way. We found persons using the old-fashioned earthenware crocks and pans, the small tin pan, the ordinary shotgun pan, set in water, deep cans set in ice water, creamers, and one separator. I presume that similar conditions would be found in almost every neighborhood where farm butter-making is practiced. To show what this waste means we give the tests for one day, May 29, morning and evening:

.....0.90 What do the above figures mean They mean that patron No. 1 is losing over three-quarters of a pound of butter for every 100 pounds of skimmilk. Patrons Nos. 4, 7 and 8 are losing from one and a quarter to one and a half pounds of butter per 100 pounds of skim milk. Five cows would produce about 100 pounds of skim milk a day, in which there is on the average one pound of butter. It is a very good cow that makes a pound of butter per day throughout the season, therefore, the above dairymen are losing the product of one cow each day. Her feed and care are practically wasted.

those who possess it." THE ARMY WORM. As the terrible army worm has made its appearance in Western Ontario, the methods employed successfully to destroy them in the United States should be made known and practiced here. The pest generally first appears in meadows and pas-tures, and if discovered here it can e checked by digging a ditch around The best of serges—domestic and imported—various kinds, hard and soft into the ditches, and are unable to crawl out. If the pest has commenced to spread, the best method is to sur-round the fields in the line of march with a ditch, the same as to prevent their spreading. At intervals in this ditch holes are dug, and the worms crawling along the bottom of the ditch, fall into these holes. In this way bushels of these army worms have been collected and destroyed. Mrs. Seleste Coon, Syracuse, N.Y., writes: "For years I could not eat many kinds of food without productions, burning, excruciating pain in way. If an army of worms has al-ready attacked a field it is usually impossible to save it, but the worms may be prevented from spreading further. The importance of knowing what to do, and doing it, may be estimated from the fact that when such an army of caterpillars is on the march, it will often consume an acre of corn or other crop in one day. Nature herself is now aiding in the destruction of this pest, for most of the worms this year have on their back small white eggs, from which hatch small white maggots, which furrow into the worms and sap their life. The worms, not living long

Michael Gilligan and Johnny Ross Honored in the Presence of Thousands.

Society's Medal and Parchment

They Received the Royal Humane

peeches by the Mayor, Dean Innes and R. N. Render-Hearty Cheers for the Recipients-A Happy Occasion.

Last night's band concert in Victoria Park drew one of the largest crowds ever gathered there. It was a double attraction, and will long be remembered by the thousands who heard the pointed addresses given by Rev. Dean Innes, Mayor Little and Mr. R. N. Render, in connection with the presentation of the Royal Humane Society's medal to Motorman Michael Gilligan, for the heroism he displayed in saving the lives of Willie Cowan and Jean Lockhart, on the evening of Jan. 22, 1896. Besides this reward, the mayor also presented him with a handsome gold watch on behalf of Mr. W. C. Lockhart, of London, England, an uncle of Jean Lockhart, in recognition of the noble deed.

It was 8:15 when the Seventh Band struck up the first number, and at 9:15 the event of the evening took place. Dean Innes led the way to the stand, and was closely followed by the mayor, Inspector Sanders, J. Coates Lockhart and the two children, R. N. Render, and others interested in the workings of the society. Tables were placed at a convenient place in the band stand, upon which the rescued children were placed, facing the massive audience. Little Jean Lockhart was dressed in a light blue sailor suit, and Willie Cowan in a gray suit. Dean Innes, president of the London Humane Society, was the first speaking was well known. "It is," he said for the presentation of a medal to Mr. Gilligan for having risked his life in saving the lives of these two children (pointing to the little boys), and I think when you look at them you will be of the same opinion as I am, that they are worth saving. When a remarkable act of bravery is performed in the British army, the soldier is presented with the Victoria Cross by her Majesty the Queen. We have no Queen here tonight, to pin a medal upon the breast of Mr. Gilligan, but his act was as laudable as of any ever performed upon the field of bat-tle. Unable to swim himself, and yet not thinking of any risk he might run, Mr. Gilligan at once went to the assistance of two children struggling in the water, and proved the means of their rescue. I wish to say a word about our London society, of which I have the honor to be president. It is an organization for the suppression of cruelty, and to teach the young the power of kindness, but it has to have a means of support. In Toronto, Hamilton, Guelph and other places finances have never been wanting to carry on the good work, and we have sought a small contribution from you tonight to help on the good work of the society. We have not only a medal to present, but a parchment to Johnny Ross for assisting Mr. Gilligan in rescuing one of these children." After describing the act, the dean apologized for the absence of Hon.
