





Provincial Fisheries.

We are indebted to Mr. Ray, Canadian Trade Commissioner, for the opdian Trade Commissioner, for the op-portunity to peruse the 43rd Annual Report of the Dominion Department of Marine and Fisheries for 1909-10. In it there is an article entitled, "The Non-Progression of the Atlantic Pisheries of Canada," by Mr. John J. Cowie, an official of the department. The feature of it is the setting forth of the stagnant condition of the fisher-ies of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick which have not materially changed walue during the past sixteen years. The value of these fisheries in 1884 was \$14,874,413, whilst in 1909-10, it was \$15,615,485.

In marked contrast was the increasing value of the fisheries of Western Canada—from Ontario to British Columbia, where the value has doubled, trebled and on two occasions been five fold that of 1884, and is approaching in value that of the Eastern fisheries of the four provinces, the West showing \$13,727,038 against \$15,615,485 in

"In the opinion of the writer, the chief reason why this sluggish condition has existed so long is to be found in the fact that the fish trade of the Rast is largely a salt fish one and that it has precited by recorded its limit in it has practically reached its limit in the way of expansion notwithstanding recent improvements in the style of placing the dried product on the mark-et in such forms as boneless and skin-

300 Miners Killed. Special to Evening Telegram.

BOLTON, Eng., Dec. 21.

More than 300 colliers lost their lives to-day in an explosion in the little Bolton colliery, which is located a short distance outside the city. The explosion occurred early in the morning soon after the miners had entered the pit to begin work. Its force was the pit to begin work. Its force was terrific, Later investigation showed that the lower passages had been blocked. Heroic efforts were made by rescue parties all day long, but a fierce fire which followed the explosion prevented the rescuers from prepetrating beyond 400 yards into the workings. At 9.30 to-night all the rescuers were called out of the mines, and a conference was held at which Government Inspector Gerard issued a report after making a deissued a report after making a de-scent into the pit, in which he stated that it was impossible that any of the miners was still alive. He added that nothing could be done except to bring up the twenty bodies found lying in the shaft. The report was communicated to the anxious crowds around the pit mouth, after which the Bishop of Manchester commenced a the people slowly dispersed. No explanation is given as to the cause of the explosion, which completely wrecked the mines. This is the sec ond great mine disaster in England this year, an explosion having occur-red in the Wellington colliery at Whitehaven, Cumberland, on May 12, in which 132 miners were killed. The

explosion to-day resulted in the tem porary disablement of the machiner whereby the cages are lowered and drawn to the surface, and it was a considerable time before the first res cue party reached the bottom of the pitfall. They brought out eight mer still living, but the majority of those were in a serious condition from the noxious gases. Ten bodies also were removed and 20 additional bodies were found partially covered by heav falls of coal.

Late to-night the colliery fans were started again and the air was founto be fairly good. Arrangement, were then made for relays of rescu ers to go into the mine every three hours throughout the night. Towards midnight two more miners were found alive. They were terribly burned and are in critical conditions. It was announced that forty bodies had been collected at the bottom of the shaft, and they will be brought up as soon as possible. Hope still animates the rescuers that more men may be found alive. Doctors, nurses and ambu-lances are still on the scene, and relatives, mostly women, are lingering in the vicinity. Among the incidents was the death of a rescuer who, any ous to reach his two sons who were entombed, got in advance of his com-rades and forfeited his life by after damp. 
