

THE MAKING OF TERRACES. A Wrinkle or Two of Value In Terrace Building.



In making a single terrace it is a somewhat difficult matter to make a loose bank of earth remain in place until the sod is applied, and even after the sod is in place any pressure on the top of the terrace is likely to cause the whole upper edge to slip off. To prevent this trouble drive two or three rows of stakes along the extent of the proposed terrace, and to the upper part nail rough boards, as shown in the cross section in Fig. 1. This will hold the heaped up earth in place till the sod is applied. and thereafter will give great firmness to the terrace until nature so compacts all the materials as to make slipping impossible, as shown in Fig. 2.

There is shown in this cross section an excellent point in applying turf to terraces. The end of the roll is begun on the level top of the terrace and is carried



THE TERRACE FINISHED. out over the edge and down the slope, thus giving no open crack at the upper edge, where an opening is specially detrimental to the well being of a terrace. As sharp and distinct an edge can be made in this way as where the opening comes at the edge, while the results of the former practice are far superior.

Restoring Pastures.

Where pasture grasses have been killed out in places and it is desired to restore them without plowing the whole field, it may be done as follows, says Country Gentleman: Thoroughly harrow the bare places, and where mosses are growing give a top dressing of quick or caustic lime at rate of about 40 bushels per acre. Many old pastures have run out in the last few years because of the acidity of the soil, or because the available supply of plant foed has become depleted. After thoroughly harrowing the bare places sow on them a mixture of grass seeds made up as follows: Six quarts timothy, 2 quarts red clover, a quart alsike, a pint white clover, 2 pounds orchard grass. The quantities given are the rate per acre. After sowing harrow again and roll thoroughly.


Very frequently the cattle will persist in pawing and digging up these bare places and preventing the grass from getting a start. This can be obvisted by covering over with brush to keep the cattle off until the grass has an opportunity to get a footing. If you could put a light top dressing of barn manure on the newly seeded spots, it would be advisable. If you have not the barn manure, then give an application of 100 pounds nitrate of soda, 200 pounds of dissolved phosphate rock and 75 pounds

According to The Farm Journal, you can get a sed quickly on upland by sowing blue grass, 15 pounds; orchard grass, 7; sheep fescue 3; meadew foxtail, 2; timothy, 5; white clover, 5; redtop, 8. For low, wet land leave out the orchard grass and white clover and add more redtop, say 6 pounds.



A Tale of Horror.

Wreck of the French Steamer Ville de St. Nazarire.

Only Four Men Saved Out of the S7 Souls on Board-Terrible Sufferings of the Passengers.

New York, March 18.—The World to-day publishes the following: The schooner Hilda, which plies along the coast between Perth Amboy and Sa schooner Hilda, which plies along the coast between Perth Amboy and Sa-brown gelding, \$99, to D. McCallum, coast between Perth Amboy and Savannah, came into port last night bearing with her a story horrible even in the annals of the Atlantic Ocean. She carried down in her cabin four passengers whom she had picked up on Monday along the coast ten miles off shore.

The persons were Capt. Berrie and three members of the crew of the Ville De St. Nazaire. They were unconscious or insane when discovered. Four dead bodies found on the beach were consigned to the sea. 



In the early part of this century the Chippewas of the Thames invited the Munceys to come and reside among them, and gave them a part of their reserve Little by little the latter overflowed the boundaries of the part assigned them, and this brought about a claim on the part of the Chippewas against the Government. The case went to the Exchequer Court, but shortly afterwards the Indians stated their desire to meet the views of the Department and come to some amicable settlement. The Department agreed to the proposal since. Whatever may have been the strictly legal aspect of the case, on equitable grounds some compensation was due to the Indians. By the terms of the agreement, such lands as in the opinion of the Department the Munceys held over and tinent. Whatever may be thought of above their actual requirements should be returned to the Chippewas, and for such as should be returned a payment was to be made in cash. The sum voted by Parliament at its session of one year ago was \$17,640.

Speaking generally of the Indians

already referred to, Mr. A. S. Mc-Dougall, of Melbourne, the Indian agent in the district, stated in his report that they all showed a material advancement in the improvement o their lands, their educational condition and their general thriftiness. 
