Author of "At Good Old Siwash." Delaware is the most inconsequential state east of Nevada. It is small sliver of sea-coast fenced off from the twentieth century by the Chesapeake and Delaware Bays, and contains about 200,000 people, very few of whom are pestered by fame to any great extent

ish lord who once owned it. It is entirely free from mobility at present, The palyers were:-however. It comes like a thief in the night, when least expected, and often ruins the entire peach crop several times in the same spring.

Delaware is also noted for its caning factories, which are as numerous as its churches, and for its poli tics. Although Delaware is a very small state, with fewer people than can be found around a good-size log-fight in New York City, it is re aired by our cruel Constitution to roduce two senators every six years This is a hard task for the little con



GERMAN WARSHIP ROON REPORTED CAPTURED.

NEW YORK, Feb. 9. Advices received to-day assert that the German warship Roon, alleged to be the capturer of the Appam, has been captured by the British armor ed cruiser Drake, after a three hours fight, two hundred miles northeast o Bermuda. The story is printed in the Globe. The capture of the Roon is said by the Globe to have been fol-lowed by the seizure of two merchantmen, which were flying the German flag, one of which was armed The story is contained in a message which the Globe states it received in code from a reliable source in Ber muda. The message follows: The Drake is here to-day towing the Roon. She took her 200 knots east northeast of Bermuda, in a three hours' running fight, and struck her as she came abeam. Capt. Seagrave, on sighting the Roon, said, "Please God, to-day I will avenge Craddock." The Room was badly knocked about by 9.22. thirty omcers and 18 men were taken, also three prizes. Capt. Seagrave was with Admiral Craddock when the latter went down with the flagship Good Hope, which was sunk in the engagement with a German squadror off Chile. The British Embassy, today, received advices from British agents in New York, that a man living on Statten Island whose name was not transmitted, had received a private despatch from Bermuda, saying that the British cruiser Drake had taken the German cruiser Roon and some German ships. The Em-bassy had no further advices. Capt. Seagrave was in command of the auxiliary cruiser Orama, which form-ed part of Admiral Craddock's squadron in the battle of Chile. After the battle the Orama escaped. Later in company with the cruisers Glasgow and Kent she sunk the German cruiser Dresden off Juan Fernandez Is land. A few days later, in March, 1915, Capt. Seagrave fought a battle with the German armed merchant-man Navarra, off the River Plate, and sank her. The Orama was last reported at Calao, in June, 1915, and nce that time neither it nor Capt. Seagrave had figured in the news. For several days reports have been current in maritime circles here that a German commerce raider had been either sunk or captured by the British. 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



BLOUSE CHALLIES.

Public Market Debated at the Commercial School.

At the Commercial Night School on Monday evening the question of a Public Market was discussed from 9 Public Market was discussed from 9 to 10 p.m. Over thirty students remained for the debate and the majority favoured the idea of a market for the city. Excellent speeches were made, especially by the leaders, students Cyril Barnes and H. Harnett. Owing to weather conditions there were no visitors. The Principal of were no visitors, The Principal of the school, Mr. P. G. Butler, acted as Chairman and judge of the debate and complimented the speakers on their efforts.

Several good reasons were given by the affirmative side among which were the experiences and success of markets in progressive cities elsewhere, and the benefit to the public, farmers and fishermen especially, not only of the city but of the whole country. This was considered from several points of view, those of hygiene, finance, utility, etc. In many parts of the country more vegetables, meat, poultry and fruit would be raised because of the chances of sale at the market. The same would apply to the fresh fish trade. A refrigerator would be provided so that the goods sent in would be preserved till sold in the market by competent agents, while farmers would be encouraged to save time and expense and earn more working on the farm in contentment and comfort, instead of losing time selling from door to door.

The negative side argued on in-creased cost of living, the different conditions here, and the fact that we have fish and meat markets now, also the privilege of going from door to door to sell should not be given up. These points were refuted by the af-These points were retuted by the affirmative side per their leaders, Mr. Hartnett and Mr. Barnes, who made good speeches. They contended that those who did not care to participate in the privileges of the market need not do so but could follow the present plan, so that the cost and privilege arguments could not count against the affirmative the affirmative.

The present fish market was not satisfactory and would be better away from the coves where conditions are not very inviting at low water owing to the drainage of the streets flowing so near the market. The importance of health cannot be overestimated and if war is carrying away thousands disease is carrying off tens of thous-ands and is a cause for still greater alarm. An awakening is needed and a market could help matters by teaching civics and health, unity of purpose and example and environment benefits, moulding public opinion, and controlling conditions resulting to the controlling conditions resulting to the credit of the country more than at present; and people would still have the privilege of buying and selling as they desired, but they would find the advantages of the market so great they would soon patronize it here as elsewhere. The householders would patronize it because the market would deliver them the goods: by telephon-ing, calling or writing a person could secure from the market exactly what ing in vain for a farmer to call-advantages that could not be refuted by any arguments of the negative side. Another opportunity will be given to discuss the matter when a vote will be
