The Grip of Faith.

John Welsh, one of the early Reformers of Scotland, born in 1570, has given a lively picture of faith, which may serve to encourage some trembling believer :-

It is not the quantity of faith that shall save thee. A drop of water is as true water as the whole ocean. So a little faith is as true faith as the greatest. A child eight days old is as really a man as one of sixty years; a spark of fire is as true fire as a great flame; sickly man is as truely a living man as a well man. So it is not the measure of thy faith that saves thee; it is the blood that it grips to, that saves thee. As the weak hand of a child that leads the spoon to the mouth, will feed as well as the strongest arm of a man, for it is not the hand that feeds thee, albeit it put the meat into thy mouth, but it is the meat carried into the stomach that feeds thee so if thou canst grip Christ ever so weakly, he

glass, the lobster does not parade in his fiery outstretched like sceptres, he cannot but have an imposing appearance, both for the painter and the culinary artist. The lobster has his rocky hole at a depth

from six to twelve fathoms, and the propagation of his race is continued on in marvelous numbers. More than 12,000 eggs have been counter in a single female! When he reaches the light he is inactive, but in his own realm he dashes with rapid speed over chasms and rocky tablelands of the ocean. A motion of his tail is sufficient to hurl him down more than fifty feet deep, and thus escape the swiftest pursuer. So sure is this leap, that he never misses the entrance of his cavern, even in the most precipitous flight, although, too, it merely offers space enough to admit his body.

During the proper season, five or six ships sail between the Thames alone and the coast of Norway to supply London with lobsters, and others bring to Holland more than half a million. It is estimated that in Northern Europe alone nearly five million lobsters are consumed every year. I have met with no data to estimate their consumption in our own land, where they form so favorite a dish.

What an extraordinary creature for our study and admiration! Without bones on the inside, still with stomach to digest the hardest materials, the shells of muscles, oysters, and even its own -an animal obtaining a new stomach and shell at stated intervals. Without red blood, circulating, yet vigorous and active! But strangest of all, a creature endowed with a vital principle that repairs such limbs as have been injured and provides new ones for the lost. How marvelous and wonderful are God's works, even in the deep, and worthy of our contemplation! The Clove, May 1861.
