

The German Reply.

Last night's press abstract of the German Reply to the American Note was such as to lead to the belief that the Reply could not be considered a satisfactory one, and we were not surprised to learn from the later despatch to-day that in official quarters the Reply was considered unsatisfactory. That impression is based mainly on the press copy of the Reply as the official text had not reached Washington at the time the impression was made. No doubt little satisfaction was expected as the American Am-bassador had been instructed to obtain a definite reply in black and white to the American note, and not to continue an intermediate and dilatory argument in Berlin on points of difference. This insistence on a definite reply by President Wilson was in itself an intimation that the interlo cutary proceedings in Berlin were not One of the main points in the Am-

erican demand was that Americans should be free from danger in travel-ling in mercantile vessels of a belligerent. President Wilson asked for an assent to this principle, and this demand was but a request for a form-al recognition in the German Reply of an accepted principle of Interna-tional Law. The assent, however, to this principle would be a plea of guilt to the charge of murdering the hundred Americans lost by the German submarine attack on the Lusitania The German Reply gives no such assurance. It specially limits the assurance given, to Americans on mer-cantile ships which do not belong to belligerent. The limitation of the assurance that they will not endange American lives on neutrals means that they will sink all the Lusitanias they can and Americans aboard mus take their chances of meeting the same fate their countrymen met of the Lusitania. It means further that they decline to give reparation to Americans and their next a kin who suf fered by the sinking of the Lusitania And even for the assurance that the And even for the assurance that they will permit Americans to cross the ocean on American ships they attempt to make a bargain. They ask the American Government to commit a breach of neutrality against the British and their allies in return for allowing Americans to live on their allies in the American for allowing Americans to live on their properties. The weak of the American for allowing Americans to live on their properties. own ships. They ask the American Government to intervene and preven owners of American passenger ships carrying contraband.

President Wilson and Ex-Secretary Bryan have already expressed their opinion that any interference by the Government to stop the manufacture and trade in munitions would be a breach of neutrality. But the German Government even goes further than the German-American in the United States and practically calls upon the American Government to stop carrying not only munitions but of all Contrabands by American wounded and missing of officers and wounded and missing of officers and stop carrying not only munitions but of all Contrabands by American passenger ships. 

LONDON, July 9. Great crowds assembled in and around the Guild Hall and the routes ading to it, this afternoon to hear Lord Kitchener address a meeting to inaugurate a special recruiting cam-paign. Kitchener's subject was on the need of further recruits for the army, but the enthusiasm of the meeting and the crowds which ap-peared, were attributed to the pub-lic's spontaneous desire to demon-strate its confidence in the Field Marshal, in the face of the attacks upon him, which a certain section of upon him, which a certain section of the press has been making. "We re-quire more men, and still more men," said Kitchener, "but the situation in this respect is immeasurably better than it was ten months ago. The military positions to-day, however, is as serious as it was then." This was the key-note of the War Secre-tary's speech to influence recruiting.

KITCHENER AT THE GUILD HALL

LONDON, July 9. Lord Kitchener's motor ride to the Guild Hall and the untethered Brit-Could Hall and the untethered British enthusiasm, was a scene that had no precedent in London since the outbreak of the war. Handkerchiefs waved, and hundreds of thousands cheered the Secretary of War as he passed through an uninterrupted avenue of yelling men, women and children. The text of Lord Kitchener's speech follows in part: Hitherto the remarks I have found necessary to make as to recruiting have been mainly addressed to the House of Lords, but I have felt the time has now come when I may with advantage make another and larger demand on the resources of English manhood. Enjoying, as I do, the privilege of a freeman of this great city, I am sure my words uttered in the heart of London will spread throughout the nation. The Secretary of War referred to the bravery of the Indian forces, and the Canadian fighting alongside their British and French comrades in Flanders, presenting a solid impenetrable front.



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
