# SPEND \$274,000 TO BUILD NEW

Education Committee To Submit Estimate of This Amount For Construction.

\$70,000 FOR EALING

Same Amount For Adding To Wortley Road School-A Big Program.

After No. 2 committee of the board of education had pared its estimates of building operations this year for the public schools, it pared them once more, public schools, it pared them once more, and in consequence the estimates to be submitted to the board of education will total only \$274,000.

The board's architect, L. E. Carrothers, estimated the cost of a four-room school at Ealing, plus a kindergarten, at \$80,000. At Victoria school a four-room addition and an assembly hall were first put up at \$80,000, but Trustee Harry Hayman pointed out that by making a few changes practically \$10,000 could be saved, and the estimate was changed to \$70,000, which was also the total of the amount that was deemed necessary to expend on Wortley road school, where it is proposed to add six new rooms to take care of the congestion that exists there are of the congestion that exists there the present time. The northeast section of the city, which is growing fast, will have a four-room school with all improvements, the cost being put at \$35,000. The original estimate called for \$50,000. The original estimate called for \$50,000. If all plans carry the warfare between the board of education and the board of health over the installation of lavatories in the Colborne street south School will end this year, for the committee proposes to spend \$6,000 on the school this year, and this includes an appropriation for school lavatories, Improvements that are needed at Simcos street school were figured out at \$15,000.

#### ENTER THE MARTIANS.

No sooner an end-of-the-world scare over than we hear of wireless signals from Mars. This time it is no less a person than Marconi himself who assures us that signals in the Morse alphabet are received on wireless instruments of this Terra, and he seems half inclined to credit the interferences to operators somewhere in outer space. Between Mr. Einstein proving that straight lines curl up and the rappings from Mars we feel like Alice in Wonderland.

It beats all how those Martians have got onto our wireless and its code, learnt our various languages and now proceed to butt into our affairs. Perhaps in a few weeks' time we shall be having the tremendous sensation of hearing definite, continuous news from the older planet. They will be telling us that we need not reply as they see and hear all that Terra is doing. They may suggest how we may answer them If we well, but it is doubtful whether we should understand the method.

Very likely H. G. Wells will be informed intellectual and soulless mechanisms using every sort of Frightfulness, was wrong, and that Mars for all its evil name is a home of peace. Having watched with grief the European war and its consequences, the brutalities of our Earth in the slaughter of birds and furred animals for female show and all the sins between China and the Congo, the Martians take pity on our troubles and offer, let us suppose, a delegation of social experts to arbitrate all mundane difficulties. But would Earth listen to

the Martians or any other angels from the sky? The whole thing may fall through like the end-of-the-world proposition. Perhaps the interpolations on the wireless are spirit rappings! Let us hear from Sir Oliver Lodge and his corps of mediums. Not Mars, perhaps, but the Twentieth Plane, is knocking at our door. The chances are that the question will be solved by any other science than that of the psychic, prices "would mean disaster." Whose disaster? which solves hitherto only the easy problem of separating simple people from their cash. Certainly every one will be glad if the Martians are coming and as friends.

Already the necessity and the imminence of reconstruction are accepted facts; already, indeed, one can detect a tendency to treat them as accepted commonplaces. A period of change is always to some degree a period of danger. According to one modern humorist, "In changing your opinions as in changing a fifty-dollar bill, it is important to watch you change." Certainly the future forms of life in Canada and beyond are matters of concern to all good men.

But a period of change is chiefly to be regarded as a day of opportunity. In the presence of changes so far reaching and fundamental as those in operation or now predicted, leadership and service will be of untold value. The fact constitutes a call to Christians of all ranks.

During the summer months these splendid birds are numerous at Port Stanley.

If we can carry this spirit of co-operation and sacrifice into this period of reconstruction we have nothing to fear; "but if, on the other hand," continues the Liberal leader, "each element in our national life is going to seek to go its own gait, unwilling to join hands with other groups that share like aims and aspirations to its own, if each separately intends to aim at domination in national affairs, then we may look for a prolongation of the period of confusion, and, in the end, retrogression rathe than advance." Co-operation of the kind urged by Mr. Mackenzie King is one of our great needs today for still another reason. It is a long step forward in the way of that national unity for which the best men in the public life of Canada today are laboring, particularly in the ranks of Mr. King's party. As a group bats are of world-wide distribution except in the inhospitable polar regions. They are real mammals, and present an extraordinary varia-tion in size, from tiny little creatures almost as small and fragile as butterflies, to the huge fruit bats, with a spread of wings like that of a wild

The heads of bats are strangely sculptured. some being smoothly contoured and shaped like those of little foxes; others appear like miniature bulldogs; and still others have curious cartilaginous nose-leaves upright on the muzzle. Some have the entire face molded into a hideous mask repulsive to

look upon. Their habits are equally varied to meet special conditions. #### KEEPING SCRAP CLEANED UP SAVES MONEY

[Contract.]
Salvage of all discarded materials, says J. W Radford, makes workmen more careful of machinery and economical of repair parts. Mr. Radford ho is superintending the construction of about 5,000,000 cubic yards of levees by walking draglines in the Inter-River Drainage District in Missouri, believes that it is economy for the constractor to keep scraps of iron, such as broken machinery parts, cleared up and disposed of, and not allow these to be thrown away along the right-of-way of the work. It is his opinion that a failure to salvage broken parts tends to carelessness on the part of the workmen with machinery and repair parts. It is not uncommon to walk along work where a dragline or dredge has passed and find broken parts left to rust. A worn-out bucket discarded on top of a spoil tank is not an unusual sight. Mr. Radford thinks it better to collect this scrap iron and haul it where it may be sold or otherwise disposed of. even though doing so apparently costs more than to throw it away. A teamster can do this work at odd times, when he would be doing little work of any sort, and thus it really costs very little. #### MUST PAY EVEN FOR DOGS. [New York Times.]

ANSWER—Dissolve three drams of potassium chlorate in four ounces boiling water, and set aside to cool, Dissolve one dram of powdered alum in two ounces and five drams of stronger rosewater, and add half an ounce of glycerine and half an ounce of syrup, and three drams fluid eara of the gum (eucalyptus rostrata). ## FINDS SERIOUS **UNREST AMONG** U. S. FARMERS

Assistant Postmaster-General Tells of Widespread Grievances.

CANNOT SECURE HELP

Cities' Lure, Middlemen's Profits, Cutting Down Acreage, Says Official.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—The existence of a serious condition of unrest among the farmers of the United States was brought to light today before the Senate postoffice committee, when James I. Blakslee, one of the assistant postmasters-general, summarized the results of a questionnaire sent out to farmers throughout the country asking for suggestions as to how the postoffice department might aid in reducing the cost of living.

Forty Thousand Reply.

More than forty thousand replies presented the grievances of the agricultural class, and the writers of 50 per cent of these said they intended to leave their farms or cut down the acreage cultivated. The chief complaints came from New England and the middle west and the south.

Cannot Secure Heip.

Inablity to obtain help was one main trouble. Hired help and the farmers' children, said the writers, had been lured to the cities by higher pay and easier living. Higher middlemen's profits on farm products was another grievance, a third being the tack of proper agencies of contact between the farmer and the ultimate consumer. YUDENITCH RELEASED.

Private advices from Reval say General Yudenitch was released as a result of pressure exerted by French and British authorities there. Everything is reported quiet at Reval.

The arrest of General Yudenitch by General Balakovitch, a former officer of the northwestern army, was a personal affair growing out of Balakovitch's animosity towards his old chief, according to diplomatic advices received today. Balakovitch has no official status, and is merely a member of the recently-disbanded northwestern army.

#### RESISTANCE TO REDS DISAPPEARS ON MANY FRONTS

London, Jan. 30.—Difficulties of sup-ly have probably stopped the advance of Bolshevik troops along the Trans-iberian Railroad west of irkutsk, ac-Siberian Railroad west of Irkutsk, according to advices to the war office. J., Murphy, Prof. Sherwood Fox, Dr. Paul S. McKibbon and J. H. Chapman composed the deputation from the university which came to explain the matter.


