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Synopsis ci Canadian North-West Land Regulations

The sole head of a family, or any make over 18 years old, who was at the commancement of the present war, and who has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter section of available Deminion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties-Six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years.

In certain distric's a hemesteades may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$3.00 per scre. Daties-Reside six months in each of three years after earning homestead pstent and cultivate 50 acres extrs. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain con

ditions. A settler atter obtaining homester patent, if he cannot secure a pre-empion, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300 00.

Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm labourers in Canade during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions.

When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned solderis who have served overseas and have been honourably discharged, re entry at local Agent's Office (but not be presented to Agent.
