## ECLIPSES, 1910

In the year 1910 there will be four Eclipses, two of the Sun and two of the Moon.
I.-A Total Eclipse of the Sun, May 9, visible to Australia and adjacent Oceans.
II.-A Total Eclipse of the Moon, May 23-24, the beginning visible generally in the central and western portions of Africa, Southwest Europe, South America, North America, excepting Alaska, and the southern Pacific Ocean; the ending visible generally in South America. North America, excepting Alaska, and the central and southern Pacific Ocean. First contact of Shadow, 84 degrees from the north point of the Moon's limb toward the East. Magnitude of Eclipse=1.099 (Moon's diameter $=1.0$ ).
III.-A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, November 1-2, visible to the greater part of Alaska, the northeastern portion of Asia, and the northern Pacific Ocean.
IV.- A Total Eclipse of the Moon, November 16, the beginning visible generally in Africa, Europe, Central and Western Asia, South America and Eastern North America, the ending visible generally in Africa, Europe, Western Asia, North and South America. First contact of Shadow, 93 degrees from the north point of the Moon's limb toward the East. Magnitude of Eclipse=1.131 (Moon's diameter=1.0).

Juriter will be Morning Star till March 31 ; then Evening Star till October 18 and then Morning Star again the rest of the year.

## CAKES，ETC．

## ROLL JELLY CAKE

1 cup sugar． 3 eggs．
1 eup flour， 1 teaspoonful CAMP－ BELL＇S Baking Powder．

Bake in a shallow pan，spread with currant jelly and roll while warm．

## FIG CAKE

One cup sugar，half cup butter，two－ thirds cup sweet milk，two eggs，two teaspoonfuls CAMBPELL＇S Baking Powder，two and a half cups flour．

## BANANA CAKE

One cup sugar，half cup butter，one cup sweet milk，one egg，three cups flour，two large teaspoonfuls CAMP－ BELL＇S Baking Powder．

## CAKES, ETC.

## DOUGHNUTS

One cup sugar, one cup sour milk, two eggs, one teaspoonful soda, a pinch of salt, three tablespoonfuls melted butter.

Beat the eggs, then add the sugar, and beat until very light; then put in the butter and flour enough to make a soft dough. Roll out thin, cut with a doughnut cutter and fry in hot lard.

## APPLE FILLING

One cup of sugar, three apples grated, one lemon, juice and outside of rind; beat together and cook till quite thick. To be cooled before spreading on cake.

## BISCUITS

Sift two teaspoonfuls of CAMPBELL'S Baking Powder with two cups of flour, work in this one tablespoonful of butter, make into a soft dough by stirring in milk or water. Roll dough out into a sheet and cut intn shape with a biscuit cutter it will make elght biscuits. Bakt is a quick oven.

## CORN MUFWINs

One nd a half cups flour, 1 aif cup cornmeal, half cup sugar, half cup butter, two eggs, one cup milk, three teaspoonfuls of CAMPBELL'S Baking Powder.

## CAKES, ETC.

## OATMEAL TRILBYS

$1 / 2$ cup sugar; $1 / 2$ cup lard; $1 / 2$ cup butter; $1 / 2$ cup sour milk; $1 / 4$ teaspoon salt; $1 / 2$ teaspoon soda; 1 teaspoon CAMPBELL'S Baking Powder.

Cream sugar and shortening and add milk and salt. Sift two cups flour, soda and baking powder into two cups oatmeal. Add sugar and shortening. Roll thin, cut and spread dates between.

## DATE FILLING

One pound of dates stoned. Boil with a little water and one-half cup sugar to a thick paste.

## MARBLE CAKE <br> WHITE PART

Quarter cup butter, three-quarters cup sugar, quarter cup sweet milk, oné cup flour, whites of two eggs, one teaspoonful CAMPBELL'S Baking Powder.

## DARK PART

Quarter cup butter, half cup sugar, quarter cup molasses, quarter cup sweet milk, one and a quarter cups flour, yolks of two eggs, one large teaspoonful of CAMPBELL'S Baking Powder, half teaspoonful each of cloves, cinnamon, nutmeg and mace.

Mix the two parts separately, beat until very light, then put in a baking pan a spoonful at a time, taking pains to have the light and dark alternate. This cake will keep a long time.

## HERMETS

Two cups of sugar, one of butter, one of ralsins (stoned and chopped), three eggs, $1 / 2$ a teaspoon of soda, dissolved in three tablespoons of milk; a nutmeg, one teaspoon each of cloves and cinnamon, and six cups of flour. Roll about $1 / 4$ of an inch thick, and cut with a round cake cutter. Bake in a rather quick oven. It will take about twelve minutes.

## CAKES, ETC.

## CHOCOLATE CAKE

1 cup sugar; 1-3 cup butter; $1 / 2$ cup chocolate; $8 / 4$ cup sweet milk; 1 level teaspoon soda ; 2 cups flour ; 2 eggs.

Cream butter and sugar, add melted chocolate and cream with sugar and butter. Add milk, soda, one cup flour and the yolks of eggs well beaten, and then the other cup of flour and the whites of eggs well beaten. Bake in layers.

## CREAM FILLING

2-3 cup of milk and yolk of one egg well beaten. A pinch of salt and sugar to taste. Vanilla flavoring. Let come to a boil and thicken with corn starch.

## WHITE FRUIT CAKE

1 cup butter; $1 / 2$ wineglass wine or milk; 2 cups sugar; 3 teaspoons CAMPBELL'S Baking Powder; 3 cups flour; $1 / 4 \mathrm{lb}$. citron; whites of 8 eggs; $1 / 2 \mathrm{lb}$. almonds; 1 cup chopped cocoanut.

Sift flour and baking powder twice, beat butter to cream, beat in sugar and milk; beat eggs to stiff froth, stir in butter and sugar alternately with flour and fruit which has been slightly floured. Bake in moderately hot oven in two loaves about forty minutes.

## RAISIN COOKIES

$11 / 2$ cups sugar; 1 cup butter; 1 egg; 2 cups raisins, chopped fine; 1 teaspoon soda; $1 / 2$ cup sour cream or milk; a little nutmeg; just enough flour to roll.

## DATE COOKIES

2 cups rolled oats; $21 / 2$ cups flour; 1 cup brown sugar; $1 / 2$ cup butter; $1 / 2$ cup lard; $1 / 2$ cup milk; 1 teaspoon CAMPBELL'S Baking Powder. Roll, bake and put mixture between.

## MIXTURE

1 lb. dates; 1 cup brown sugar; 1 cup hot water. Cook well. When cool put between cookies.

## CAKES, ETC.

## PEANUT JUMBLES

4 tablespoons butter; 1 teaspoon lemon juice; $1 / 2$ cup of sugar; $11 / 2$ teaspoons CAMPBELL'S Baking Powder; yolks of 2 eggs ; 1 cup flour ; 4 tablespoons milk; 2 cups chopped peanuts ; $1 / 2$ teaspoon salt.

Cream butter and sugar, add yolks beaten thoroughly, then milk, salt and lemon. Beat well, then add the flour and baking powder sifted twice, and milk. Drop from spoon on buttered paper. Place whole peanut on centre of each and bake twelve minutes in slow oven.

## MACAROONS

1 cup sugar ; 1 tablespoon butter; 2 eggs beaten separately; 2 teaspoons ratafia; 2 cups oatmeal.

NUT SPONGE CAKE
Beat separately the yolks and whites of six large eggs. Beat the yolks first with one teaspoon of lemon juice until very stiff; then add one cup granulated sugar and the grated rind of one lemon. Next add a pinch of salt to the egg whites and when partially beaten, add one tablespoon of lemon juice and continue beating until very stiff. Carefully fold the beaten yolks into the whites, then add one cup of chopped walnuts and last of all sift in one cup ( $1 / 2$ pint) of flour, folding just enough to get it all mixed. Turn at once into cake tin and bake in moderate oven forty minutes.

Half of this amount makes a nice sized cake.

## RICH SPONGE CAKE

One large tablespoonful butter, one cup sugar, three eggs, cup water, two heaping cups flour, one large teaspoon of CAMPBELL'S Baking Powder. Iefing -one cup of brown sugar, two tablespoonfuls cream or milk. Boil until it strings. Beat till thick enough to go on cake.

## CHRISTMAS PUDDING

One cup butter, cup molasses, cup milk or water, cup raisins (chopped), teaspoonful soda, three cups flour, 1/4 teaspoonful each cinnamon, cloves, nutmeg; steam two or three hours.

## SAUCE

Cream yolk of one egg with half cup of granulated sugar, stir in the white of an egg beaten to a stiff froth, flavor with vanilla or lemon.

## COCOANUT PUDDING

Three eggs; whites of two kept for frosting; beat in enough sugar to taste and milk to make a custard. Put in a dish of bread crumbs and sprinkle over with cocoanut and a little butter; pour over the custard and bake. When done, beat whites, adding sugar, and frost top.

## BAKED HUCKLEBERRY PUDDING

One quart of ripe fresh huckleberries or blueberries, half a teaspoon of mace or nutmeg, three eggs well beaten, separately, two cups of sugar, one tablespoon of cold butter, one cup of sweet milk, one pint of flour, two teaspoons of CAMPBELL'S Baking Powder. Roll the berries well in the flour and add them last of all. Bake half an hour and serve with sauce. There is no more delicate and delicious pudding than this.

## TAPIOCA CUSTARD

Soak three heaping tablespoons of taploca in one teacup of water over night. Place over the fire one quart of milk; let it come to a boil, then stir in the tapioca, a good pinch of salt, stir until it thickens; then add one cup of sugar and the beaten yolks of three eggs. Stir it quickly and pour into a dish and stir gently into the mixture the whites beaten stiff, the flavoring, and set it on ice, or in an ice chest.

## PUDDINGS, ETC.

## cottage pudding

Half cup sugar, one tablespoonful butter, one egg, quarter cup sweet milk, one cup flour, one teaspoonful CAMPBELL'S Baking Powder.

## FISH

## CREAMED OYSTERS

Pour cold water over them after draining off liquor, then dry them, beard them and season with salt, pepper and a ilttle cayenne; roll in a thick sauce made with one teaspoonful butter, two teaspoonfuls flour, half cup milk; bake in buttered ramakin dishes ten minutes.

TO STUFF AND BAKE FISH
Soak stale bread in cold water until soft, drain and mash fine, stir in a spoonful of drawn butter, a little salt and pepper (two raw eggs, make the dressing cut smoother), and spices if liked. Fill the fish with this and sew it up, put a little water in a baking pan with a small lump of butter, place the fish in this and bake forty or fifty minutes. Bass, shad and fresh cod are all good baked.

## MEATS

## BRAISED TONGUE

Put tongue (fresh) in kettle and cover with boiling water and cook two hours. Then remove skin and roots, Put in deep pan and surround with 1-3 cup each carrots, celery and onions and a sprig of parsley and pour over all four cups of sauce. Cover closely and bake two hours, turning often the first hour.

## SAUCE

Stir $1 / 4$ cup each of butter and flour until well browned and add one cup of water in which the tongue was bolled and two cups of strained tomatoes, salt and pepper and one cup of Worcester sauce.

## SPICED MEAT

Take a thin slice of round steak; remove the bone, all the fat and bits of skinny membrane on the outside. Make a dressing of one cup of bread crumbs, one-half cup of butter, mustard, pepper, salt, ground celery seed and spices to suit the taste, add enough hot water to make it soft, and spread over the meat. Now roll it up firmly and tie in a thin cloth, place the roll in a kettle and cover with boiling water. Boil from three to five hours according to the size of the roll. After it has bolled two hours, put in a teaspoonful of salt. When it is done remove the cloth, place the meat in a mould with a heavy weight on top. When it is cold it will slice nicely and make nice cold meat for lunch or supper.

## VEAL LOAF

Three pounds veal, quarter pound salt pork, two eggs, one cup crumbs, teaspoonful salt, half teaspoonful pepper, teaspoonful onlon juice, half teaspoonful mace, half teaspoonful allsplce: mix and mold in a loaf; cook two hours in moderate oven, and strain and serve cold.

## MISCELLANEOUS RECIPES

## TOMATO BUTTRER

7 lbs , ripe tomatoes peeled and cut up; 4 lbs. granulated sugar; 1 handful salt; 1 cup vinegar. Boil all together three hours. When nearly done add: 1 teaspoon cloves; 1 teaspoon cinnamon; $1 / 4$ teaspoon red pepper.

EGG SAUCE
Served with boiled fish. To two cups white sauce add three hard-boiled eggs cut into slices or dice, and if liked one teaspoonful chopped parsley; brown sauce.

## BEEEF AND POTATO PUFFS

Make mashed potatoes into a paste with one egg, roll out with a little flour, cut round with a saucer; put finely chopped seasoned cold meat on one half, fold over, turn neatly round, and fry light brown in gravy. (One egg makes five puffs.)

## PRUNE WHIP

Soak one pound of prunes in cold water for several hours, put in a little boiling water and simmer till soft. Remove the stones and mash the prunes through a coarse sieve. Beat the whites of four eggs very stiff, adding a speck of salt. Add gradually to one pint of the prune pulp, which has been sweetened with one-quarter to one-half cupful sugar. Turn lightly on to a buttered platter; set the plater in the oven over a pan of hot water and bake at a moderate heat for about twenty minutes. Serve cold with custard made from the yolks of the eggs, four tablespoonfuls sugar, one-eighth teaspoonful salt, one pint milk and one teaspoonful vanilla.

PINEAPPLE SHERBET
One tablespoonful gelatine soaked in one cup cold water fifteen minutes. Dissolve with one cup boiling water. Take one-half can grated pineapple, one and one-half cups sugar and juice of one lemon. Add strained gelatine, put in freezer and pack with ice and salt and freeze.

## MISCELLANEOUS RECIPES

## soup stock

Take three or four pounds of shank of beef, cut into small pleces, add all the bones and bits of cold meat you have in the house, cover the whole with cold water and let it stand for an hour or two: then set it on the stove and boil several hours; then strain and set away to cool. When cool the fat may be easily removed; do not have a bit of fat on it.

This is the soup stock and several different soups can be made by boiling the different vegetables, rice, macaroni in water and adding some of the soup stock, and seasoning to taste. Whenever an onion is used, it is much nicer grated than in pleces.

## PEA PUREE

One cup peas, two cups cold water, four whole cloves, bay leaf, slice of onion, salt and pepper to taste, one tablespoonful butter, one tablespoonful flour; boil peas until tender with onion, cloves and bay leaf; rub through sleve with liquid in which they have been bolled; blend butter and flour; pour liquid in and cook a few minutes before serving.

## MACARONI AND CHEESE

Break half lb, of macaroni into pieces an inch or two long; cook it in boiling water, enough to cover it well; put in a good teaspoon of salt; let it boil about twenty minutes. Drain it well and then put a layer in the bottom of a well-buttered pudding-dish, upon this some grated cheese and small pleces of butter, a blt of salt, then more macaroni, and so on, flling the dish; sprinkle the top layer with a thick layer of cracker crumbs. Pour over the whole a teacupful of cream or milk. Set it in the oven and bake half an hour. It should be nicely browned on top.

## MISCELLANEOUS RECIPES

## ASPARAGUS SALAD

Boll two bunches of asparagus with one quart of water and one tablespoon of salt, for twenty minutes. Take up and drain on a sieve. When cold, cut off the tender points, and arrange them on dish. Pour on cream salad dressing.

## STUFFED DATES

Half a teaspoonful vanilla, and a little sugar, almonds, walnuts and melted sweetened chocolate, enough to hold them together; fill the dates and roll in confectioners' sugar; add a little butter.

## APPLE SNOW

Stew some fine flavored sour apples tender, sweeten to taste, strain them through a fine wire sleve and break Into one pint of strained apples the white of an egg; whisk the apples and egg very briskly till quite stiff and it will be as white as snow; eaten with a nice bolled custard it makes a very desirable dessert. More eggs may be used if liked.

STRAWBERRY ICE CREAM
Mash with a potato pounder, in an earthen bowl, one quart of strawberries with one pound of sugar, rub it through a sieve, add one quart of sweet cream and freeze.

## SPICED CURRANTS

Make a syrup of three lbs. sugar, one pint of vinegar, two tablespoons cinnamon, two tablespoons cloves, and half teaspoon salt. Add slx lbs. of currants, and boll half an hour.

## RASPBERRY VINEGAR

Put one quart of raspberries into a suitable dish, pour over them one quart of good vinegar, let it stand twentyfour hours, then strain through a flannel bag and pour this liquor on another quart of berries; do this for three or four days successively and strain it; make it very sweet with loaf sugar; bottle and seal it.

## MISCELLANEOUS RECIPES

JIM-JEM
One pint brandy, six pounds sugar, one pint strawberries, one pint raspberries, one pint pineapple, one pint bananas, one pint cherries, one pint black berries.

A large stone or glass jar is the best thing for this preserve; one that has a tight fitting cork. Put in the brandy with one pint of strawberries and one pound of sugar. Stir it thoroughly every day. Add the other fruits with the sugar from time to time as they can be procured. The bananas should be sliced very thin, the stones removed from the cherries, and the pineapples grated fine. If kept in a cool place this will keep a long time. It must be stirred every day during the time of putting in the different fruits and for several days after in order to dissolve the sugar and preserve the fruit.

## COCOANUT CREAM

Melt 2 teaspoons butter; add $1 / 2$ cup milk and $11 / 2$ cups sugar. Boil twelve minutes, then remove from the fire and add one teaspoon vanilla and 1-3 cup grated cocoanut and beat till creamy and pour over the chocolate cream.

## SEA FOAM FUDGE

One cup light brown sugar, half cup water and one-third cup grated chocolate. Boil without stirring until it spins a thread from the point of a spoon. Have beaten stiff the white of an egg; pour boiling mixture on it and stir until it begins to stiffen.

## FONDANT FOR CREAMS

One pound granulated sugar and a cup of water. Boil without stirring until it will spin a thread from the point of a spoon, then cook until you can make a soft ball with the fingers from some poured on a dish. Beat until it is smooth and hard and can be kneaded like dough in the hands.

TURKISH DELIGHT
One pound granulated sugar, one cup cold water, juice and rind of one orange, juice and rind of one lemon, one ounce of gelatine. Soften gelatine in half the water, boll the sugar in half the water, and when clear add gelatine, the rind and the juice; boil twenty minutes, strain and pour into a pan that has been dipped in cold water. Set to stiffen; cut into squares and roll into powdered sugar.

## BUTTTER SCOTCH

Three cups white sugar, half a cup water, half a cup vinegar, or half a teaspoon cream of tartar, one tablespoon of butter and elght drops extract of lemon. Boil without stirring till it will snap and break. Just before taking from the fire, add quarter teaspoon soda: pour into well-buttered biscuit tins, quarter inch thickness. Mark off into inch squares when partly cold.

## SEA FOAM FUDGE (NUT)

Three cups of light brown sugar, one cup water and a tablespoon of vinegar. Do not stir after it is once heated. Boil till it will harden when dropped into cold water. Beat stiff, the whites of two eggs and when the syrup has stopped bubbling, pour it over these and beat well. Flavor with vanilla and add a cup of chopped nuts.

## ICE CREAM

One pint of milk, yolks of two eggs, six ounces of sugar, one tablespoonful of corn-starch; scald until it thickens; when cool, add one pint of whipped cream and the whites of two eggs, beaten stiff; sweeten, flavor and freeze.

## GRAPE JELLY

Mash the grapes in a kettle, put them over the fire, and cook until thoroughly done. Drain through a sieve, but do not press through. To each pint of juice allow one pound sugar. Boll rapfdly for flve minutes. Add sugar, and boil rapidly three minutes more.

## BREAD SAUCE

One-third cup bread dice, two-thirds cup milk, onion with clove stuck in it; stand for half an hour; remove the onion and cloves when it comes to a boil and beat until smooth, having first seasoned with pepper and salt, and add a teaspoonful of butter.

## CORN OMELET

One pint of cold boiled corn, four eggs, half a cupful of milk, one teaspoonful and a half of salt, a little pepper, three tablespoonfuls of butter. Beat the eggs, and add to them the salt, pepper, milk and corn.

## TOMATO PRESERVE

Four pounds green tomatoes, three pounds sugar, three lemons sliced, ginger root to taste.

Cook slowly till juice is thick.

## CREAMED CHICKEN

Joint the chicken; place in a pan and season with salt and pepper, and if it be not too fat a few small lumps of butter. Cover with rich milk and set in a moderate oven and bake. Uncover the pan, when the milk has cooked away, the chicken will be done.

## BROILED SWEETBREADS

Split the sweetbread after being boiled. Season with salt and pepper, rub thickly with butter and sprinkle with flour. Broil over a rather quick fire, turning constantly. Cook about ten minutes, and serve with cream sauce.

## TOMATO MUSTARD

One peck tomatoes, one teacup salt; boil in preserving pan half hour; pulp through a colander and return to kettle with the following: one dessertspoon cloves (ground), one of allspice, one of black pépper, one of ginger, one of cayenne, a little garlic, some onions, and a little curry powder. Let it boll down considerably, strain through sieve and add flour of mustard until proper thickness is obtained, and simmer for short time; then bottle.

## STUFFED EGGS

Cut six hard boiled eggs in two. Take out the yolks and mash them fine. Add two teaspoonfuls of butter, one of cream, a few drops of vinegar, and salt, pepper and mustard to taste. Mix all thoroughly. Fill the eggs from the mixture, and serve on lettuce with mayonnaise dressing.

## BEEF CROQUETTES

Chop the bits of cold beef very fine; to one cupful of chopped meat add onehalf cup of cracker crumbs, one egg, mustard, ground celery seed, pepper and salt, and mix together; a little hot water or meat gravy may be needed to make the crumbs stick together. Make into little cakes and fry in a hot buttered pan.

## CAULIFLOWER SALAD

Boil one large cauliflower with two quarts of water and one tablespoon of salt, for half an hour. Take up and drain. When cold, divide into small tufts. Arrange on the centre of a dish and garnish with a border of strips of pickled beet. Pour cream dressing over the caulfflower. Arrange a star of the pickled beet in the centre.

## FRENCH MUSTARD

Grate an onion and cover it with vinegar. After it has stood for an hour pour off the vinegar, add a little cayenne pepper, and salt and a spoonful of sugar, and mustard enough to thicken; mix and set on the stove and stir until it boils.

## CHOCOLATE CREAM

Melt one tablespoon of butter in a granite saucepan, add one-half cup milk and one and a half cups sugar and two and one half squares of unsweetened chocolate. Stir constantly until the chocolate is melted, then let it boil twelve minutes, stirring only occaslonally. Remove from the fire and beat till creamy, then pour Into buttered tin.

## WEIGHTS OF THE SEXXES AT

## DIFFERENT AGES

If all the men and women, boys and girls, and infants-black, white, yellow, brown or red-in all parts of the world. could be weighed on the same scales, the average weight would be nearly 100 pounds avoirdupois. Sixpound infants and three-hundred-pound giants contribute to the average.

Upon the average, boys at birth weigh a little more and girls a little less than seven pounds. For the first twelve years the two sexes continue nearly equal in weight, but beyond that age the boys acquire a decided preponderance. Young men of twenty average 135 pounds while the young women of twenty average 110 pounds each.

Men reach their heaviest weight at about forty years of age, when their average welght will be 140 pounds ; but women slowly increase in weight until fifty years of age, when their average weight will be 130 pounds. Taking the men and the women together, their weight at full growth will then average from 108 to 150 pounds; and the women from 80 to 130 pounds.

As weight increases the normal human pulse becomes slower, and then, as weight grows less, in old age, the pulse becomes faster again.
