Electric Line Promoters Taking Active Steps for the New Road.

Will Ask Council for Right of Way-Want to Enter Windsor by Glengarry Avenue.

Windsor, Ont, Feb. 28.-The first active step affecting local interests in the construction of the new electric line from Windsor to Chatham by way of Essex, will be taken on Monday evening at the meeting of the city council, when application will be made for entrance into the city and the right of way over the streets A. J. Nelles, of Hamilton, is in the city making arrangements for the presentation of the by-law.

"We have been very successful se far," said Mr. Nelles to-day, "in securing right of way, and have settled that part of the work with the exception of Windsor. We want to enter the city by the gravel road, coming down Glengarry avenue. I cannot tell when operations will be commenced, but work will be started from the Windsor end of the line first. As the country is comparatively level construction work should be hurried along, and the road finished in a reasonable time."

A. J. Nelles is one of the chief promoters in the new road, and is experienced in such matters, having promoted the construction of the 25-mile electric line from Hamilton to Beamsville several years ago. SOLDIERS DIE IN FIERCE STORM

Two Hundred Japanese Militia Men Frozen to Death and Buried in Snow.

They Burned Their Knapsacks to Keep Warm—Ghastly find of Frozen Corpses.

San Francisco, Feb. 28. - Details of the perishings of 200 Japanese soldiers in snow have just reached here by mail from Yokohama.

Col. Yamaguchi Shin and soldiers of the second battalion of the Fifth Regiment of infantry, numbering 215 in all, finding themselves checked in their march by a heavy snowfall, encamped in the Hakkoda mountain on the way towards Tashiro-mura on Jan. 23, and all were frozen to death, with the

single exception of a corporal. Eightj army division was greatly alarmed, and immediately instituted a search and discovered Cupt. Kaminari Bunkishi and two non-commis-sioned officers frozen in deep snew at to the council that the offer be acmissioned officers was restored to life and, according to his statements, the Second battalion stopped, after marching about three ri (about five and a half miles) from Tamogino-mura, and

encamped there for two days.

On the 24th the snowstorm still prevailing, they could not march and were obliged to stay there. Towards night fuel was all gone, and they warmed themselves by burning their knapsacks and their muskets, but many were frozen to death. On the morning of the 25th they attempted to return to Tamogino, but Col. Yama-guchi, commander of the battalion, and numerous other soldiers were frozen to death, one after another, owing to the heavy snewstorm. On this account they could not march out; and came back again to the place of encampment. One hundred and thirty-nine soldiers were already dead by this time, and only 71 were still

This remnant encamped the same

This remnant encamped the same night, and on the 26th the corps was disbanded, allowing the soldiers to proceed in any direction they preferred. On the 27th, when a relief corps arrived, Corp. Goto was found still surviving and standing erect.

Up to 3.50 p. m. on the 29th only four corpses of the members of the missing party were recovered. Nine hundred men of the engineering and infantry and 600 laborers were employed in search of work.

DID JUSTICE TO MAJUBA DAY

Lord Kitchener Sends Ferth Cheering News From South Africa.

Over Six Hundred Boers Captured, Commandant Killed and Dewet's son Taken.

London, Feb. 28 .- General Kitchener gives the details of the disaster which befell the British convoy near Klarksdorp on Feb. 24. Sixteen officers, including Col. Anderson, the commander, were captured, as were also 451 men. One officer and 105 men have since been released. General Kitcheaer makes no mention of the loss of guns. The Secretary of war, Mr. Brodrick, referring to this matter in the House of Commons, said the British casualties were 120.

The heavy casualties, the apparent certain loss of two guns, and the capture of nearly 500 British troops by Boers near Klerksdorp will dull the enthusiasm caused by the success of Gen. Kitchener's second big drive. The prisoners will doubtless be released, but their arms are gone, and such incidents in the past have always tended to give heart to the Boers and stiffen their resistance. Gen. Kitchenerer's first despatch to-day lengthily summarizes the result of several days' combined operations in an area of about 2,500 square miles, in which the engagements of Feb, 23 and 26 occurred. One incident was the killing of the Boer leader Manie Botha and 35 other Boers, in addition to the losses previously reported. The Boers made other small attempts to break through the British lines. In two cas-es they succeeded. The biggest coup was yesterday when 450 Boses, with their rifles and horses, were captured. Unofficial telegrams describe this as

Mrs. Olive Sternaman appears to b tried in Buffalo on the charge of murdering her husband, and acquitted. Then she was brought to Canada, tried here on the same charge, and street car and cab habit. convicted. The conviction was set aside, and she was finally acquitted. Then Mrs. Sternaman brough action against the Metropolitan Insurance company to recover the insurance on her late husband's life. She lost her suit in the lower courts, but now the court of appeals of New York state has given a decision reversing those of the lower courts and deciding in fa-

vor of the fair plaintiff. The final decision is an important one, for it involves an absolutely new ruling, in New York state at least. According to the Buffalo News, "the sole contention was as to whether the insurance company could make the medical examiner, selected, hired and paid by it, the agent for the applicant, so that if the medical director erred in his discretion as to what injuries and ailments should be inserted in the application in answer to the questions those errors of discretion would be imputable to the insured and prevent recovery. The court of appeals has just decided, what has not been before decided in this state, that by no use of English can an insurance company make its agent, selected, hired and paid by itself, the agent for the insured; so that his alleged errors

shall prevent recovery." As the interests of all insured persons were involved in the issue at stake, Mrs. Sternaman's success is a matter to be regarded with satisfaction in this country as well as in New York state. There are many Canadians who hold policies in New York RUBBING IT IN.





GREAT APOSTLE TO THE GENTILES FOUGHT WITH BEASTS THERE.

A GREAT CLOUD OF WITNESSES

Viewing the Christian Life as a Combat, There Is Consolation in the Idea That the Warrior Has Many Celestial Sympathizers-How Life's Temptations, May Be Likened to the Lions in the Path.

Entered According to Act of Parliament of Can-ada, in the year 1902, by William Baily, of Te-ronto, at the Dep't of Agricusture, Ottawa.

Washington, Feb. 23.-This discourse of Dr. Talmage is full of inspiring thoughts for those who find life a struggle and shows that we have many celestial sympathizers; texts, Hebrews xii, 1, "Seeing we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses;" I. Corinthians xv, 32, "I have fought with beasts at Ephesus.

Crossing the Alps by the Mont Cenis pass or through the Mont Cenis tunnel, you are in a few hours set down at Verona, Italy, and in a few minutes begin examining one of the grandest ruins of the world, the Amphitheatre. The whole building sweeps around you in a circle. You stand in the arena where the combat was once fought or the race run, and on all sides the seats rise, tier above tier, until you count elevations, or galleries, as I shall see fit to call them, in which sat the senators, the kings and the 25,000 excited spectators. At the sides of the arena and under the galleries are the cages in which the lions and tigers are kept without food until, frenzied with hunger and thirst, they are let out upon some poor victim, who, with his sword and alone, is condemned to meet them. I think that Paul himself once stood in such a place and that it was not only figratively, but literally, that he had 'fought with beasts at Ephesus."

The gala day has come. From all the world the people are pouring into Verona. Men, women and children orators and senators, great men and small, thousands upon thousands until the first gallery is full, and the second, the third, the fourth, the fifth-all the way up to the twentieth, all the way up to the thirtieth. all the way up to the fortieth. ery place is filled. Immensity of audience sweeping the great circle. Silence. The time for the contest has come. A Roman official leads forth the victim into the arena. Let him get his sword with firm grip into his right hand. The 25,000 sit breathlessly watching. I hear the door at the side of the arena creak open. Out plunges the half starved lion, his tongue athirst for blood, and with a roar that brings all the galleries to their feet he rushes against the sword of the combatant. Do you know how strong a stroke a man will strike when his life depends upon the first thrust of his blade? The wild beast, lame and bleeding, slinks back toward the side of the arena; then rallying his wasted strength he comes up with fiercer eye and more driven back with a fatal wound, while the combatant comes in with stroke after stroke until the monster is dead at his feet, and the 25, 000 clap their hands and utter a shout that makes the city tremble.

Sometimes the audience came to tors fight each other until the people, compassionate for the fallen, turned their thumbs up as an appeal that the vanquished be spared, and sometimes the combat was with wild beasts.

You have tried to fight it back with broken bottle or empty wine flask. Nay, that is not the weapon. one horrible roar he will seize thee by the throat and rend thee limb from limb. Take this weapon, sharp and keen-reach up and get it from God's armory—the sword of the spirit. With that thou mayest drive him back and conquer!

But why specify when every man and woman has a lion to fight? If there be one here who has no besetting sin, let him speak out, for him have I offended. If you have not fought the lion, it is because you have let the lion eat you up. very moment the contest goes on. The Trajan celebration, where 10,000 gladiators fought and 11,000 wild heasts were slain, was not so terrific a struggle as that which at this moment goes on in many a soul. 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
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
