

They keep within the breed; to be sure; but they do not have a very clear idea of what they are seeking in the way of new stock because they do not have any clear idea of what they are going to produce. And as a result they get nowhere.

New blood should be introduced always for a definite purpose to improve some point; to check some fault. The breeder must have a standard clearly in mind and breed

toward that ideal.

.. If an experienced breeder were to go out of business and then begin over again to re-establish a strain: he would go to a flock of his chosen breed and there with a standard type clearly in mind: would select from the available specimens; with some respect to pedigree; those that measured up to his requirements.

None of these selected for the new flock would be perfect but all would be strong; healthy birds; chosen so that birds having the same defect would not have to be mated together. Thus would he begin at once to make progress toward the building up of a strain superior to the original stock from which he made his selections. This sort of selection is essential to any continued progress in breeding poultry. Now is the time to begin; for another breed ing season is almost here.

Suit Arose Over Damage to Morrissey Bridge, Newcastle.

fendant was given by Sir Douglas Hazen, C. The power industry and the pulp and paper industry were thus ultimately associated and unless the future of the latter was assured it would be useless to place restrictions upon the export of power.

Find Another Market

"Granted that the interest the settlers and other private cwaers of pulpwood are involved to some extent in the problem of how best to deal with our diminishing wood supply, I submit that it ought not to be very difficult for the government acting in co-operation with our industry, to devise ways and means whereby exportations may be reduced to a minimum or stopped entirely without sacrificing these interests. We cannot, course, expect to take away their present market without providing another equally as good or better

Pay Forest Protection. "An adequate export tax on pulp wood shipped out of the country would provide funds for the protection of our forests and to that extent would relieve our mills of some of their heavy expenditures. A straight out embargo would be even more effective.

"Both Quebec and Ontario have recently declared against the exportation of hydro-electric power and have taken the unassailable position that our inferests require that those who would use our water powers should come to Canada in order to do so."

THE EIGHT HOUR DAY The eight hour day question is expected to come before the federal Supreme Court this week if the pro vinces are ready for the hearing. 

OUTLINES FOREIGN POLICY OF FRANCE

Paris, Jan. 2: -- Security was the main theme of Premier Herriot's long awaited speech on France's foreign policy delivered before a great gathering in the Chamber of Deputies today

The Premier occupied two hours of his three and a half hours' address in drawing up a vivid but dark picture of Germany's activities in armaments while he disposed of the problem of inter-Aljied debts in a brief, but never the less emphatic manner,

Never before since he assumed power has Mr Herriot spoken of Germany in the tones he used to day and although he had the entire chamber, excepting the Com. munists applauding and cheering the general interpretation through out parliament was that his purpose was deeper than merely catering to the right groupsthat it was a warning to the Britsh government against the evacuation of the Cologne zone. On the subject of inter-Allied debts the Premier said:

"I come to the question of inter-Allied debts. I shall speak very briefly thereon, for you have remarked how great is the susceptbility of our friends and allies on this subject and you know how even the sublimest words and best sentiments risk at times being interpreted in a regrettable way what I do is to solemnly repeat once more what M. Viviani has said--- France does not intend to repudiate her debts.

'It is not the government over which I preside, attached as it is to respect for treaties and convent ons, that will disavow the principle of debts which France has contracted.

"That being said, we have the right after the speech, filled with such useful figures by Mr Dubois, after Mr Martin's to appeal to the sentiments of solidarity of our Al lies and friends.
