**Town Council.**—Regular monthly meeting held on Monday evening, 3rd inst. Present, the Reeve in the chair, the Deputy Reeve, and Councilors Scott, Davitt, Woods, Riggs, Hopper, Brock, Messrs. A number of accounts were read and referred to the Finance Committee. The communication was read from Charles Selwood, withdrawing his offer to pay \$100 to assist in building a sidewalk on south side of Inkerman street, on account of delay in sending on lumber. Communication from J. E. Terhune, Esq., notifying the Council that Wm. M. Climax had placed in his hands a claim against the corporation of the town of Listowel for damages sustained by him in falling off the sidewalk on the south side of Main street between the railway crossings, and also notifying the Council that unless a satisfactory settlement is made on a writ will be issued—referred to a Committee to consist of Messrs. Woods, Binning, Hopper, Brock, and Scott, to enquire into the facts of the case and report at the next meeting of the Council. The Chairman of the Cemetery Committee reported the sale of the cemetery grounds, as advertised, for \$400, and that \$200 had been received. The Finance Committee reported, recommending payment of the following accounts: Jno. Riggs, chimneys, etc., \$1.05; John Little, groceries, \$2.50; Jno. G. Alexander, timber, etc., \$2.50; J. B. Bogues, wood and postage stamps, \$1.45; W. J. Stewart, groceries, \$2.26. Dr. D. H. Dingman, attendance on Geo. Baker, indigent, \$2.25. On motion the report was adopted. An improvement was read from the Assistant Treasurer, Ontario re the Land Improvement Fund, intimating that care will be taken to protect the interests of the town of Listowel in the matter. Mr. Miller was also leader of the choir of the German Lutheran Church.

Fare from Stratford and return, including coupon giving admission to the Gardens, \$1.95. The "Zoo" is one of the greatest attractions of the Queen City.

SIDEWALKS.—The town fathers made their annual vote on this subject last night, and have ascertained that a very considerable quantity of sidewalks may be built this season without going beyond the necessity of the situation. Preparations are already being made for building new walks on Wallace and one or two other streets.
