Archbishop Protests Peace Terms Germany Still Sending Notes -- Wilson's Message to Congress.

WILSON'S MESSAGE. PARIS, May 16. President Wilson's message to be read at the approaching session of Congress will make approximately 3,000 words. It is being sent forward to Washington to-night. The message deals entirely with domestic questions. Some space in it is devoted to woman suffrage.

CARDINAL PROTESTS. COLOGNE, May 16. Cardinal Hartmann, Archbishop of Cologne, has requested Pope Benedict to intervene in the situation between the Allied Powers and Germany in order to protect Germany from the complete breakdown which menaces her. In his appeal the Cardinal asserted that the peace conditions would mean the utter ruin of Germany and be a cruel violation of the rights of seventy million inhabitants of the country.

STILL ANOTHER NOTE. PARIS, May 16. It became known to-day that the German peace delegation was preparing to send another note to the Allied and Associated Powers concerning the Peace Treaty. The note, which has not yet been completed, is said to be in relation to Alsace and Lorraine.

WAR COSTS. LONDON, May 16. The Chancellor of the Exchequer states that the total amount received from the Dominions for the repayment of loans of twenty-seven million pounds sterling, mostly in respect of interest and from the Allies is twelve millions. These figures are exclusive of adjustment under which, by special arrangements, eighty million pounds sterling was set off between the Imperial and Canadian Governments.

ATLANTIC FLIGHT. DOUBTING EXPERTS. By Cecil Gray in Daily Mail. "I do not think that a flight across the Atlantic will be made in our time, and by 'in our time' I include the youngest of your readers," wrote the late Hon. Charles S. Rolls to the editor of a well-known magazine in May 1909.

Another "Doubting Thomas" of the time—ten years ago—was Major B. F. S. Baden-Powell, the inventor of man-lifting kites and, for many years, secretary of the Aeronautical Society. "I think," he wrote whimsically, "that a flight across the Atlantic is one that can only be regarded as a flight of fancy, for up to date no sufficiently advanced strides have been made to the conquest of the air to render any confident statements at all justifiable. Still," he added, guardedly, "I may say that I am a great believer indeed in some form of aeroplane machine soon becoming of much practical value."

Turning from the less hopeful prophets to those with more enthusiasm we find Mr. Percival Spencer, in the same year—1909—stating that, "It is quite a feasible project to attempt a flight by aeroplane across the Atlantic. The distance, I take it, may be reckoned approximately, at 3,000 miles, and as the flying machine can progress at a speed of 40 miles an hour, the journey could be performed in 75 hours. 'I hope, and think, that English aeroplanists, 'birdists,' as I heard them called the other day, will be able to keep abreast with foreign competitors in the art of flying, and if an Englishman is the first to make a flight across the Atlantic in an aeroplane, may I be the first to shake him by the hand!'"

And again—still only ten years ago—Captain W. G. Windham, founder of the Aero Club, stated emphatically: "The only thing that will prevent an aeroplane and aeroplanists from ever making a flight across the Atlantic will be fear of—well, a watery grave in the briny. But as, fortunately, adventurous spirits are always to be found who will dare anything for the sake of progress, I venture to predict that this stumbling block will not prove a formidable one."



World's Oldest Folk.

In the extreme north of the Russian province of Archangel, where thirteen thousand British soldiers are just now fighting for their lives, dwells one of the queerest and least known races of mankind.

These are the Samoyedes, the wandering tribes of the vast frozen marshes which extend in these regions from the forest belt to the shores of the Arctic Ocean.

Like the Bedouins of the Sahara, these people owe allegiance to no master. Civilization has passed by them in its stride, and they live to-day pretty much as our forefathers here in Britain lived twenty centuries or more ago.

They worship idols and their sole wealth consists in reindeer. Indeed, but for these hardy animals existence in the icy solitudes would be impossible.

Living, the reindeer draws the sledge which transports the Samoyede and his belongings from spot to spot in search of the game and fish, which constitute his principal sustenance. Dead, it provides him with meat in times of scarcity, and with skin for his family tent.

With its sharpened bones he tips

his wooden fishing harpoons and hunting spears. Its sinews he uses to sew together the shirt, breeches, and boots of sealfish, which are the attire alike of the Samoyede men, women and children.

The Power of the Press.

The day is assuredly at hand when the trite subject, resolved that the pen is mightier than the sword, will no longer be available for debates in country schools. A little reflection on the steadily increasing influence of the printed page is now a very definite force, and that by virtue of its peculiar advantages over other agencies, it is likely to arrogate to itself in future much of the authority now being exercised by individuals, societies, and business institutions over the motives and actions of mankind.

Printing was discovered by John Guttenberg in 1450. He had cut the letters of his name from the bark of a tree, and was spreading them to form his name, when one of them fell into a pot of boiling dye. Quickly he plunged his fingers in to rescue the letter; but finding it very hot, he turned it loose. It fell upon one of the white skins which were waiting to be dyed, and when John lifted the block he saw a beautiful purple white "H" smiling up at him. That was the first letter ever printed on the continent of Europe.

The first newspaper, however, was the Peking Tchingpao (News of the Capital) in the year 713 of the Tang dynasty in China. Daniel Defoe started the first newspaper in England. The first American newspaper was "Public Occurrences," begun in Boston in 1690. In 1900 the United States published forty per cent. of the newspapers of the world, that is out of the 50,000 newspapers then published in the United States. All the newspapers in America now publish about 15,000,000 copies per year.

Only a few days ago the prime minister of England took pains to hurl his most caustic invective against the Northcliffe publications, having determined, no doubt, to destroy their prestige before they could begin to turn the tide of public opinion against him. Last week, in the Canadian Parliament, Mr. Mackie, of Edmonton East, in the course of a long and bitter complaint, declared that a Winnipeg reporter had almost ruined him politically by maliciously wiring a highly falsified interview to Edmonton. There was not a reliable reporter in the press gallery, he declared, except Ford, and he was reliable only because he sent nothing west. He exhorted the press gallery men to be fair and honest in their reports. These charges were consonant with those of Mr. Lemieux, who emphasized the vital importance of an unadulterated public opinion expressed through the newspapers of the country, as well as the peril of publications controlled by powerful and



General Sympathy.

There is no doubt that the feeling of general sympathy which is being freely expressed for our American Cousins is both deep and genuine. Having been so successful in the flight of their dirigible airship from Montauk to this point, a flight which will be ever memorable in ballooning history, it is keenly disconcerting to them that disaster should so suddenly have overtaken their craft, within such a short period after arrival, thus preventing them from carrying out whatever projects they may have contemplated with regard to further continuing the air voyage across the Atlantic, or of flying back to the starting point.

It must also be a cause of regret and disappointment to our English brothers, that adverse conditions, (not altogether local) have militated against their getting away on their long distance flight from Newfoundland to Ireland. They too have been waiting and hoping, making a virtue of necessity, and daily expecting the good word which will send them humming through the ethereal spaces in the greatest adventure upon which man ever set out. Their disappointments are reflected in our people, who are as much interested in the aerial journey, as are the aviators themselves, and are keenly in sympathy with the courageous men who are patiently, though anxiously, watching all the weather reports from the various meteorological bureaus, in momentary expectation of the favorable opportunity. We trust that the omens will soon be propitious and that the signal to start may not be much longer delayed.

Our American correspondent makes the statement that Newfoundland is acquiring an unenviable reputation for bad weather, because all the stories of the air flights published in the American press, emphasize that atmospheric conditions in this domain are responsible for the delay in hopping off, and that we are constantly shrouded in dense fogs, drenched with rain,

and blockaded with ice. All these stories are gross libels on our climate. Far from being adverse, the weather about St. John's and along the coast has been most fair, considering the season, and therefore the blame for the holding up of the aviators must not be laid on Newfoundland. True April and May are not considered summer months by any means, neither do we expect summer weather in them. Nevertheless it is remarkable that this season everything has been uncommonly fair, with pleasant breezes and clear skies. The fault, if fault there be, does not rest with this island. So far as local conditions were concerned the flights could have taken place on most any day since the machines were in readiness, and it is grossly unjust of correspondents to lay on the fair fame of Newfoundland and her ideal weather all the blame for the nonstarts of the transatlantic air voyage.

All that we hope is that the time will soon be opportune and that the most wonderful feat in the history of the world will be successfully accomplished, not only by one, but by all who are now preparing to undertake it.

Man Drowned.

The Deputy Minister of Customs received the following message this morning:
"John Cluett, Geo. Gilbert and Wm. Cluett fishing at Woody Head, near Dantzic, Fortune Bay, left for St. Pierre of Wednesday, May 14th, in motor dory, without a clearance, arriving back at Woody Head the same evening. Wm. Cluett fell from the engine house into the water and was drowned."

At the evening service also, the congregation will have the privilege of hearing Mrs. Pilsent, our own Missionary from Japan, speak of her experiences. Hon. R. K. Bishop has kindly consented to take the chair. The choir will provide special music. Visitors will be welcomed.

Last Night's Lecture.

Rev. Barraclough Says, "Lack of Education in Western Provinces Constitutes Serious Menace to Future Well Being of Canada."

The Lecture Room of the Cochrane Street Centennial Church, last night, contained a representative gathering of the members of the different Women's Missionary Societies of the City, who listened to an inspiring address by the Rev. W. Barraclough, B.A., on "Women's Work in the West." The address covered a short review of the work of such pioneers of Missionary endeavour as Emma Crosby, Miss Lee, Thomas Crosby and William Duncan. It also dealt with the work now being carried on through the assistance rendered by the various Women's Societies, showing how well the money was spent and how great was the need for still more help. If the Christian Church was to fulfil its duties to the foreigners within our gates, touching upon the Alien problem, the rev. gentleman said it was of the greatest concern, both to the Church and the State. There were 800,000 non-English speaking people in Canada, a large portion of whom came from Southern Europe. Many of them were living to themselves, and this constituted a serious menace to the future well-being of Canada. Lack of education facilities were one of the causes for this condition of things. In the Province of Alberta alone 900 schools were short of teachers, and 15,000 alien children were without a teacher. That meant the children would preserve the ideas of their fathers and grow up in an atmosphere, the result of which will be the reaping of a whirlwind, unless it is immediately grappled with.

Very interesting was the description of work among the Orientals, and the heroism of self-sacrifice and devotion of the Missionaries' wives, and of the nurses engaged in hospital work showed a loyalty to the King of Kings and to the State that may well be emulated by Christians everywhere.

The rev. gentleman is a pleasing speaker, one of the best informed Canadians on the alien problem, gained by experience and study, and may be ranked as one of the leading statesmen of the Methodist Church of Canada and Newfoundland.

DESTROYER FLASHING SIGNALS—CAPE RACE, To-day.

(Special to Evening Telegram.)
CAPE RACE, To-day.

The three American Seaplanes that left Trepassay yesterday evening for the transatlantic flight, passed about 3 miles west of this station. From the time when first sighted until they were hidden by the horizon, was seventeen minutes. We also saw the first destroyer flashing signals, to the Seaplanes as they disappeared from our view. Everything could be distinctly observed by our large telescope as the seaplanes, along and the noise of their engines was plainly heard. To-day's Messages.

TROUBLE EXPECTED.
PARIS, May 16.
An extensive allied naval concentration has been begun at Smyrna, in connection with a mandate to Greece to administer the city.

ARRANGING SETTLEMENT.
PARIS, May 16.
Negotiations are pending for the adjustment of the Adriatic controversy. They contemplate a direct settlement between Italy and Jugo-Slavia, through American mediation.

LEFT BUDAPEST.

VIENNA, May 15.
All the Allied representatives have left Budapest, and Redguards are digging trenches about the city. Since the apparent failure of the Czecho-Slovak-Romanian offensive, the Anglo-Americans are less popular with the Soviet. Ten days ago the Soviet adherents were in a panic and were prepared for flight, burning official papers.

THE CORRECT POSITION.

VERSAILLES, May 16.
A distinct impression among some of the subordinate members of the German Peace Mission, that the Germans will sign the Peace Treaty, is reflected in the remark of one of the secretaries, who is quoted as saying "that when we do our best, we are on the ground and your knees are on our stomachs, and your thumbs are in our eyes."

PEREMPTORY ANSWER.

PARIS, May 16.
A peremptory answer to the German Note, registering objection to the proposed terms for the settlement of the Rhine and the Sarre Valley, has been drafted by the special commission on territorial affairs. It was reported this morning. The reply, it was expected, would be submitted to the Council of Four to-day.

THERE MAY BE OTHERS.

PARIS, May 16.
The German Peace Treaty, it developed to-day, contains a clause which has not yet been made public, providing that ratification by Germany of the pact, will bring the treaty into force between the ratifying parties, enabling the immediate resumption of trade.

CHURCHILL AND REBATES.

LONDON, May 16.
(Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—The Right Hon. Winston Churchill, Secretary of State for war, said he did not consider the proposal to give the dominions a rebate on imported taxation raised the general free trade issue. Recalling his phrase "The door is being bolted and barred against taxation on foodstuffs," he said he always considered that a rebate of different kinds stood on an entirely different plane. If it removed taxation from food, it would certainly add to the cost of living, or in any way burden our people. It should not be treated as a question of principle, but as a measure of imperial diplomacy, designed to express the warmth of our gratitude for the dominions' assistance in the war. The dominions wanted this rebate and we would be wise to concede it, while keeping the great body of doctrine and practice intact.

IMPORTANT CAPTURE.

LONDON, May 16.
(Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—It is learned that General Barret's troops occupied Dacca, in Afghanistan, on May 15. This is a most important operation and the British are definitely stopped the menace to Kandahar. The movement is regarded as showing that the movement will be Fizele out. Dacca is situated at a very important point on the Kabul River and its loss will greatly damage the Afghans prestige.

OTTAWA, May 16.
(Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—The bishop Bruchesi has departed for France and Belgium, where he will meet Cardinal Mercier, the Belgian prelate, whom he will ask to visit Canada, after his visit to the United States next fall.

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

The PLANES ARE OFF

"Nancys" One, Three and Four Left
Trepassey 7.45 Last Evening.

TREPASSEY, To-Day.
At last, after days of anxious wait-
ing, the American Navy Seaplanes
One, Three and Four have set out on
their great journey to the Azores, a
distance of 1200 miles. At 6.15 the
Seaplanes slipped their moorings and
Commander Townes was the first to
make his "take-off." Shooting along
the surface of the harbor at high

Four, was the last to leave the harbor

been beautifully circled out around
Fretwell's Head, across Mutton Bay to
the Cape and then back to the harbor
and reported conditions for the flight
to be ideal. Almost instantly One and
Four got going, the Three being first,
Four second and One third to get away.

The last that could be seen of them,
five minutes after their departure,
showed them in triangle formation,
two miles distance being between them.
The weather conditions were perfect
a N. W. breeze blow from early in the
morning at the rate of 15 miles an
hour, and the Trepassey-Azores line
of ships reported conditions in the
Atlantic to be good.
Each seaplane carried its crew of 6,
the full oil supply, however being less
by 150 gallons. This reduction was
made as a result of the planes failure
to take-off on Thursday, when the
weight was found to be too great.
Confidence that the planes will make
the voyage successfully and safely is
felt here.
U. S. S. Aroostook is to sail to-day
for Plymouth, possibly via the Azores.
The Prairie will sail for New Port, R. I.
The Hiko, fuel oil tanker, will sail
for the Atlantic to refuel the destroyers
Four second and One third to get away,
posted along the route.

From Out the Storied Past.
BUSINESS 100 YEARS AGO.
(H. F. SHORTIS.)
Article XIV.

In Mr. Kelson's letters published in the article XII. he makes use of the following words: "They are far beyond the means of stability, and a dreadful crash must sooner or later take place. It behooves every one connected with the Newfoundland Trade to be extremely cautious." Now let us see how Mr. Kelson's warning turned out. When he penned the above words the price of fish had reached its zenith, viz. 45s. per qt. and not 40s. as our own so-called historians tell us. This was in 1814. He was undoubtedly a man who once he made up his mind would act accordingly—a man of action as well as foresight and decision, possessing will power and an enduring mental energy. As a writer I leave my readers to draw their own conclusions. One would imagine that if he were a ruler he would have instead of a quill pen. How nicely he sends a home to Mr. Slade as to his (Slade's) impossibility to conduct the Newfoundland business from 2,000 miles away, and with what determination, coupled with grace and refinement, he demands the discretionary power which Mr. Slade conferred on him in a previous letter, but afterwards interfered with his (Kelson's) arrangements in a loss of business. Mr. Slade, to understand that he knew something whatever as to how the business was working without expressing himself so. He was indeed a keen and public writer.

Warning Justified.
But with regard to Mr. Kelson's prophecy as to the downfall of those who speculated at the high prices. It is well known that in 1814 the price of fish dropped suddenly and brought on a commercial crash, with the result that very many of the merchants were forced into insolvency, commercial ruin. Many others became involved, and were unable to pay their bills. Many others became distressed, disposed of their property and left their shores for other climes. Indeed there were only a few firms that weathered the storm, and even these were so hampered and so disheartened that they curtailed their business, and barely kept it moving. It is stated that the losses by bankruptcy alone was £1,000,000 and that nearly 1,000 legal cases, arising out of the great commercial failures, came before the Civil Courts. Of course there were no banks in those days, and as a rule the fishermen, planters, and even tradesmen and others left their money on the merchants' hands, and thus all their hard earnings passed away in the crash of 1814-7. Some of the estimates state that not less than £2,000,000 was lost to the working classes. As a natural sequence, everything became disorganized, the factories received a set-back, because the planters and fishermen could not get full supplies, and, worse than all, the wages due the fishermen for the previous year, were not paid. The result was a large influx of immigrants in 1814-4 owing to the unprecedentedly high price for fish, and very many of these had to be looked after by the authorities, or the charity of those who could but ill afford it. Many were sent out of the country.

St. John's in Flames.
To add to the long chapter of trials, tribulations, afflictions and troubles with the stern realities of life to which the poor people were subjected owing to commercial depression, on the 12th February, 1816, the city of St. John's was in flames, with a heavy gale of wind blowing. In those days the houses were built of wood, and the fire, fanned by the great gale, swept the town with great rapidity, and we can imagine the 1,600 poor

From what you and Capt. Stanworth have written me it seems you have been detaining this vessel and the John and Elizabeth, meaning on account of the fall of Provisions, but I question much if the reduction in price for which you have been waiting will be equivalent to the injury the Trade has and will sustain from the want of certain articles which were omitted by the other vessels, and with respect to the Gannet, in particular, I am inclined to think you would not have detained her had you compared together or placed in opposite scales the gain on Provisions on the possible loss that would accrue to the Trade, should her salt not be out in time. The sum by which the Trade will now be benefited by her being detained for the fall on the small quantity of Provisions she may bring (and she can draw out a small quantity if you complete my indent for two cargoes of salt) will be a mere nothing, to the sum or injury of loss it will do to the Trade, in case of her salt. The loss and gain in this instance will bear no comparison. When I indented for 2 cargoes of salt I had not the least idea that you would consider they were wanting for the present season, and doubted not but they would be sent out in good time. There is no chance for the Gannet not being sent off from Liverpool with the same convoy as Mr. Garland's George. I am sorry that I myself under the necessity of making such unpleasant remarks, and I hope you will excuse me for so doing when you consider how very perplexing it is to be disappointed in a business of this kind in our supply of such a principle article, and that it is the importance of our being always supplied with salt (to the value of £100,000) that I endeavour to prevent a like disappointment from happening in the future.

The Cosmopolite with Capt. Samuel Patrick on board, whom I shipped at £6 per month (the same wages he had with Sleat and the Fall 1814) as schooner master, sailmaker, fish-culler or anything else as ordered for the good of the voyage, etc.) is gone for Carbonear or St. John's from 150 to 180 hhd. of salt with which I hope she will return in a day or two, as there is no knowing when the Gannet may arrive. It is rather fortunate for us that the other houses are short of salt too. Sleat and Reid's house have been long since applying to St. John's, and Mr. Garland knows how purchased there upwards of 1300 hhd. at 30s. to 35s. per hhd. The Alpha has in 420 qts. new fish, and we have much more in the store; and I expect she will sail by the 12th inst. I shall direct the Captain to call for orders of, Porto Bar or Lisbon, according to the winds may answer when on that coast, and to return here with a cargo of salt. If she goes to the former place, I shall direct her to call on Messrs. Mahon and Foster, and if to the latter, Garland & Co. I have heard nothing from the French Shore since she sailed for the French Shore, several stores and afloat that the fishery has been unsuccessful in that quarter.

Fishery Reports.
In our Bay and as far to the northward as Pond, the planters have done very well, no there is still a good prospect. From the reports we have had no certain accounts, but report says there has been but very little fish caught. Capt. Roalson is now in the Mary collecting fish. It is a great pity you should have neglected sending the Fish Beams and half hundred indented for or the Fall. We are in bad way of them, and there are none to be had in St. John's. There has not yet been said one word respecting the price of new fish. What it will be, it is not easy to guess. I do not expect any price will be fixed for some time. It is fortunate that we are in possession of the favourable accounts from Spain and Portugal. The Benjamin I am informed sails early to-morrow for Poole. I shall therefore direct her by adding that the Cosmopolite is just returned with 150 hhd. Cadiz salt from Messrs. George and James Kemp, Carbonear, at 6s. per hhd. payable by Bills in the Fall. Sleat and Reid's Bacchus is now here, nearly loaded with old fish and is waiting to take in about 1,000 qts. more of old fish, and Capt. Patrick tells me Messrs. Kemp & Co. were just sending off for market a cargo of old fish, and a schooner load of old Madeira for St. John's, so that your Trade although late in pushing out, was not so much so as many others. What the Cosmopolite carried to St. John's was collected from our dealers after the Swallow sailed. Mr. Garland's house sent some after that and I am told has some hundred qts. still remaining. We have not one old fish left, the Cosmopolite having carried the whole stock in my letter No. 7. What the Cosmopolite carried was sold at 20s. per qt. for 83 qts. West India and 30s. per qt. for 160 qts. Madeira—the hopes, 421 bundles at 7s. 6d. per bundle. I have no doubt of being able to raise cargoes for all the vessels and second loads for two of them, with a cargo to remain the winter agreeably to your letters No. 1 and 4, and on as reasonable terms as my neighbors. The Account in all probability will be the next vessel we shall begin loading with fish, and I shall order her to whatever place in Spain or Portugal I may think most advisable from an account I may yet receive unless I hear anything from you to the contrary. She will I believe take in her cargo at Catalina, but as yet she is still here. As usual I shall conclude my letter with wishes for the safe arrival of the Gannet and John and Elizabeth, and remain sir,

Convoy Delayed.

Trinity, August 11th, 1814.
Sir—This is per the Benjamin which vessel has been detained the last three or four days by a foul wind, and is merely to say that there is still no sign of the Gannet, John and Elizabeth or any other vessel of the June convoy. I intend sending the Swallow off again to the French Shore. The Alpha has in between 8 and 900 qts. of fish and she will sail for Oporto, Vienna or Lisbon, according to the winds may answer when on that coast. Mr. Garland's house I understand, sold lately in St. John's about 300 qts. at 9s. per qt., for which they gave him 2500 lbs. of salt at 35s. per hhd. Mr. Durrell was extremely active early in the Spring in pushing it off to Pond, and also to some of our 18s. per hhd., carrying it freight free to

Mr. Robert Slade.
Sir—Neither in Mr. Garland's vessels have arrived excepting the Lady Ann, from France, with salt, on the 10th inst. The three youngsters are very acceptable, and even late as it is I wish you had sent me a dozen. The Nelson, it seems, is making a wonderful long passage, and it is a circumstance extremely fortunate for us. Had she arrived early with her tribe of youngsters, many of our dealers would have been supplied by that. The Alpha sailed on the morning of the 13th inst., with a fine breeze, and she must have had, from her account Hannon and Stanworth being very fine time off the land. I am in great hopes she will be the first cargo of new fish to make any where not get more into her. I have heard of no other new fish vessel having sailed. Enclosed is Bill of Lading of her cargo, which is of Porto Bar or Lisbon, according to the winds. You will say the quantity is very small, but the fish being light and dry, and but little time to settle we could not get more into her. It goes to Vienna; the captain will supply to Messrs. Hunt, Newman & Roope, who are very attentive in purchasing with advice. Sleat and Reid's Bacchus is still here with her old fish. Their schooner sailed for the French Shore on the 17th, and your Swallow on the 15th inst. I did not mention any quantity of salt as remaining on our last Fall's list. The 370 hhd. you allude to must have been an error in copying. Had we been left so short as that last Fall, and only two cargoes indented for, for this season, the consequence would have indeed been a good clean bottom, and the weather answers shall begin loading her here in a day or two's time, and probably send her to Catalina to meet up. The John and Elizabeth and Gannet of course are partly discharged. The Alpha was well cleaned and in good order when she sailed.

Marine Insurance.
It is often necessary to have the vessels down, and as we have but very poor gear for such work, the risk of doing so is certainly great. Hitherto we have met with no accident, but I think it best to guard against it in time, and I shall be glad if you will send out by your next vessel 3 three-fold blocks, cogged and bushed, 24 inches in diameter, and 6 inches in length of good hemp, which of course will be wanting also for a fall. In your letter No. 8 I note particularly what you say respecting the insurance of the vessels, and it is singularly strange that neither I should have asked, nor you to have informed me, long before this concerning such a material point. Several times I have hesitated, between sending to Poole and abroad, particularly last Fall with the Gannet, which vessel I certainly should have sent to you had I known what your letter No. 8 has now informed me, and you will observe that I was equally embarrassed in this Spring with the George on the same account. Your always having written me to be particular in advising you concerning the vessel for your government respecting insurance, led me to believe that you always insured them for such place only as I stated the George will complete it. Respecting the masters being kept from knowing the destination of the vessels until they are ready to sail, I think it a good plan, and I shall pay attention to your remark on that subject. The depressed state of the course of Exchange between England and the fish market, has been noticed in all the letters I have received this Spring from abroad, nevertheless am greatly obliged for your remark. The concluding lines of your letter No. 9 I consider as equal to the discretionary power I have been hinting at in my letter No. 6, therefore I do not plead any more being cramped in my judgments or tied down to positive instructions in any future transactions of the Trade.

Plenty of Youngsters.
Trinity, Sept. 8, 1814.
The Nelson arrived on the 23rd ult., and the Augustus not until the 31st, and it gives us much pleasure to find that we have a vessel that will sail much better than any of those belonging to our neighbors. The Nelson brought 50 youngsters, and the Augustus 30. Mr. Garland's first cargo of new fish was the John, which vessel was loaded up the Bay, and sailed for market on the 24th August, 11 days after your Alpha. Their next cargo was the Amy from this place on the 31st ult., and they have now no vessel here. We began loading the Augustus on the 22nd ult., and she sailed for Catalina on the 26th (which place she reached the same day) with 760 qts. of merchantable fish, and I ex-

College Extension.

The initial work of the College Extension Campaign has been well organized during the past week, and all the committees are beginning to find their work; and after a while the entire machinery of the enterprise will be in full operation. This movement is one that all our people, of all classes, will watch with interest; and every citizen who believes in the improvement of St. John's will extend his sympathy to its success. But the movement is wider than St. John's, and is intended for the benefit of the whole Dominion, and it will establish a bond of unity with many of our people, which otherwise could not be effected. Therefore, to make the most of this opportunity, the committee in general, or we had perhaps better say, the executive, have begun their work with excellent system; and while each department will push its own special work, due care has been taken, so as to avoid anything like overlapping. It is meant to begin well, for "well begun is half done."

When we bear in mind that this movement is for the cause of Education, we at once see its importance, and begin to comprehend its worth. Much has been done by all the religious denominations towards the promotion of education, and many good and worthy men have devoted their lives to its welfare. They were enthusiasts in their calling, and were masters in what they did. Devoted and holy women have also left their impress upon this great cause, and in their ranks to-day are to be found a noble army of valiant teachers. These teachers mould the thought of the scholars, and they rank next to the clergy in the importance of their calling.

The present age owes a big debt of gratitude to those who were instrumental in bringing our educational system up to its present status; and one of the best means of expressing this gratitude is by adopting the most up-to-date facilities for the furtherance of the work. This is what this extension campaign intends to do, and it is for this purpose that it has been inaugurated. Having made this point, we have, for the present, said enough.—L.C.M.

Found He was an Epileptic.

Almost before Christian's first kisses of welcome were cold on her lips he began to treat her with aversion and cruelty. At his wedding-banquet he was drunk when he took his seat by her side; and, when he saw the tears in her eyes, he declared aloud that he had "no use for a wife who was always weeping." And, at its conclusion, he left her, to spend the night in a drunken orgy with his boon comrades.

Ladies' Blouses Made From Sour Milk.

Remarkable Work of French Scientists.


If one or two discoveries which have been made during the last twelve months develop along possible lines, we ought to see some interesting fashion notes in a few years' time. Fancy taking up a morning paper and reading a society paragraph to the effect that "Lady X. looked very chic in a tailor-made costume of fine-spun wood, with a sour-milk blouse, trimmed with very dainty yeast buttons."

Of course, it sounds utterly ridiculous, yet such a thing has passed beyond the realm of fancy; in a few years it may be an accomplished fact. Two celebrated French scientists recently exhibited sets of undergarments made entirely, material and buttons alike, from sour milk. These men found that when they pressed the curds and dried them in the open air, they had left a grey, putty-like substance.

This they treated with acetone, a chemical distilled from wood, with the result that they obtained two new substances, one a hard material from which they could cut buttons, and so on, and the other a soft material which they could draw out into fine silky threads. The weaving of these threads into a soft fabric was a simple matter.

Formerly one of the big waste products of the brewing industry was the spent yeast. A small amount of it was handed over to the baker and a larger amount was utilized for the purpose of making soap tablets and other patent foods.

Now it has been discovered that the material left has a great com-



mercial value. It is a soft grey substance which can be modelled to any required shape and will take both color and grain; it is known to the trade as *ernolith*.

When dried it yields a powder which can be hot-pressed to any design, and which sets to a hard ivory-like substance. It can be turned, drilled, scraped and filed, and it takes a high polish.

From it countless articles, such as combs, buttons, brush and knife handles, previously made from bone, ivory, or celluloid, can be made and made cheaply. So that buttons from yeast is a certain thing of the future.
