

Controller's Department.

For the more accurate record of Ales, Wines and Spirits dispensed by the Controller's Department, and by Medical Practitioners and Licensed Druggists, as provided for by the Prohibition Act, it has been found necessary to make a slight addition to the particulars called for on prescription forms, and pending the issue of a new series the additional record must be made on each prescription as indicated in the following para-

1. Doctors practising in St. John's will write on the reverse side of each prescription issued, the house number and name of street and of the person prescribed for.

2. City Doctors prescribing for non-residents will write on the reverse side of prescription the name of locality and the name of district of the person prescribed for.

3. Prescriptions issued by City Doctors for residents of localities outside St. John's who may be visiting the city must show such person's temporary City address in addition to their permanent residence.

4. Doctors practising outside St. John's will write on the reverse side of prescriptions issued by them the name of locality and the name of district of persons prescribed for.

5. Outport Doctors prescribing Spirits for persons residing in St. John's must write on the reverse side of prescription the house number and street of the person prescribed for.

On and after September 1st, compliance with these conditions will be insisted on by this Department and by all Druggists dispensing Spirits.





Hazardous Trip Form Codroy to North Sydney.

North Sydney.—From Codroy, New-foundland, to White Point, Cape Breton, in less than eleven hours through raging seas in a 14-foot keel boat was the experience of Bill Brake. Wednesday last it may be re-collected was distinguished by high winds from the Northeast and, while practically not felt here, the spectator, for instance, at Cranberry would view tumultuous seas lashed into violence by a thirty knot gale. That day the S.S. Marion remained

on this morning the bold skipper of the little smack German Adelle decided to set sail. He left Codroy decided to set sail. He left Codroy at 8 o'clock in the morning, well provisioned and accompanied only by his young son. With fair wind behind the little craft tore along through mountainous seas on its way to Cape Breton. Her hatches were well battened down and though shipping many seas, "she rode the waves like a thing of life." All through waves like a thing of life." All through the day she held a steady course, through boiling waves, and just as the shades began to gather she came off White Point. Here the skipper decided to remain for the night, not from any fear of the elements, but rather to secure rest and needed sleep. It is the opinion of local mariners that had he continued his course through the ngiht down the Cape Breton coast both himself and course through the ngiht down the Cape Breton coast, both himself and his son would have paid the penalty with their lives. Next morning the sea had moderated somewhat and he pursued his way toward North Sydney, but before reaching the harbor mouth he had providently caught about 350 pounds of fish. Arriving here yesterday he promptly disposed. here yesterday he promptly disposed of his cargo to give him, as he ex-pressed it, enough money to keep him

pressed it, enough money to keep him going over Sunday.

Capt. Brake will fish out of here for some little time. He disclaims all suggestions of heroism in connection with his trip and contents himself with saying, "I had a fairwind, why shouldn't I take advantage of it." Fresh fish he says are selling now for 1 1-2 cents a pound at Codroy, so he decided to do his fishing over here, where he could dispose of his catch at 2 3-4 cents per pound to local dealers. He is a genuine type of the fearless seaman, and has always been inclined to fish when most boats would remain in post would remain in port.

AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR THE STANDARDIZATION OF CODFISH!

WHEREAS it is essential in the interests of the Colony that the methods of preparing and exporting codfish which are at present in use should be regulated and improved

Be it enacted by the Governor, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows:— 1. There shall be a Commission to be appointed by His Excellency the Governor-in-Council, which shall be known as the Codfish Standardization Commission

2. The said Commission shall consist of not less than five or more than eleven persons, of whom the Minister of Marine and Fisheries shall be one, ex officio, and shall be the Chairman. 3. It shall be the duty of the said Commission to prepare and draft rules and regulations for the improvement of the manner in which salt codfish (hereinafter called fish) is prepared for sale and transported, and in particular governing the following matters, that is to say:

(1) The manner of catching, splitting, cleaning, salting, drying, curing, pickling and preparing fish for sale and export; and generally, all and singular the operations involved in the preparation of salt codfish, from the catching of the fish to the production of the finished article.

(2) The culling, selecting, assorting, standardizing, and determination of the different types or varieties of fish, with a view to the establishment of grades thereof in the local and foreign markets and to the ensuring, so far as possible, of suitability for the several markets.

(3) The stowage, storage, packing, inspection, and weighing

of fish and marketing of packages (4) The lading, stowage, protection, dunnageing, covering, and all other matters connected with the carriage and conveyance of fish whether within this Colony or from this Colony to other countries, and whether in ships, ve-

hicles, or any other modes of conveyance. (5) The establishments of standards of size, type, condition, grade and quality of fish, and the means of determining and enforcing the same.

(6) The fixing of differences between the prices of different sizes, types, conditions, grades and qualities in the local markets, and the provision of methods for accurately determining such sizes, types, conditions, grades and quali-

(7) The fixing of panalties for the breach of any of the rules and regulations to be made as aforesaid. Specific penalties shall be fixed for breach of each particular rule and

4. All such rules and regulations shall be laid before His Excellency the Governor-in-Council for approval, and if when so approved and published in the Royal Gazette shall at the expiration of 15 days from the date of the Proclamation have the force and effect of Law if incorporated in this Act 5. This Act may be cited for all purposes as "The Fish Standardization Act, 1920." aug13,20,27,sep3
