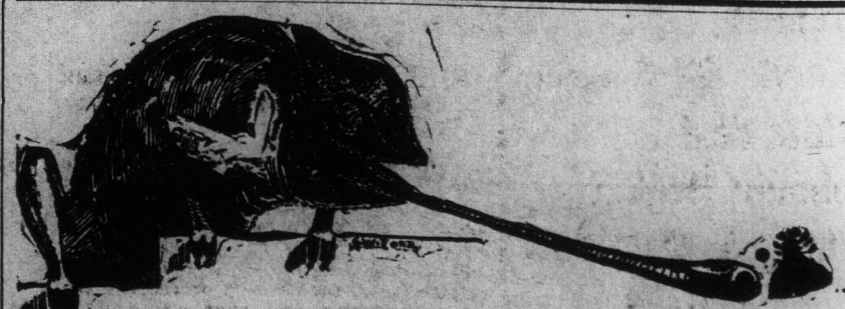

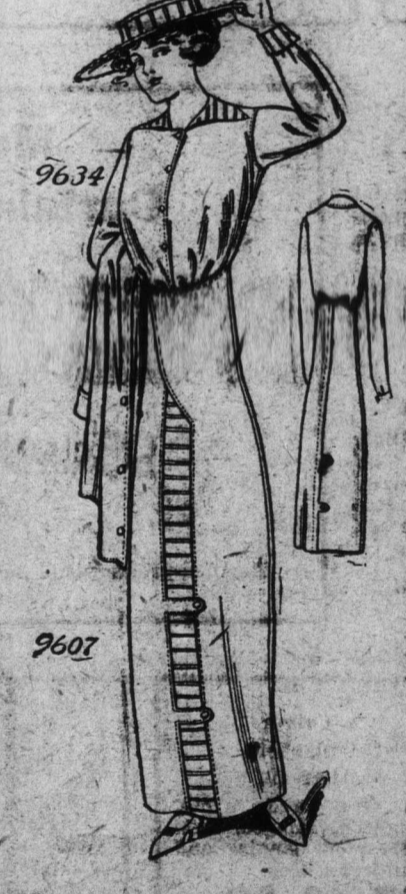

**Sour Grapes.**

A short time ago the Tories were ready to crown Sir Robert Bond with a halo. Now they would scarify him. A short time ago they were expecting every day to hear that Sir Robert Bond had retired into private life, and they prepared to boom Sir Edward Morris as the legitimate successor of Sir Wm. Whiteway, although Robinson, Mc Grath, Watson and Morrison strove might and main to put an end to the last Whiteway administration. As however, Sir Robert has made no sign of retiring, Mr. Robinson gave vent to his disgust by telling his readers that Sir Robert was of little account as a leader and would stand no chance whatever against Sir Edward Morris. Sir Robert, in the opinion of Mr. Robinson, as a leader was impossible of success. As we pointed out yesterday, it is a case of sour grapes with the Tories. They have been reading whatever hopes they had on Sir Robert Bond retiring. They knew they were done for last year, but Mcfawher like they have been waiting for something to turn up, and what they were hoping would turn up was the retirement of Sir Robert Bond. Last year they feared to put their chances to the test and face the electorate, as they were asked to do by thousands of fishermen. They were afraid of the animosity of the F. P. U. and the leadership of the Liberal Party under Sir R. Bond. The change of sentiment in regard to the Morris Government has been amply demonstrated by the fact that thousands of electors took the very unusual step of signing petitions in scores of settlements praying for an election last fall because they were alarmed at the wasteful expenditure which had been carried on by the Morris Government. The F. P. U. in Supreme Council assembled endorsed the action of the

petitioners last December and called all the members of the Union, all of its sympathizers, and indeed upon all electors who value good government, sound administration and economy in the expenditure of the public revenue to rally round the men who will fight to oust the present Government from power. These petitions emanated in the main from settlements in districts which returned Morris candidates in 1909, and the special significance of the whole of these proceedings is the clear demonstration of a wholesale reversion of political feeling. A mighty change has come over the electorate and the whole trend of the change is directed against the Morris Government. An expression of that change has been given to it in a manner wholly unprecedented. It is one of the most remarkable signs of the times. It is not so surprising however when the enormity of the misconduct of the Government is taken into account. It is but an effect of an adequate cause. Is there any wonder then that the Micawber-like policy has failed? Is it any wonder then that people who trusted Sir Edward Morris five years ago have turned over in their thousands to add strength to the Liberal electorate which supported Sir Robert Bond in 1909? A change of a few hundred votes is all that is wanted to defeat many Morris candidates next fall. The tide is against the Morris Party. That tide is running very strong and the Morris party leaders are sorely disappointed, and now in their disgust, they vent their spleen on the man they are preparing to land. Sir Robert Bond has not retired from Politics and they are disgusted and like the fox in the fable, they call the grapes sour. The Tories declare Sir Robert is impossible of success as a leader. We take up that issue and declare that Sir Robert has no equal as a leader. In him we pin our faith. On him the people rely, and with him there is every hope of a glorious victory.

**Cable News.**

Special to Evening Telegram.  
PETERSBURG, To-day.  
A Bulgarian gunboat and torpedo boats are lying in the harbor of Sebastopol where they had taken refuge from the Roumanian fleet; they were disarmed by the Russian authorities, the twenty-four hours grace allowed the belligerents having expired.  
PEKIN, To-day.  
The House of Representatives passed the first reading of bills impeaching the Minister of War, Tuan Chiu Jul, who is acting Premier, and the Ministers of Finance and Navy. The charges against the Ministers of War and Finance are in connection with the conclusion of a contract for an Austrian loan. The Minister of the Navy is charged with acting unconstitutionally. Another Bill impeaching the Cabinet collectively also passed its first reading. President Yuan Shi Kai has ordered reinforcements to be dispatched to the Province of Kiang Si, where the cashiered Governor Gen. the blowing up of a Fort and other anti-government acts indicate that the Young China Party has destroyed government forces.

LONDON, To-day.  
A Saloniki despatch to the Times says "Greece is preparing to sign an armistice only on the condition that the frontier questions and the payment of indemnity by Bulgaria, and the guarantees for the welfare of the Greeks under Bulgarian rule shall be settled on the battlefield. The Greek and Serbian plenipotentiaries are meeting at Nish to discuss the situation. Premier Venizelos is of opinion that the creating of three numerically equal States in the Balkans is the only way to secure a lasting peace in the Balkans. Greece previously was prepared to admit Bulgaria might have a population of one million in excess of Greece. The Greek Premier further refuses to oppose an annexation of Thrace to Bulgaria, although many of his countrymen consider this attitude sacrifices the interests of his country; but he says he has no desire to create difficulties for the Great Powers, and will be content with adequate guarantees for the future of Greeks in Thrace. King Constantine agrees with M. Venizelos these points.

**Monthly Meeting**

The adjourned meeting of the T.A. & B. Society was held last evening, President Ellis presiding. Five applicants were admitted and the quarterly reports of the auxiliary branches of the institution were read and adopted. Everything is going along very successfully with the Society. The proposal received from the Manufacturers' Life Assurance, was adopted, which will enable members of the society to insure their lives at a much better rate, and also gives an opportunity for the workman, who cannot insure for a thousand dollars, to take out a policy for two or five hundred. Mr. Walsh will now canvass the members of the society and no doubt will be successful in inducing a large number to insure, thereby assuring protection for their families. Only Total Abstinence Society men are allowed this concession of small insurances, as total abstainers are eagerly sought after by Insurance Companies. The President stated that the annual Juvenile picnic will be held at the Octagon on the 12th August. Chairman M. Tobin and his assistants intend to make this event come up to the usual standard this year. After attending to some minor matters, the meeting adjourned.

**Good Day.**

Yesterday was a great day for fishing on the local grounds, and a profitable one for fishermen with traps. A. Snow, of Quidi Vidi, secured the largest haul of three hundred quintals; J. Ryan, of the Southside, got over two hundred quintals and Messrs. Mallard, of Quidi Vidi, Eanis of the Southside and Reid and Burt of the North Battery got over a hundred quils each. The men referred to who had cod were never seen as plentiful.

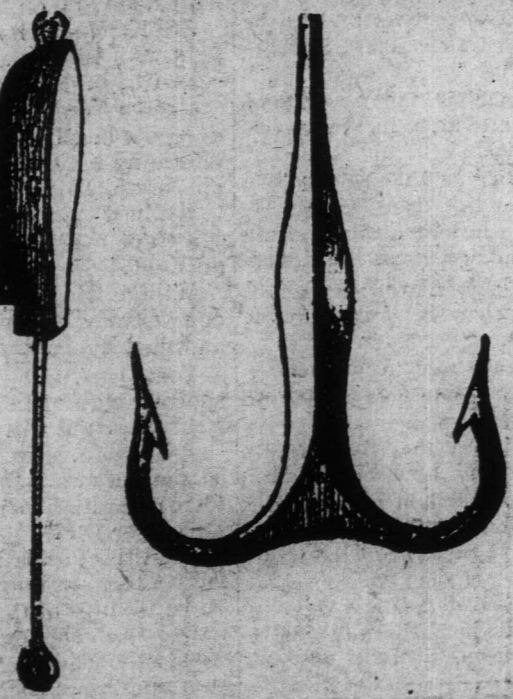

**Cable News.**

Special to Evening Telegram. **CONSTANTINOPLE, To-day.** The Turkish delegates to the Balkan financial commission of Paris has been recalled. The Turkish armies are continuing to advance and occupied Rodosta. It is understood a so-called Turkish agreement has been reached but is awaiting ratification from Belgrade before being signed.

**BELGRADE, To-day.** Report says the Serbians on Sunday captured an important position, eight miles west of Kustendil. According to the Athens correspondent of the Telegraph, Greece and Serbia signed a secret treaty last May, binding them to prosecute the war which was then foreseen with Bulgaria, until the Bulgars acquired in the territorial arrangements, laid down in the treaty. By these arrangements the Eastern boundaries of Greece would be extended to Mesta River, considerably east of the Drama. Serbia would have access to the Aegean Sea at two points.

**LONDON, To-day.** In the Commons to-night Sir Edward Grey replying to a suggestion that an armistice should be forced on the Balkan States, said it was impossible to exaggerate the horrors of the war, but mere words are not likely to affect the situation, and it would be most difficult for the Concert of Europe to resort to force to impose peace. Bulgaria had asked Russia to aid her in securing peace, and Serbia and Greece had agreed to cease hostilities upon certain conditions. As to Turkey, no exception could be taken to her action, as long as she adhered to the Entente-Middle East. The essential thing for the Powers said the Foreign Secretary was to perfect and maintain an agreement. The war was so exhaustive that it could not be of long duration, and no complications ought to arise, endangering the European concert. There was every reason to believe, he concluded, that matters would be brought to a satisfactory termination.

Ottawa, July 10.—A fishery exhibit at the Toronto Exhibition next month, for which the Hon. J. D. Hazen has arranged, will be unique in its character. It will embrace all kinds of marketable fish caught in Canadian waters and it is intended to have a crop of chefs in attendance. They will supply the crowd with the most delectable fish dishes known to the culinary art.

There will also be a display of live fish in tanks, cured fish, and mounted specimens.

The exhibit is intended as an instructive illustration of the variety of Canadian fish products, and calculated to stimulate the trade. There will be a number of lecturers.

The detailed arrangements are being made by Mr. W. A. Sand, Superintendent of Fisheries.

**Obituary.**

**MR. F. PERRY.**  
 On Sunday the death occurred at New Brighton, England, of Mr. Frank Perry, a former Anglo Superintendent at Hazelton, B.C. He was 68 years of age. He was born in New Brunswick, and was the son of the late Mr. Perry. Mr. Perry helped in the pioneer work of cable laying in Newfoundland. Four years ago he retired from active service and up to the time of his death lived quietly at New Brighton, near Liverpool. To the sorrowing widow and family sincere sympathy will be expressed.

**Two Drown When Sailing Boat Capsized.**

Kingston, Ont., July 10.—In a sailing accident late last night, two young men living in Kingston, Frank Exton and Howard King, lost their lives by drowning. They were employed at the locomotive works. Their companion, William P. Irvine, was saved.

The three were out in a small sail-boat, a lively gale was blowing, and when about to come in at the slip at the foot of Union Street the boat ran into a submerged pier and capsized. King and Exton could swim, and started out to make shore, but went down. Irvine could not swim, and clung to the boat until rescued by men from the Kingston Shipbuilding Company, who heard his cries for help.

Search has been made all morning for the bodies of the other two men, but as yet they have not been recovered. Exton is an Englishman and has only been in this country a short time.

**The Howe Inquest at North Sydney.**

North Sydney, July 10.—An inquest was held yesterday afternoon into the cause of death of David Howe, chief engineer of the steamer Bruce, who dropped dead yesterday morning while the boat was on her way up from Port aux Basques. After hearing the evidence of the engineers and other members of the Bruce's crew, the jury returned a verdict of death from natural causes. The remains were taken in charge by Undertaker W. J. Dooley, and after the inquest were prepared for burial and removed to the Masonic lodge rooms, whence they were taken this morning to the Bruce for shipment to Port aux Basques tonight. The officers and crew of both the Bruce and Linrose attended the funeral in a body. Mr. Howe, who was 39 years of age, was a native of Dundee, Scotland, and leaves a wife and four children at Port aux Basques.

**Fire Last Night.**

Last night reflections of a big blaze attracted a large concourse of people to Signal Hill where a small dwelling or hut was on fire. The structure, which was completely gutted and destroyed, belonged to and was occupied by a poor creature named Thomas Sweeney; he is almost totally blind and has not the best of sense. During the afternoon Sweeney looked his door and went out. He returned half an hour later, about ten hours and it is believed while endeavouring to light a fire in the stove or light his pipe he dropped a lighted match on some clothing which ignited and a blaze followed. An alarm was quickly sent in from box 12 bringing the men of the Central and East End Fire Stations to the scene. On arrival the place was a mass of flames. The great difficulty of the firemen was lack of water as the nearest place a stream could be got was from Lindberg's Brewery. This was thought inadvisable and water from the ponds nearby was procured to extinguish the fire but not before the greater portion of Sweeney's house and its contents had gone up in smoke. It was well there was no wind prevailing as houses close by would certainly have ignited.

In view of last night's experience provision should at once be made for an extra service in that section of the town.

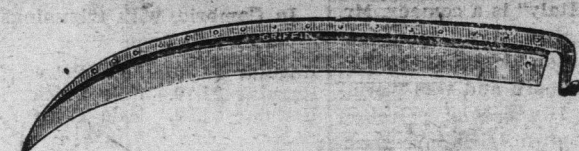

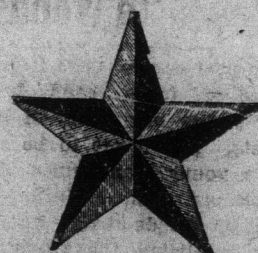
