Must Be Those Certified Sixty Days Before Nomination Day.

Ottawa, Sept. 22.—Numerous inquiries have been received here concerning voters' lists. In reply, it should be stated that the voters' lists used in any Dominion election are the lists for the several polling divisions certified to 60 days before nomination day. Under this clause of the act it might so happen that in the coming general elections some of the lists used would be those revised in 1903. The remainder would be those revised during the present year. Candidates in applying the 60 days' provision to the lists in their own constituencies can, so soon as the nomination day is announced, calculate what lists they may have to use. 




