



On the remainder of that front there is heavy fighting in favor of the Serbs, who have captured since Sept. 14th 43 guns, not including trench guns. By the capture of Brod and Velessels, the despatch adds, the Serbians have pierced the Bulgarian second line and are now confronted by a third line on the western slope of Morstova Range, which brings them appreciably nearer Monastir.



Their object is to engage all the forces of the enemy all the time and they are rapidly achieving it. In this respect the incalculable value of Roumania's intervention has not yet been sufficiently apparent by reason of the desperate measures taken by Germany to counter it, but with the failure of those measures it will be doubly plain and doubly formidable. Incandescent Gas Lighting.

Possibly, the feature of incandescent gas lighting most frequently noted by casual observers is the great ease with which tasks, ordinarily arduous under artificial light may be performed under the Welsbach gas mantle.
The light has a peculiarly "soft" quality, difficult to describe, but which is readily recognized by those who have had experience with the gas mantle

lamp.

In its general effect upon bodily health and comfort, the use of incandescent gas lighting is decidedly favorable. The currents of air set up by the burning gas improves ventilation, tending to expel the air vitiated by respiration and draw in fresh air to replace it. Harmful or dangerous disease germs are instantly destroyed in the flame. The extent to which this effect takes place may be verified by placing a gas lamp close to a ceiling without any provision for interfering with the up-rushing air currents. The charred particles which collect immediately above the lamp are the remains of dust particles which before passing through the flames were laden with germs and microbes. Actual burning of gas lamps in rooms previ-busly containing bacteria, resulted in absolute sterilization of the air.

Contrary to the popular notion the emperature of rooms lighted by incandescent gas lamps is seldom mark-edly greater than under incandescent electric light, even under unfavorable conditions of ventilation, while in rooms provided with the ventilating facilities required by the demands of hygiene, the temperature in gas-lightrooms is frequently lower.

Churchill's View.

London Magazine: Mr. Winston hurchill's article on the War by Land and Sea in the October issue of the London Magazine contains some observations on the failures of 1915 which are likely to arouse controversy. For instance, he says: "The enormous number of French and British soldiers sacrificed vainly in endeavours to pierce the German lines at Arras, Loos and in Champagne in the summer and autumn would by hemselves have sufficed to conquer Turkey, to take Constantinople, and by uniting all the Balkan States against Austria to cut Germany alogether from the East, and complete he investment of the Central Powers. Angell Did. (The New Republic, New York.)

Mr. Wilson's speech of acceptance ntained one sentence which overshadows anything that has been said or will be said during the campaign. In the years to come that sentence will surely gather a significance which has been ignored in the heat and haste and distraction of the moment. The statement that "no nation can any onger remain neutral as against any wilful disturbance of the peace of the world" is a doctrine the importance of which it is hardly possible to exaggerate. The fact that it is uttered now by the president of the most powerful neutral, by the president of a nation which has practised and preached international laissez-faire, is a reversal of such importance and with such endless consequences that it would absorb our attention if we had a just perspective on our own future. Whether the tariff should be moved up, down or sideways, whether t was wise or unwise to go to Vera Cruz, whether the eight hour bill is right or wrong are questions that will soon be forgotten, but the principle that neutrality is obsolete is the basis of organized peace in the world.

The idea was born simultaneously in many minds in different nations. It is imbedded in Mr. Asquith's declaration that Britain is fighting for the public law of Europe. It is the residue of truth in Mr. Roosevelt's agitation about Belgium. It is the idea behind the large movements for a league to enforce peace which has the general approval of Viscount Grey, M. Briand, and, it is said, of certain members of the German foreign office. The president's utterance was made not into a vacuum, but as a contribution to an international cause.

The particular words used by Mr. Wilson are worth noting. He speaks of neutrality as no longer possible. This attack on neutrality originated with a man who should have the credit for it. It originated with Norman Angell, and the words used by the president are Mr. Angell's own words.

Mr. Angell spent last winter in the United States lecturing and writing. Mr. Angell spent last winter in the In the weeks preceding the last crisis with Germany over the Sussex he formulated the doctrine that neutrality was obsolete. It emerged after hours of discussion on the basis of memoranda which were recast many times. The results reached the president, not only directly, but through his confidential advisers, and there can be no doubt that the most important sentence in Mr. Wilson's speech was written by Norman Angell.

The whole episode is interesting for its own sake. It is necessary to emphasize it in view of the report that the British government intends to deny Mr. Angell a passport and prevent him from returning to the United States. Leaving aside every consideration but the success of the British cause, it is a great blunder to keep Mr. Angell from the United States. He served his country and ours beyond all Englishmen who have come to us since the war began. Most of the semi-official visitors have hurt more than they have helped by their insensibility to America and their moral pretentiousness. But Mr. Angell quickly and effectively did an incalculable amount to convince leaders of American liberalism of their international responsibilities. He drew us closer to that England with which France died recently in the Derbying is possible.

Canadian Hero.

Graceful Tribute from the Duke of Devonshire.

A Canadian soldier wounded in France died this week in the Derbyshire Royal Infirmary, and the loneliness of his death so far from his home touched such a chord of human sympathy that his funeral yesterday with full military honors, proved an event of the greatest public interest. The streets were crowded with people as the cortege headed by the depot band of the Sherwood Foresters, and accompanied by a large detachment of men with a firing party, passed through the town.

Many wreaths were sent by people in various localities who had subscribed to make this last tribute of respect. The gallant soldier's name was William Moses Kedey, of Ontario, and among his papers was a Masonic certificate and a request from his lodge, in English, French and German, commending him to the tender mercies of any member of the craft among whom he might find himself.

This awakened the special sympathy of Derby Freemasons and many well-known brethren were among the mourners. The circumstances were brought to the notice of the Duke of Devonshire, provincial grand master of Derbyshire Freemasons, who at once directed that a wreath should be forwarded in his name and in the name of the province. Coming from Canada, this was an exceedingly graceful act.—Sheffield Herald.



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
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Under the provisions of "The War Measures Act, 1914," His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to order that the following Regulations shall come into effect as and from the 12th day of October

JOHN R. BENNETT, Colonial Secretary. Dept. of the Colonial Secretary, October 17th, 1916.

1. The Port and Harbor of St. John's is closed entirely to the entry of shipping at night, from nightfall on the 12th October, until further orders.

2. Lights will remain extinguished, until further notice, at Cape St. Francis, Cape Spear, Bull Head, Ferryland and Fer-meuse, also the lights at Fort Amherst and the leading lights

3. No street or other outdoor lights shall be shown in the City of St. John's, or in or near any of the settlements in the Districts of St. John's East and West.

4. No lights shall be lit in any public building, shop or private residence in the Districts of St. John's East or West, except the windows in such public building, shop or residence are covered by suitable blinds or shades, or such lights are otherwise suitably obscured.

5. No lights shall be lit on board any vessel or boat in the Harbor of St. John's, unless suitably obscured.

6. No head lights shall be used on any motor car or motor cycle in or near the City of St. John's, or in or near any settle-ment in the District of St. John's ment in the District of St. John's East and West, or on any roads approaching St. John's or any of the said settlements, upon which lights may be visible at sea. Side lights on motor cars, motor cycles or vehicles of any description must be obscured, and shall not be of greater strength than live candle power

7. It shall be the duty of the members of the Constabulary to see that these Regulations are strictly enforced, and all orders issued by them to the footbuild be footbuild. bservance shall be forthwith

8. It shall be the duty of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries to see that these Regulations are observed on all shipping in the Harbor of St. John's, and all orders issued by him for their better observance shall be forthwith carried out.

9. Every person convicted of a violation of these Rules and Regulations before a Stipendiary Magistrate or a Justice of the Peace shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred 'dollars, or in default of payment to imprisonment not exceeding three months.

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
