## GREAT BATTLE IN RUSSIANS ROUT TURKS IN

# TURKS ROLLED UP IN 16-HOUR FIGHT WITH MUSCOVITES

Russians Driving Ottoman Armies Before Them---Reach Point Close to Mesopotamian Border---Breach Made By Germans in Galicia Repaired.

Petrograd, March 23 .- Via London. - Russian troops pushing west from Kermanshah, in Persia, have reached a point less than 45 miles from the Mesopotamian border. The war office announced today that after a Turkish army had been beaten in a 16-hour battle outside of Kerind, the Turks had retreated to the vicinity of Kerind and made another stand there.

Another Russian column has attacked the Turks along the Shirwan River, a tributary of the Dials, about midway between Kermanshah and Sakkiz, from which last point another Russian army has been pushing southwestward into

#### Mesopotamia. New Success at Van.

The Russians also have won a new success near Lake Van, in Southern Turkish Armenia, capturing men and material on the southwestern shore of the lake. The official statement reads: Caucasus front: During the night of Wednesday, a body of our scouts penerated unnoticed into the enemy's trenches near Hatvan, on the southwest shore of Lake Van, and by a daring at-tack captured without firing a shot a machine gun section consisting of three officers, eighteen Askaris, and two machine guns, together with an apomeo-meter, an instrument for measuring altitudes, and a telephone

Fighting on the Shirwan. "In the direction of Pendjivin, our troops joined in combat with the Turks, occupying the southern shore of the River Shirwan, about 6 2-3 miles north

of Pendjivin. 





Here is an inexpensive gingerbread recipe, which requires no eggs: It is tried and true, and not found wanting. Into a flour sifter put 3½ cups flour, 1 cup granulated white sugar, 1 dessert-spoon each of ginger, cinnamon and baking powder, 1 teaspoon of ground cloves. Sift them all into a bowl, pour over it 1 cup (small) molasses, half cup shortening; stir till smooth. Then add 1 cup of boiling water, mix well and bake.

Now for some garden hints: In your garden of vegetables, plant a row or

two of some flowers (annuals), such as asters, popples, etc. It will make the garden spot prettier and more attractive, also gives you flowers to cut for the table, thus feasting for the eyes as well as vegetables for the mouth. When transplanting any plant, be sure and pour a cup or so of water into the hole before putting in the dirt around the roots. Tomato plants should be laid down with their roots northward in the hole, then covered up with earth as far as the first leaves, to insure good rooting. The most important item about gardening is in the care of it after the sowing and planting. Should be hoed often. Providing the garden ground is good, with plenty of hoeing, weeding and watering (in very dry weather), the garden should be first class. I think gardening is a very healthful recreation, and raising chickens is quite interesting as well as healthful. For farmers girls it provides a chance to be out in the fresh air.



Both letter writers have grasped the idea that thrift is something bigger and of more universal application than saving a quarter of a pound of butter a week, and having five buttons instead of six on the coat.

They recognize the importance of conservation of material resources, but they realize also the value of thrift as applied to health, strength and life itself.

The opinions of the two philosopher-economists are well worth reading.

## HER GREATEST ASSET.

Dear Miss Armstrong,—I was interested last week to hear the comments of 'Tired Business Girl' on the talk of "Medicus" on Food Values, and also about the experiences of herself and sister in regard to light housekeeping.

I am a business girl, too, but, I am happy to say, not a tired one. I am I am a business girl, too, but, I am happy to say, not a tired one. I am iiving far away from my home and people, doing light housekeeping myself in rooms. I consider that my health is my greatest and most important asset. If I am tired, there is something the matter with my health, or I am not taking the care of myself that I should. I have been obliged to think for myself and look after myself, and that is probably one reason why I have given a good deal of thought to the best way to take care of my health and provide a store of aparty against the future.

When I had German measles some weeks ago the doctor whom I consulted told me that I was one of the soundest patients physically he had ever come across. I attribute this to regular habits and plenty of good food that agrees

There is no economy in doing without nourishing food that is required by There is no economy in doing without nourishing food that is required by the system. I have made a careful study of what foods agree with me, and, regardless of what "Medicus" says about the low food value of meat, I have found that I require it, and in good quantity. I never stint myself on milk, butter, eggs, meats, vegetables or fruits, and at the same time I never waste money on pastry that might please my palate but injure my digestion. I drink very little tea or coffee, because there is no nourishment in them. Instead, I have milk or malted milk, which I like and find agrees with me. Sometimes I have malted milk with cooks, and by varying combinations find I do not use the malted milk with cocoa, and by varying combinations find I do not

Some people say to me that fruit is too dear to buy. I don't think so, when it helps to keep me in good condition and saves doctor's bills. An apple costs 5 cents. I have one during the forenoon, and usually an orange between ny 12:30 o'clock dinner and 6:30 c'clock tea. I never require to take medicine

of any kind.

Living alone and buying in small quantities, I am obliged to plan my meals ahead in order to prevent any waste. For example, one day I take home a piece of steak and a can of peas, of which I am very fond. As soon as I get into my rooms I put on the kettle and the pan over the gas blaze. By the time my hat is off and hands washed everything is in readiness for me to put the steak on to broil and to put the peas on to heat.

I have not been using potatoes this winter. In the first place they are expensive, and in the second other veretables agree with me better. I find rice.

pensive, and in the second other vegetables agree with me better. I find rice an excellent substitute and have it frequently.

The morning after my steak dinner I cut up the remainder of the meat in small pieces, and put it into the double-boiler with water and any vegetables left over, some bits of onion, perhaps, and peas from the day before. I leave the double-boiler over the gas turned very low, and when I come home at noon my dinner is already maiting for me. ny dinner is already waiting for me.

Plenty of sleep is most necessary for health. I usually am in bed at 9:30 o'clock at night and up in the morning at 6:30 o'clock. I am well rested and wide-awake as soon as I am up. I have ample time to do up all my "house-work" before coming down to business. I always walk, no matter what the weather, and get my exercise in that

I know by experience that I feel forty times as well when I am cheerful. I know by experience that I feel forty times as well when I am cheerful. That is one reason why I always walk on the sunny side of the street, excepting when it is too hot. I never read a morbid or melancholy book. I pick out the books that cheer and inspire me and give me a happier outlook on life. Of course I read the war news. Apart from the personal interest I have in it, I would consider it necessary to do this in order to be informed. The news of the day brings cadness but there is no sense in picking out degreesing general. the day brings sadness, but there is no sense in picking out depressing general

Amusement is necessary, too, for good health. For my own part I like thred. If I had poor health and were "a Tired Business Girl," I wouldn't be in a position to serve my employer as I should, to do my bit of service for the other people in the world, or to enjoy life while I was living it.

week, I feel I am providing for the future when I am keeping myself strong and well. I don't intend to run through my "principal" and have nothing left

and well. I don't intend to run through my "principal" and have nothing left in the way of a constitution in a few years, when so far as I can see at the present time, I will still be obliged to depend upon myself.

These are my ideas of thrift for the business girl.

I am afraid I have taken up a great deal of your space, but I see so many business girls who are only half fit for their work all the time, because they do not take proper care in regard to their food, clothing and rest, that I do want to tell them some of the things that are helping me.

SIMPLE DIET HIS HEALTH SECRET.

A well-known London businessman tells as follows how his family expenses en cut down through a knowledge of food values, which is also the secret of his ability to be at work, feeling physically fit, six days in the week:

Dear Editor, "Consumers' League,"-I have been following your column ever since it started, and have been particularly interested in the articles on food values, especially in their relation to the high cost of living. Personally I am firmly convinced that the real source of high cost of living in many homes is not so much the high cost of commodities as indulging cravings instead of supplying needs. It has often amused me the scientific care a man will take in supplying needs. It has often amused me the scientific care a man will take in feeding his horse and the utter lack of intelligence he displays about what he eats himself. You may say this is the woman's business, to provide the meals. But what of the man who lunches at restaurants or is obliged to board entirely away from home? Shouldn't he exercise some common sense in choosing? Again, isn't if quite in order for a man to make suggestions to his wife, mother or sister, about points she perhaps hasn't considered, with regard to reducing expenditure and work as well? Mind you, I know it must be done tactfully. I often act on suggestions from my wife in connection with my business, but she is the kind of woman who never makes me feel she knows more about it than I do, even if I recognize it myself.

Observation and experience have taught me that the average man eats three Observation and experience have taught me that the average man eats three times as much as he needs. A horse will pull a ton and a half a whole foremon on a breakfast of two quarts of oats and some hay for bulk. All that a man needs to do a good forenoon's work is a generous bowl of oatmeal, a piece of toast, and a cup of coffee. I have tested it and know. I have my breakfast at 8 o'clock in the morning, and lunch at 1 o'clock. I don't know what it is to have a headache, backache or to feel fatigued, and I feel sure that is more have a headache, backache or to feel fatigued, and I feel sure that is more than many men years my junior who apply themselves much less closely to work can say. I'm not going to tell you my age, but I will admit that I have three grandchildren, one of whom is old enough to be a school cadet. I am getting younger every year on a simple diet. Apart from the feeling of vigor and good health enjoyed by the men I have known who made simple diet their rule, they have invariably been men of keen alort intellect. Did you ever see a governed. have invariably been men of keen, alert intellect, Did you ever see a gourmand

I was a young man living in Philadelphia at the time of the Centennial in 1876. One little incident that came to my attention at the time awakened my interest in the subject of food values, though people had scarcely begun to think of them then. George Washington Childs, proprietor of the Public Ledger, Philadelphia, gave an elaborate banquet of many courses in his home in bonor of the commissioners of the exposition. Four wine glasses stood beside each cover. Those of the host were turned down, empty, though prohibition had not begun to be talked about. It was before the days of Carrle Nation. George Washington Childs' dinner was a bowl of porridge and milk.

In these days when foodstuffs are high and patriotism demands thrift in their use and in the expenditure of money, it is doubly important that people should take a stand against pampering their appetites and coaxing them with expensive condiments. The best sauce for any food is appetite, and the man woman who eats only what is required for health and strength is sure to have that in abundance

"It is with sentiments of the most profound satisfaction that the peoples of Great Britain and the British dominions have learned that their great ally, Russia, now stands with the nations which base their institution upon responsible government.

"Much as we appreciate the loyal and steadfast co-operation which we have received from the late emperor and the armies of Russia during the last two and one-half years, yet I believe that the revolution whereby the Russian people have based their destinies on a sure

have based their destinies on a sure foundation of freedom is the greatest service which they have yet made to the cause for which the allied peoples have been fighting since August, 1914.

"It reveals the fundamental truth that this war is at the bottom a struggle for popular government and liberty. It shows that throughout war the principle of liberty, which is the only sure safeguard to peace in

war the principle of liberty, which is the only sure safeguard to peace in the world, has already won one resounding victory. It is a sure promise that the Prussian military autocracy, which began the war and which still is the only barrier to peace, will itself before long be overthrown.

"Freedom is a condition of peace and I do not doubt that as the result of the establishment of a stable constitutional government within their borders, the Russian people will be strengthened in their resolve to prosecute this war until the last stronghold of tyranny on the continent of Europe is destroyed and free peoples in all lands can unite to secure for themselves and their children the blessings of fraternity and peace."







good crops could be produced from it he said. He recommended the early Ohio variety of potatoes planted 4 inches deep in rows 30 Inches apart. The seed potatoes, he said, should have plenty of eyes. He did not recommend cutting potatoes that were much smaller than an egg. The larger potatoes he advised the gardeners to cut into portions each containing several eyes instead of in the old manner by which the end was cut off the potato and the tuber then cut down the centre. April 20, he said was about the earliest date for planting.

Other varieties of vegetables which he recommended were: Corn, golden bantam; cabbage, Copenhagen; lettuce, mammoth white and Grand Rapids; radishes, icicle and French breakfast; parsnips, hollow crown; carrots, early Shorthorn and Chantenay; squash, summer crook neck and late Hubbard;




