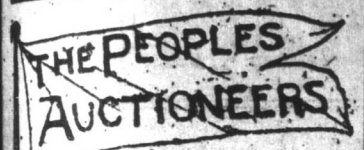

One Little Question.

The only argument that the Advocate can put up in discussing the strictures of the Telegram on the militant threats of Mr. Coaker, is that the editor of this paper was defeated in Burgeo and LaPoile District during the general elections of 1919. That is ancient news, brother, and if you can derive any pleasure from it, why the zmeusement is all yours. But candidly now, don't you think that people are getting just a little bit tired of that old wheeze, and had rather have you devote a little more care in preparing an intelligent response to whatever hostile criticism is directed at the President of the F.P.U. and Minister of Marine and Fisheries. The "Kill Coaker" lament which you are so fond of putting up at all times and on all occasions is really not worthy your intellect. You have broader avenues than that down which to tread; other more important subjects to discuss than the defeat of the editor of the Telegram nearly two years ago. Times have changed since then, and a deal of water has flowed under the bridge. But enough of the personal equation. If the Advocate desires to be serious and discuss local affairs in a sensible manner, it has all the material that could be wished for at its disposal.

There is the present condition of the country precipitated by the imposition of Coaker's abominable Fish Regulations. There is the labor situation in St. John's. There is the financial state of the country and the glaring fact to be faced that there will be but very few supplies—if any—issued for the prosecution of the Labrador and Shore fisheries this season. Yet notwithstanding the crisis ahead, the man who allegedly controls the editorial columns of the Advocate has no better argument to put up in defence of the Administration which has wrought all the evils enumerated than that Mr. James lost his nomination deposit in Burgeo and LaPoile. Fie Mr. Advocate editor. You should know better. There were others, you know. Get that giant intellect of yours to work on something of more importance. Tell us how it is that the price of fish is so low to-day. Explain why the President of the Fishermen's Protective Union does not come to the rescue and make good his one-time boast, "The price of fish is what Coaker makes it." Arguing from that oft-repeated declaration and assuring it to be as uttered, then Coaker is responsible for the present small ruling price now being paid along the waterfront for dry codfish. Undeniable, isn't it?

Then there is another subject into which the Advocate might delve and proclaim the facts, the inner facts, for the benefit of the people of Newfoundland. It has been discussed very recently in the House of Assembly, and will doubtless again be underling fire. That subject is the

transaction involving the cargo of the schooner "President Coaker," and a more scandalous scheme was never devised to throw the public off the track with regard to the manner in which the arrangements were carried out. No sane man would contemplate such a thing. No man of integrity would develop it. No man of honor would be a party to it. But it was put through by a Minister the Crown, or at his instigation, which amounts to the same thing, and the astounding revelations made concerning it have proven shady conduct in high places. The mystery of the "President Coaker" is a mystery no longer, thanks to Sir John Crosbie, but the odor it has raised ranks in the nostrils of the people. And it is not yet settled and done with. So far only the embroideries have been touched. When the whole garment is removed and all can see what is concealed behind it, more harsh words than have been yet applied to this scandalous deception, will be uttered. Surely His Excellency the Governor is cognizant of this duplicity on the part of one of his Ministers. What is he going to do about it? Will the Advocate answer that one little question, and not evade the issue?

Seen From the Gallery.

There was very little excitement in the House yesterday, Mr. Coaker being absent, but Messrs. Poole and Cheseman were in their places after a noticeable intermission. Other Government members bunched together like partridges in a covey fearing the gun of the hunter.

The Premier's explanation of the Long Bridge operations were of such a redundant quality, and his voice was so low, that no person in the House, least of all himself, understood just what he was talking about. The usual flow of language issued from the lips of Hon. R. A. but it was sound and nothing more.

Mr. Samson held his head in his hands, during the time he was not occupying the Chair of Committee, and listened carefully to the latest opinions of amateurs on engineering as the Long Bridge project was discussed, while Capt. Jones heard the "words of learned length and thunderous sound" as they flowed from the labial organs of the Prime Minister, whilst all the time water was flowing underneath the old Long Bridge.

The Honorable Arthur Barnes, Minister of Education, looked quite happy and cheerful. It is difficult to ruffle the plumage of the member for Harbor Grace. He is the ultimate verbum in all things and to all men. Neither a Squires man or a Coaker man nor yet a free lance, it is exceedingly difficult to place him in any other position than that which he adorns.

"Party politics" is a phrase constantly in the mouth of the Prime Minister. His tuition, politically, has been so expensive to Newfoundland that it is no wonder that money is no object, and that millions come as easily to his tongue as tens to less exalted mortals.

Mr. Jennings, Minister of Public Works, was a busy man during the afternoon session. Members from both sides of the House frequently, paid him visits, flirtations of course, but presumably to consult him on the proper and legitimate allocation of the \$500,000 grant for Relief Work in the Outports. The Minister looked pleased and felt flattered to think that he was the orb around which smaller satellites revolved.

The Coakerites turned up, in force and stuck around night faithfully, fearing that something would be sprung on them in the absence of the big chief, by the wicked and altogether irresponsible Opposition. But nothing happened. The Government rooms were the source of attraction, and honorable members played checkers therein, meanwhile being ready for the sound of the division gong.

The Gallery has repeatedly noted that the Telegram seems to be the most popular newspaper, as very little attention is paid to the others, but when the "People's Paper" comes into the House there is a rush for it at once. It is the only journal which gives an absolutely unbiased report of the proceedings, hence the interest honorable members show in it.

applies word, not watch the lip movements of members, and it is to be hoped that this hint will be taken cognizance of.

The Minister of Justice explained, rather vaguely, a certain part of the Profiteering Act, and the Bill to amend it, in reply to some pertinent questions put by his honor the speaker, who took part in the discussion when the House was in Committee, but between the "because" and "whereas" of the Minister's explanation, no person perfectly comprehended what he was saying. His own domestic experience of buying foodstuffs did not cast any illumination on the subject. But that is ever the way of lawyers.

Mr. Walsh punctured the Profiteering Act in its original form and showed up its futility, its title being but a misnomer. Nothing whatever had been accomplished by this Act, neither had it sufficed to prevent the charging of exorbitant rates on the necessities of life, particularly sugar; neither had it been of any effect in bringing parties guilty of profiteering to justice. Mr. Walsh proved conclusively that the Government condoned profiteering in certain articles because the vendors were their supporters. The Act should be abolished. It is only lumbering up the Statutes.

The first hat worn in the Assembly for years during sessions, was sported by Mr. Bennett yesterday afternoon, without reprofit from the Speaker. It was reminiscent of the days of the late Sir Ambrose Shea, and the earlier times of the Legislature, when every member wore his "till" in the House, only when addressing the Speaker, when he uncovered. As the Chamber is somewhat draughty, we do not mean to instruct—Mr. Bennett is to be congratulated on reintroducing a vogue which other honorable members might well copy, especially those whose "hatch" is growing thin.

It was too funny for anything to note honorable members voting away pit-prop cutting rights on the West Coast, a part of the country of which they know as much about as Timbuctoo. The Minister of Public Works added his paucity of knowledge to the subject, and the Gallery has more commiseration for him than praise, for "fools rush in where angels fear to tread," though he did not protest the exportation tax. The Gallery does not often quote Latin, but here is an axiom that Mr. Jennings might very well accept, and it is given him in the hope that he will study it in the spirit in which it is offered: *Ne sutor ultra crepidam.* It is disingenuous to the Gallery to hear the line of talk thrown out by men absolutely ignorant of the subject under discussion. And so the Gallery says: *Verbum sap.* having no reference whatever to sap-heads.

ATTACK REFUSED.
CORK, May 16.
Attempts to snipe the guard at the prison last night, lasting for more than an hour, were stopped when the guard repelled with machine gun fire and sent up very lights, bringing a strong force from the barracks. This is the third attack on Cork jail within two months.

CIPHER DOCUMENTS FOUND.
LONDON, May 16.
Three arrests have been made by the police in connection with Saturday night's attack on residences in London and its suburbs of relatives of members of the Royal Irish Constabulary. Experts are deciphering documents seized by police yesterday in raids on Sinn Fein quarters in London.

U. S. ARMY.
WASHINGTON, May 16.
A United States army of one hundred and seventy-five thousand men was decided on to-day by the Senate Military Affairs Sub-Committee considering the Army Appropriation Bill.

MOST INGENUOUS.
BELFAST, May 16.
Lord Hugh Cecil, member of the Privy Council of Great Britain, who is the guest of Lord Londonderry's family in Mount Stewart, County Down, has suggested a scheme by which Ireland would be made an independent kingdom, its king to be a member of the Windsor Family, probably the Prince of Wales, to be appointed by the King. Under the scheme there would be two small parliaments, one in Belfast and the other in Dublin, and in addition "a House of Estates" of one hundred members. Complete federal autonomy would be given Ireland, but there would be a levy imposed for Imperial defence. Ireland would have an army, but no navy, and in the event of war the King would have power to suspend the Irish Constitution. Some of the Southern Irish leaders describe the scheme as "preposterous."

KILLINGS CONTINUE.
DUBLIN, May 16.
Attacks on police and military occurred in several places last night and to-day. One constable was killed and a sergeant and another constable wounded as they were leaving a church in Bansha, Tipperary, last night. The body of an unknown was found near Killybeggs, Co. Lond., Dublin, with five bullet wounds in the head. Four civilians were wounded in the shooting which followed bomb throwing in Frederick Street here to-day.

NEW AND EMPEROR.
LONDON, May 16.
Telegrams exchanged between King George and the Emperor of Japan were made public to-day. His Majesty expressed pleasure at the visit of the Japanese Crown Prince and said: "I hope this visit may strengthen the ties of friendship which so happily unite the two countries."

COMMUNIST UPRISING.
LONDON, May 16.
A Communist uprising has occurred at Gramona, Italy, according to a Milan despatch to the London Times. Troops have been called out and have employed machine guns against insurgents, and serious casualties are reported.

EXTENSIVE DAMAGE.
NEW YORK, May 16.
Damage to the Western Union Telegraph Company's transatlantic cables, by electrical disturbance accompanying the Aurora borealis of Saturday and Sunday nights, may necessitate the raising of cables for repairs. Newcomb Carlton, its President, announced to-night.

LLOYD GEORGE UNDER FIRE.
WARSAW, May 16.
Extraordinary measures have been taken by the Polish Government in an effort to clear up Silesian affairs, which have taken a turn for the worse, owing to Mr. Lloyd George's recent speech, accusing Poland of backing the movement which brought about the uprising. All efforts to communicate with Delbert Korfanty, leader of Polish insurgents having failed, Premier Wites himself, accompanied by Minister of Interior Skalski, proceeded to Sosnowice, just east of the Silesian frontier, from

The Government asserts that it has had no communication with Korfanty since the insurrection began. Mr. Lloyd George's speech is bitterly criticized by the Warsaw press.

LOOMING LARGELY.

LONDON, May 16.
Intervention of the Whitsun holidays brought a slight easing of tension in the Silesian crisis. No new developments were reported to-day, and apparently nothing further has been decided upon with reference to a meeting of the Supreme Council, which probably will not be held before next week, as the debate in the French Chamber is expected to occupy several days. The view held in London is that the delay will serve a useful purpose in allaying passion on both sides, and providing a more favourable atmosphere for calm discussion when Council meets. Moreover, it is believed, that the French Premier M. Briand, was not averse to seeking an opportunity, afforded by Premier Lloyd George's speech, to assume a strong patriotic attitude, which would assure him a big vote of confidence, that otherwise would be somewhat doubtful, since the French press has attributed to the diplomacy of the British Prime Minister, the defeat of French plans for an immediate occupation of Ruhr.

COWARDLY BUFFIANS.
DUBLIN, May 16.
Four persons, one of them a woman, were killed in County Galway last night, by men lying in ambush at Ballyturn, a short distance from Cork. Those killed were District Inspector Blake and Mrs. Blake, Capt. Cornwallis, son of Colonel Finnes Stanley Cornwallis, in whose automobile the car was riding, and Lieut. McCreery. The officers were attacked to the 17th Lancers. Mrs. Gregory, the only other person in the car, was not injured. The party had been spending Sunday afternoon playing tennis at the residence of Magistrate Baget, of Ballyturn House, and were returning to their homes at Cork. Reaching the end of the avenue leading from Ballyturn House, and finding the gate closed, Captain Cornwallis got out to open it, when shots were fired from the adjacent shrubbery and Cornwallis fell dead. Armed masked men, said to have numbered about forty, surrounded the car and ordered the women to leave. Mrs. Blake refused to do so, saying that she would die by the side of her husband. Mrs. Gregory was led away. Shortly afterwards the four bodies were found lying near the gate. After the shooting a number of men went to Ballyturn House and handed in a notice threatening to burn the house if there were any reprisals. Military and police reinforcements, sent to the scene, were fired upon and one constable was seriously wounded. Lieut. McCreery was only 19 years of age. Mrs. Gregory is a daughter-in-law of Lady Augusta Gregory, an Irish playwright.

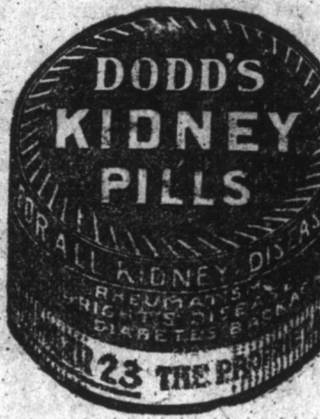

were marked by a comparatively small vote, and disorders in several places, particularly in the Province of Pisa, Novara and Parma, where altogether eight persons were killed and many wounded in conflicts between Fascists and Socialists. Incomplete returns indicate that Socialists will lose a minimum of fifty seats and the Catholics twenty. Improvidently, however, the most serious losses are sustained by followers of former Premier Nitti, whose seats have gone to swell the numbers of the constitutional block. Returns from Rome show a gain of one seat by Constitutionalists at expense of Catholics, and Socialists have the same number as before. It is reported that Premier Giolitti heads the list for Constitutional bloc in his constituency, and that ex-Premier Orlando has been elected in Palermo by a big majority. Signor Giolitti has already prepared a governmental statement which will include the legislative programme that he is confident he can carry out in the new parliament.

THE EXCITABLE GAUL.

LONDON, May 16.
Some excitement, caused in Paris, that Lloyd George had advocated the sending of troops by Germany to Upper Silesia, whereas the Prime Minister only contended that if the Allies themselves were unable to restore order, they should not prevent Germany from intervening. The London Times in an editorial under the caption "the return of good will," alludes to this misunderstanding and says, "the marked subsidence of excitement by the French Press will content here with relief and gratification. It seems to have been attributable partly to defective reports of Lloyd George's speech, hastily circulated in London and telegraphed abroad."

INTER-STATE DISORDERS.

WILLIAMSON, May 16.
Firing on the Crystal Black Coal Copper house at Rawl, West Virginia, broke out early to-night, according to police reports. It was the first disorder reported during the day in the Kentucky-West Virginia border trouble scene.

NOTICE OF MOTION.
Hon. The Prime Minister—On Thursday next, 19th inst., to move the House into Committee of the Whole on Ways and Means.

Hon. The Prime Minister—To ask leave to introduce a Bill entitled: "An Act respecting the Cutting and Exportation of Timber."

NOTICE OF QUESTION.

Sir M. P. Cashin—To ask Hon. the Prime Minister if he has taken up, either directly, or through the High Commissioner in London (whose knowledge of conditions here would be invaluable in setting out the actual conditions), any representations to the President and Directors of the Anglo-Nfld. Development Co. with reference to the existing strike at Grand Falls and the desirability of the Company conceding everything possible to its employees in order to maintain this industry in active operation during the present summer, in view of the great scarcity of employment elsewhere, and if so to lay on the table of the House a copy of all correspondence bearing on this subject.

Sir M. P. Cashin—To ask Hon. the Minister of Marine and Fisheries to lay on the Table of the House a list of the foreign-going vessels which ordinarily take away cargoes of codfish, now lying in this port, how many of the vessels are unemployed and the reason they are so unemployed; also an estimate of the number of seamen out of work as a result of this unemployment, and what steps, if any, he proposes to take to afford relief to the men so unemployed?

Sir M. P. Cashin—To ask the Prime Minister if he is aware that it is commonly reported in this city that there is very little, if any, of the salt needed by the S.S. "Tuckahoe" at Port Union, some months ago now in the stores there; that the explanation given for the salt not being the Government's is that the salt is being used for other purposes; and if he has requested any such loan; and if so, what answer he has received; and to lay on the table of the House copies of all correspondence in relation to this matter; also if it is his intention, during the coming Imperial Conference, to make such representations to the Imperial Authorities, and if so, what is the amount of the loan which he will ask from them?

Sir M. P. Cashin—To ask Hon. the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, in his capacity of Chairman of the Railway Commission, to lay on the Table of the House a statement showing the number of railway sleepers cut in the different electoral districts of this country from the first of July last up to date, and the amounts paid in each district for the same; also if any more sleepers require to be cut, and if he proposes in the distribution of the orders for the same to consider the claims of all the districts in the country?

Sir M. P. Cashin—To ask Hon. the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, in his capacity of Chairman of the Railway Commission, if Mr. George Morley, Superintendent of the coal boring operations at South Cove, has reported to the Commission or to the Government that it is waste of money to continue operations at this deposit; if he has so reported does the Government intend to pursue this work and waste further public money; if he has not so reported, what report has been made as to lay on the Table of the House a copy of the same.

Mr. Sullivan—To ask Hon. the Prime Minister, the Minister of Finance and Customs, to lay on the Table of the House a statement of the Customs Revenue for St. John's week by week, from March 21st to date, for the financial years 1918-19, 1919-20, 1920-21, and an estimate by the Auditor-General of the expected receipts in St. John's for the balance of this fiscal year together

with the actual receipts for the same period in the past two fiscal years.

Mr. Bennett—To ask Hon. the Prime Minister, seeing that only six weeks now intervene to the end of the fiscal year when, according to the correspondence between the Government and the Reid Newfoundland Co. last August, the scheme for Government co-operation in the working of the Railroad by a Commission will terminate:

(a) If the Government has notified the Reid Newfoundland Company of its intention to terminate this agreement at the end of June next, and if so to lay on the Table of the House a copy of the latter giving such notification, a copy of the Reid Newfoundland Company's reply, if any; and if no such notification has been given, the reason why it has not been;

(b) If the Government, in view of the fact that Mr. H. D. Reid, President of the Reid Newfoundland Company, has been back in this Colony for a month has undertaken any negotiations with him or the Company in regard to the operation of the Railroad after June 30th next, and if so to lay on the Table of the House copies of all correspondence between the Government and the Reid Newfoundland Company in regard to this matter, and if the negotiations, if any, have been conducted orally, to Table a statement describing what has been done, and if no negotiations have been commenced, a statement of the reason why not;

(c) If the Government is not negotiating with the Reid Newfoundland Company, to lay on the Table of the House a statement of the Government's position with regard to the operation of the railway system after the 30th of June next;

(d) If it is the intention of the Government to introduce any legislation at this session with reference to the matter of the further operation of the railroad system after June 30th next, will he undertake that such legislation will be Tabled in sufficient time to enable the country to thoroughly understand the nature and effects of such a measure instead of rushing it through in the last hours of the session as was done last year;

(e) Will he give this House and the country proper understandings that any such legislation, if introduced, will be carried out in accordance with the letter and spirit of the same in the Fall of 1921, being disregarded and an entirely new policy adopted by the Executive Government after the close of the session, with the result that this Colony has been saddled with an expenditure of a million and a half dollars for legislation enacted last session had been enforced in accordance with the terms of that enactment;

(f) Is it the intention of the Government, after the 30th of June next, to identify itself with the operating of some of the Reid Newfoundland Co's steamers so to become responsible for any liabilities incurred in their operation, and if so to state to the House the reasons for such a determination?

Mr. Moore—To ask Hon. the Minister of Justice (a) If Inspector General Hutchings is out of the Colony at the present time, (b) if he is away on public business, (c) if so what is the nature of his business, and (d) what allowance has been made to him for his expenses?

Mr. Macdonnell—To ask the Minister of Education for (1) an explanation as to why the vote for 1920-21 for 1920-21 is shown in this year's estimates as \$13,903.00 instead of \$14,425, being the total of the vote last year, including amount in supplementary supply; (2) Why this amount has been reduced this year to \$11,429.80?

House of Assembly.

MONDAY, May 16th.
The House met at 3.30 p.m.
Sir Michael Cashin drew the Government's attention to destitution in Placentia and asked that something be done to relieve these people. Sir Michael stated that there are 20,000 people in the country to-day without the means of going fishing and it was ridiculous to talk of allocating half a million dollars through road work for the purchase of supplies. The fishing season was now on us and we were absolutely unprepared for it. And to make matters worse, the people are not only in need of supplies but they are actually starving all over the Southern Shore. He suggested that the Government confer with the Board of Trade on the matter. And let them also get a steamer to bring down relief to the destitute districts on the South and West Coasts. He thought something should be done very quickly.
The Prime Minister suggested a joint committee of the Leader of the Opposition and two other opposition members to act in conjunction with the Executive Council on the matter.
Sir John Cresbie concurred with the remarks of Sir Michael Cashin and thanked the Prime Minister for his attention to the matter. He had recently visited the district of Port de Grave and he had found a certain amount of want and unrest there due to the lack of work.
Mr. Walsh fully appreciated all that had been done by the Prime Minister. He drew attention to the seriousness of conditions in his district. In St. Mary's Bay alone there were 500 men unable to obtain supplies.
Mr. Sullivan spoke briefly on the matter and also voted the necessity for immediate action if the people were to go to the fishery. Road work was no use at this time of the year. A quarter of a million dollars was absolutely necessary on the Southern Shore for supplies. He was convinced that merchants could not supply on their own responsibility but if the Government would guarantee one million dollars things might be all right. All our industries had closed down and the Government must act.
Mr. Sinnott thanked the Government also and concurred with the idea of a Select Committee.
Notices of question were given by Sir Michael Cashin, Messrs. Sullivan, Bennett, Moore and MacDonnell.
A Bill to Amend the Election Act of 1913 was read a first time.
The House went into Committee of the Whole on certain Resolutions respecting a loan for the requirements of the Colony and certain obligations of the Municipal Council.
The Prime Minister explained the resolutions. They were for \$1,500,000 of last year, \$600,000 for Public Works at 5 1/2 per cent, \$500,000 for the Municipal Council at 6 per cent, and \$1,000,000 refund to the Surplus Trust Fund and \$1,000,000 for the Railway. The Bonds would be 15 year bonds at 5 1/2 per cent. Arrangements for floating the loan had already been made. A considerable amount of discussion was caused by these Resolutions in which several members of the Opposition participated. The Committee rose and reported progress.
The Prime Minister told Sir M. P. Cashin during question time that the strike situation was still on at Grand Falls.
The House went into Committee of the Whole on Supply.
Grants for main roads were passed. These grants were identical with those of last year.
The Committee rose and reported progress.
The House next went into Committee of the Whole on the Bill to amend the Profiteering Act, 1920.
Mr. Higgins spoke briefly on the Bill. He stated his intention of supporting it and suggested that the Board to be appointed would not be one in name only. He also said that cold storage was used in a manner contrary to the Act.
Mr. Bennett also addressed the House briefly on the Bill. He thought that if anything were to be done in the matter it should be done with earnestness. He thought an inspector was

absolutely essential to see the people get a square deal.
The Speaker also spoke to the Bill. The Minister of Justice explained the Bill.
Mr. Walsh stated that meat invoiced at 13 cents per pound was selling in town for 45 cents. He wanted live and energetic men to be appointed to the Committee under the Act.
Mr. Moore knew too, that profiteering was going on in meat. He was told by the Chairman of the F.C.B. when he made a complaint that everybody did it.
Sir John Cresbie said that an investigation should take place in the profiteering on beef. He gave the Bill his hearty support.
The Committee rose and reported progress. The Bill was ordered to be read a third time on the following day.
The House went into Committee of the Whole on a Bill Respecting the Cutting and exportation of Timber for special purposes.
Mr. Sullivan suggested the advisability of allowing the cutting of timber on granted lands on payment of \$1 per cord export tax.
Some further discussion took place on the Bill and it was passed without dissenting voice.
The Committee rose and reported progress on the motion to adjourn.
Mr. Sullivan asked the Prime Minister if the allocation of the road grants would be made, through the members for the districts.
The Prime Minister said the allocations were vested in the Minister of Works.
The House adjourned at 6 p.m.

Rev. Edgar Jones, Ph.D. Leaves for New Duties.

Referring to the report of Rev. Dr. Jones' farewell sermon, in one of yesterday's papers, and the too early date of his departure from amongst us, it seems now opportune to allude in a general way to his term of service at St. Thomas' and in this Colony.
Rev. Edgar Jones, Ph.D. is a native of the Colony, having been born in the parish of St. John's. He was not known to a single member of the congregation that unanimously elected him six years ago, and over whose destinies he has presided with such signal acceptance. That the revered late Rector will be much missed at St. Thomas' goes without saying. His masterful, clear cut, inspirational pulpit utterances cannot have been without effectiveness, nor will they be soon forgotten. His exceeding skill as organizer is noted in the various parish institutions, every one of which is a power for good in its own department. His ministrations to the sad, the sick, and the suffering, are gratefully remembered by the many recipients of his ministry. His genial, sunny dispositions with all he came in contact is proverbial, and has helped many a depressed one over a tight place. All these and other praiseworthy traits contributed to the universal love and esteem of his parishioners, and we doubt not are fully appreciated by them.
We venture a brief consideration of the loss the community is meeting in Dr. Jones' departure, as it occurs to us. First of all he was unwaveringly loyal to his own Church and her tenets. To many he was what is known as a "high" churchman, but he was a "broad" churchman as well. With him there ever was room for all who "professed and called themselves Christians." He taught and exemplified in his conduct, that the Catholic Church included many Christian organizations not directly connected with the Church of England. His energy was ever directed to the union of churches whose effort would be for God rather than a mere institution. He has been an enthusiast in the matter of educational improvement, contending that the Church and the State were obligated to secure to the people the benefits of the best education possible. To this end he was vigorously opposed to the system obtaining in the Colony to-day, and always a warm believer in the inter-denominational idea, which he advocated fearlessly with both voice and pen.
In the avenues of Social Service and moral reforms, he was an intelligent faithful worker, ever forceful in contending for what he believed was right, yet ever tolerant towards those who looked through different glasses. A strenuous opponent of the liquor traffic and its ravages, Dr. Jones was an outstanding advocate of work for prohibition, and during the campaign and voting, toiled incessantly. He has been a member of the Govt. Commission to enquire into the working of the law and suggest modification if needful. The report is not yet published, but it is understood that it favors an honest and proper enforcement of the present law, rather than any change. One of the first members of the Local Social Service Council, his labors and interest in behalf of delinquent and dependent children; his work for outport hospitals and nurses, as also his general enthusiasm towards all measures pointing to moral and social uplift, are well recognized and remembered by fellow workers.
The public will not have forgotten how in association with Rev. D. B. Hemmeon, and Rev. Dr. Whelan, a serious trouble between the Reid Company and its employees was satisfactorily settled, and a prolonged misfortune averted. In various other enterprises apart from ordinary parochial duties, his acknowledged ability and energy has been availed of, and it is true to say that "whatsoever his hand found to do, he did it with his might."
His Church will miss his counsel and leadership, and the community will regret his departure, because of valued service freely given; but his many friends and fellow helpers will wish him God speed wherever his lot may be cast.
We understand his future Parish is at Newark, near Wilmington, in the Diocese of Delaware; and it is somewhat singular that Dr. Jones came to St. Thomas' Church, St. John's, from St. Thomas' Church, Summerville, Mass., and goes from here to St. Thomas' Church, Newark, Del. He will carry with him, we are sure the best wishes of a multitude of friends within and without the communion where he has labored so successfully, and by whom he will be lovingly remembered as a distinguished Christian gentleman—Com.

Shocking Fatality at Sydney Mines.
CAGE TENDER PLUNGED 600 FEET TO AWFUL DEATH.
One of the most shocking fatalities that has occurred in Sydney Mines for over ten years took place yesterday afternoon shortly after 5 o'clock, when George Neal, cage tender at the Jubilee mine, met instant death by falling down the shaft, a distance of 600 feet. The body landed upon the top of the coal cage upon which two workmen, William Groves and Neil McEachern were engaged in making their usual daily examination of the shaft. Their feelings on beholding the mangled body of their fellow workman as he struck the cage, can be better imagined than described. The body of the unfortunate man struck head first the chains which hold the cage to the hoisting rope. The head was completely severed from the body and rolled into what is known as the "sump," a few feet below the cage. Beyond the severing of the head no other bones were broken.
Just how the accident occurred will probably never be known but it is presumed Neal lost his balance when looking down the shaft to see how the men below were progressing with their work. There is a safety gate over the mouth of the shaft at the surface which is locked at all times when the cage is below the surface level.
When the accident was discovered an examination was made of the gate, and it was found to have been closed but not locked. The gate stands about two feet from the shaft and it is presumed Neal opened it and went inside to look down the shaft, and in doing so he must have overbalanced himself and fell to his death.
The deceased was 23 years of age and is survived by a wife and two children. The widow was formerly a Miss Williams from Ingonish. A particularly sad feature of the accident is the fact that Mrs. Neal is in a delicate state, and in her present condition the shock of learning of her husband's death may have serious results. The deceased had been employed as head-man or cage tender at the mine for nearly four years, and was always considered a most careful employee. The tragedy has shocked the entire community in their sudden bereavement.
The remains were taken to the embalming parlors of undertaker James Francis, and an enquiry into the cause of the accident will later be held by Judge Finlayson—North Sydney Herald, May 13.

HOW NEAL MET HIS DEATH.
Further investigation by colliery officials into Wednesday's tragic accident at the Jubilee colliery when George Neal was killed at the mine shaft, would seem to indicate that the unfortunate man was struck on the head by a descending cage and precipitated down the shaft. The accident occurred at 5.55 and when the men who were examining the shaft gave the signal to the engine-room to hoist the cage they were standing on, Neal was in the engine-room at the time. He immediately went to the shaft, and it was presumed opened the safety gate and stood against the hangers of the shaft looking down, evidently forgetting all about the descending cage which struck him on the head and sent him hurtling through space to the roof of the upoming cage. This theory of the officials is borne out by the discovery of blood stains on the bottom of the cage and also on a section of the shaft timbers several feet below the surface. An official report to this effect has been made by manager Murphy, and it is believed to be the true theory of the man's death.—North Sydney Herald, May 14.

Had he not started on this famous journey, the "General" would never have been heard of outside of his immediate circle of acquaintances. As it was, he came for the time being a national figure. In the spring of 1894 there was a great deal of unemployment in the United States. So it was that Coxey conceived the idea of marching on Washington from his home town in Ohio. He started on his journey with a few patriots, the numbers growing as they marched, until he commanded a fair sized brigade. A demonstration in force against unemployment.

They did; and that was the end of the affair for Coxey's army then and there "blew up."
All that was left were a couple of words, "Coxey's army," which were added to that already long list of Americanisms, meaning a down-and-out, a man out of a job. A new name for a tramp or a hobo.

DOES KINDNESS PAY?

Relief of Making.

No one who had passed the age of infancy and was living in London in May, 1900—twenty years since—is likely to forget the whirlwind of enthusiastic joy that swept over the Metropolis, and, indeed, over the country generally, when authentic news was received of the "Relief of Mafeking," leading to a public demonstration which added the word "to maffeking" to our vocabulary, and evoked scathing criticism in some quarters for a burst of wild behaviour that savoured rather of the French than the English genius. In demonstrating delight. It was not to be wondered at, for so long as British history is read the defence of Mafeking by Colonel Baden-Powell will hold its own with that of Rorke's Drift, Lucknow, and Jhelabad, as an instance of heroic endurance and splendid resolution. Only a man able chief could have inspired the unbounded confidence and shown the amazing military resources which saved Mafeking, after a siege of 213 days. General Cronje just invested the little town in October, 1898, then left it to be carried on by Commandant Snyman, who could make no more impression on Mafeking than his predecessor, though he expended over a hundred tons of artillery ammunition. When he heard of the approach of the Southern relief column, under Colonel—now General—Mahon, and the Northern relief column under Colonel—now Lord Plumer, Snyman made a bold attack on May 12, in the hope of capturing the town before they arrived. Under cover of the darkness, Commandant Elff made his way up the bed of the river and seized one of the British forts; but when day break came he found himself inside a circle of British posts. Not many of the Boers were killed, but our bullets perforated the metal water tanks, and, thus deprived of water, they were compelled to surrender. The two relief columns effected a junction at Jan Maselli on May 15; and the following day advanced towards Mafeking, being attacked by Snyman, who was driven back, and at night the British bivouacked about six miles from Mafeking, which they entered on the 17th, when the Boers fell back incapable of further effort.

Pliander, owner of the schooner Ambition, lying at Voght's wharf, has taken this step, his men being paid off last week. Lack of charters, with no hope of conditions becoming better, caused this step. Reports from Newfoundland are also equally discouraging to mariners. Capt. Scott, owner and commander of the crack schooner Evelyn Miller, when at St. John's recently was deluged with offers of experienced seamen who were out of work and offered to join the ship at any price offered, one man even offered for his grub. Capt. Scott will take one cargo of coal to St. John's, and on his return will likely pay off his crew and lay the vessel up unless the unforeseen happens.—North Sydney Herald.

Shelburne. — (Canadian Press). — The schooner Canada, Shelburne's candidate for Canadian challenger in the International fishing schooner races off Halifax next autumn, is expected to sail from Lunenburg shortly for Halifax, en route to the fishing banks.

The vessel will go hand-lining, and her departure will be well within the time limit of the Nova Scotia hand-lining fleet, which usually sails for the Banks between May 10th and 15th.

Although the Canada was built with a waterline length some feet beyond the limit of 112 feet quoted in the deed of gift of the International trophy, Shelburne's expectation is that if Gloucester and Boston have no objection the trustees will not bar the Canadian from the Nova Scotia elimination races nor from the finals should the Shelburne vessel make them.

A Newspaper's Value.

 Mr. Robert Blatchford, of England, has been counting up how many words one gets in a newspaper for a penny, and how many for the same sum in the average novel. He makes it 43,000 in the paper, and 757 in the novel. You get only one story in the novel, whereas in his paper you get scores of interesting articles or paragraphs about real events and living men and women. You also get literary articles by well-known writers or public men on topical subjects. Moreover, many of the articles and sketches in the newspaper are better written than in any fiction except the best. Mr. Blatchford expresses surprise that people who will give seven and sixpence for a novel will grumble at threepence for a first-rate newspaper.

Women's Battle With Wolves.

The women of an Indian encampment 40 miles north of Cochrane, in Northern Ont., have had a desperate fight with wolves. While nearly all the men were out trapping the camp was surrounded by between 70 and 80 timber wolves. A circle of bonfires was lighted by the women, and for a time the flames kept the wolves at bay, but gradually they became bolder, and the squaws were obliged to take vigorous defensive measures. With the few rifles in the camp they opened fire upon the leaders of the pack, and as each wolf fell its companions tore it to pieces and devoured the carcass. They turned the rifles from point to point, and thus checked the advance of the beasts, who stopped to devour their fallen mates. When the ammunition gave out an old squaw offered to sacrifice herself, and was only restrained by force from throwing herself among the wolves. When the situation was most desperate an Indian boy thought of some sticks of dynamite in the camp, which were kept for use in the lake when fishing was bad. A bundle of these was tied together with caps and a fuse and thrown into the midst of the wolves. When the smoke of the explosion cleared away 36 dead wolves were counted, in addition to those which had been shot and devoured by their ravenous companions.

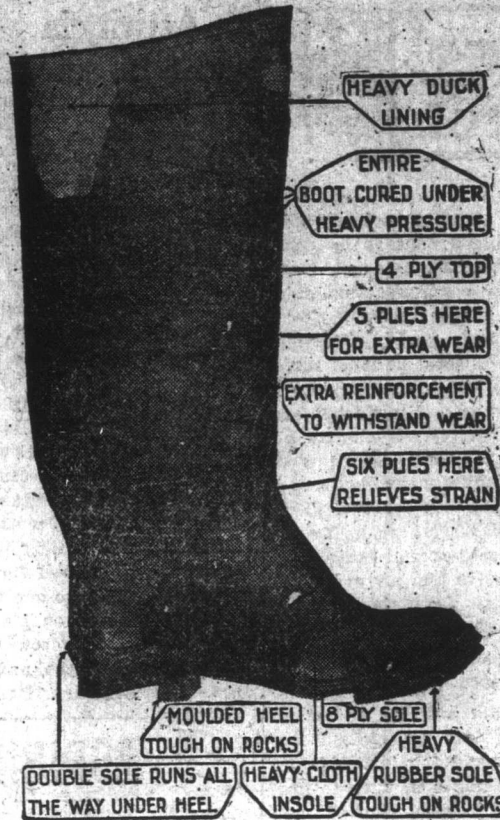

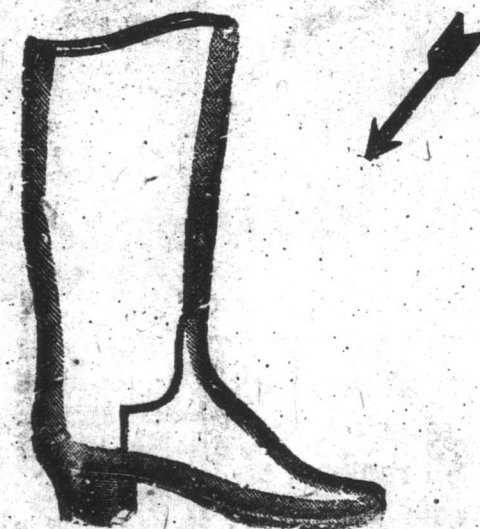

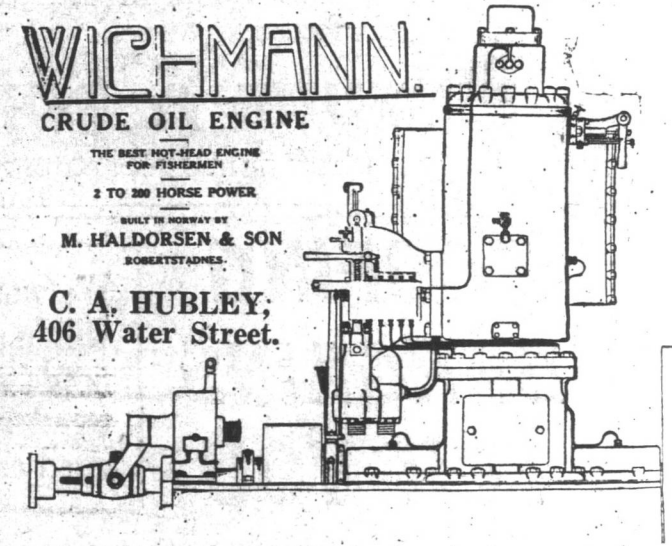
