

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
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Tons of Letters Arrive There From Folk Who Seek Ease and Comfort

HONOLULU, T.H., Sept. 26 .- The comantic lure of the South Seas has become so potent throughout the world that the Honolulu Chamber of Commerce is faced with an increasingly onerous and embarrasing prob-) lem, its officials announced here recently.
