Here and There

Seeding in Alberta was two weeks later this year than last.

A second party of Swiss immigrants recently arrived at St. John award the Melita and are en route for the West, where they will engage in agriculture.

Twenty-two thousand immigrants to Canada from the United States were inspected on trains and higo-way crossings at the 33 points from Port Arthur to Kingsgate, B.C., dur-ing March of this year.

Ts date the port of Vancouver has shipped or booked 17,000,000 bushe's of wheat to the Orient and South America. The railroads expect at least 2,500,000 additional bushe's to be shipped this way in the near future.

The memory of the early missionaries of the Oblate Order will be perpetuated by the Canadian Pacific Railway, and several stations on the extensions of their lines between kipawa and Quinze will bear names of early members of that organization with discountry to the colonization of the country.

There are thirteen new paper making machines being installed in Canadian paper mills this year. When erected and running full these machines will consume more than 350,000 additional cords of wood a year. Canada is already annually consuming and exporting more than 5,000,000 cords of pulpwood, representing the growth of a century or more on 1,250,000 acres of land.

A new service for motor tourists desiring to pass between the mainland and Vancouver Island has been inaugurated between Bellingham and Victoria. The Motor Princess, with a capacity for fifty automobiles and 250 passengers, plies twice daily between the ports. This boat is motor driven and the first of its kind to be operated on the Pacific side of the continent.

In 1922 Canada produced 2,418 tons of salt cake, valued at \$54,804, and 1,329 tons of Glauber salts valued at \$42,719, according to government figures. There are a number of immense deposits of Glauber salts in the province of Saskatchewan, which are at the present time only in the initial stages of development, but it is anticipated that the next few years will see a considerable increase in production.

The Canadian exhibit at the British Empire Exhibition, to be held in London from April 20th to October 31st, 1924, is to be financed, controlled and directed by the Federal Government. The estimated cost is \$1,000,000. The two Canadian railroads are planning exhibits on adjoining sites, each with a floor space of 10,000 feet. The cost of the Canadian Pacific exhibit is estimated at \$300,000.

The Canadian Pacific steamship "Empress of Russia," upon her last sailing, carried a shipment of Canadian frogs for Japan. Cool space was reserved in the hold of the liner and the travellers were well packed in ice. On being taken ashore at Yokohama these frogs will be gradually warmed until they are ready to be let loose, when they will be liberated on the lawns of Japanese importers, with the idea of riving the Japanese a new industry in the production of frogs legs.

The Canadian Pacific Telegraphs have announced the following reduced rates per word for cable messages to the following countries effective to-day:—Austria, 30 cents, Belgium 23 cents, France 22 cents, Germany 25 cents, Great Britain and Ireland 20 cents, Great Britain and Ireland 20 cents, Great Britain and Ireland 27 cents, Spain 33 cents, Switzerland 27 cents, Spain 33 cents, Switzerland 27 cents, The 25 cent per word rate to Great Britain and Ireland is still in effect for special rush cables. Corresponding reductions have been made in the rates to other countries in Europe and beyond via Atlantic cables, and the new deferred rates will be one-half of the full rates quoted above except to Great Britain and Ireland, where the existing deferred rate of 9 cents per word is unaltered.

At the annual meeting of the Canadian Pacific Railway, President E. W. Beatty pointed out that prospects for the immigration into Canada of the class of colonist urgently needed to develop the country's natural resources were much brighter than they had been in the past two or three years, and an increased traffic from Great Britain and Northern Europe was indicated by the largely precased western movement on the company's ships during the past four months of this year.



THE MARKING OF LAMBS

lenefits of System Clearly and Practically Told.

Australian Sheep Branding Fluid Recommended — A Numbering System Suggested — About Seed Corn — Figs Profitable When

Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)

The last few years the raising of sheep has been one of the most pro-litable branches of live stock farmng, the amount of profit depending to a great extent on the success at lambing time and immediately afterwards. Difficulty is frequently experienced in giving the necessary care to individual lambs because they are not easily recognized. In a large tock many lambs look alike, and mothers frequently disown or fail to care properly for their own lambs.

Australian Sheep Branding Fluid Recommended.

Recommended.

In order that needy lambs may be easily recognized and their mothers found, a convenient system of marking is needed. For marking purposes Australian sheep branding fluid is best. It can be obtained in different colors from firms who handle sheep supplies, such as the Canadian Cooperative Wool Growers. This fluid does not injure the wool, and shows a distinct mark for several weeks, even when exposed to the weather. It may be applied with a small stick

or, folder still, an ordinary machine eding can, and should be rubbed in so that it will not spread.

A Good System of Numbering Suggested.

Suggested.

In marking, a system of numbering is adopted. An male lambs are given an even number as 2, 4, 6, etc., all temale lambs an odd number as 1, 3, 5, etc. The lamb's number is made on its back with fairly large figures, and the mother is also marked on the back with the same number as her lamb or lambs. If she has two lambs, a ewe number 5 and a ram number 8, she will have the figures 5 and 8 placed so that seen from behind one win be above the other, to show 5 and 8 rather than 58. These numbers are best put on a few hours after the lambs are born. Beuefits of the System Described.

adopted. Lambs needing help for any reason are easily found and ewes recognized that can spare a feed for them. When two or more are in charge of the flock, it is an easy matter for the one to point out to the other what lambs need attention. By the adoption of this system of marking a complete "Record of Performance" at lambing time is easy to keep, and one will be better able to cull out the undesirable ewes and

a few hours after the lambs are born. Benefits of the System Described.

Some of the advantages of a system such as this have been found to be: One quilkly gets to know the individual lambs by their numbers and their development is watched with interest; good mothers and poor mothers are known by their lambs and how they care for and feed them. This quality is often overlooked in sheep but is most important. For a ewe loosing a single lamb a needy twin can easily be found to take its place and properly guarded till fully adopted. Lambs needing help for any reason are easily found and ewes re-

Every farm and country home should feed itself, and to do this it is necessary for each family to grow garden vegetables and small fruits.

All corn cribs and grain bins should be carefully inspected to see that they are rat and mouse proof. A concrete foundation for storage buildings is advisable whenever it is practicable.
