## WHEN CAR CRASHED INTO SHANTY AT RECTORY ST. G. T. R. CROSSING

Aged Timothy O'Leary Killed as He Sat in His Chair With the Levers of the Derails in His Hands.

## FATHER AND SON WERE INJURED

A Dozen Passengers Had a Miraculous Escape From Death When Freight Train Backed Into a Loaded Ottaway Avenue Car-An Inquest Has Been Ordered.

Night Watchman Timothy O'Leary, of the G. T. R., was killed: Motor man J. A. Facey, of the street railway, was painfully injured. Mr. Joseph E. Wyckoff and son Max were hurt, and a number of other passengers on the car had marvellous escapes from instant death, when a freight train, in charge of Conductor Stoner and Engineer Sharpe, of Allandale, backed into an Ottaway avenue car last night shortly before 9 o'clock at the Rectory street crossing of the Grand Trunk. That any of the pas sengers on the car escaped death or serious injuries at the least is a mat ter of wonder to every person who visited the scene of the accident. Coroner Ferguson took charge of the remains of Watchman O'Leary

and ordered an inquest. The freight train had just pulled in from Allandale, and the engineer had received orders to back up, in order to shunt the cars into the siding

Watchman O'Leary was at the time in his shanty attending to the signals and switches.

The Ottaway avenue car, north bound, came up to the derail at the south side, and received a signal to go ahead. As the car got ento the crossing, the freight leomed up beside them from the west. The caboos hit the front end of the street car.

It was swung around, and dragged up the track for twenty or thirt feet parallel with the Grand Trunk tracks.

The caboose and three other cars were detailed by the impact, and the former crashed over the watchman's shanty, where Mr. O'Leary was work-

### CRUSHED LIKE A PAPER BOX.

In an instant the little house was crushed like a paper box Mr. O'Leary was sitting in a chair at the time the accident took place, with the leverin his hands. His neck was broken and he was otherwise badly mutilated. In the meantime the passengers on the street car were in a most terrifying position. They had been dragged up the track for 50 feet amid the grinding and crashing of breaking steel and wood, and with broken glass flying all about them.

Conductor Honsberger, who was in the rear of the car, saw the crast coming and jumped.

Motorman Facey was pinned for a short time in the vestibule of the car, but managed to make his escape—how he does not know.

When the car stopped it was lying at an angle parallel with a freight

car, the trucks having been pulled from under it. The passengers lost no time in tumbling out of the windows and deers

They all got away safely, with but minor bruises. Little Max Wyckoff was hurt the worst of the passengers. He was sitting near a window at the front of the car with his father when the crash came, and his face was painfully cut.

### BODY UNDER THE WRECK.

As soon as possible Dr. Mugan was called, and the ambulance summoned. A search revealed the body of Mr. O'Leary under the wreckage he was removed as soon as possible. When Dr. Mugan arrived, it was found that death had been instantaneous. Near his side was found his watch which had stopped at 7 minutes to 9, the time of the accident.

A pathetic feature of the accident was the fact that the dead man's son, Mr. Michael O'Leary, is night foreman at the Rectory street yard. He was working as usual when the crash came, and was one of the first to reach the wreck of the little shanty where the train had crushed the life out of his aged father. Not a moment was lost by him in getting the men at work to attempt a rescue if possible. He was one of the first to see his dead father, and immediately gave instructions for the notification of the

Rev. Father McKeon, rector of St. Mary's Churca, was summoned, and broke the news to the family.

There was great excitement for a time, as it was reported that a redheaded man, whose name was unknown, was talking to Mr. O'Leary a moment before the accident, and that he, too, was in the wreckage. A search was institued for him, but no signs of the man could be found. In all probability he left some time before the accident.

Mistaken signals are apparently the cause of the accident. Both Motorman Facey and Conductor Honsberger, of the street rallway, claim that they received orders to go ahead. The derail was set properly for them, it is claimed, which would set a signal against the freight,

When he saw that a crash was inevitable jumped and ran north. An instant later the derailed cars crashed through the shanty carrying the signaimen along for thirty feet.

Afraid of the Sight.

"I have been sick for some time and was afraid that I could not stand to see the injured," he told the fireman. He was under the impression that Motorman Facey and the street car passengers had no chance for escape. "I saw nothing until the train struck the front vestibule, and I do not know how I escaped," Motorn an Facey told The Advertiser at his home this morning. "I was struck on the leg by chinery, and while my leg was wrench-ed I did not consider it :crious until found I was unable to walk about." Facey will be under the care of a physician for some time, as the nuscles of his leg are torn.
